Poppy Days Sale Set

May 23-24 have been designated as Poppy Days in Klamath Falls and throughout the United States.

Edna Russell, Poppy Day chairman, of the American Legion Auxiliary, in announcing plans for the all-out effort to see that everyone in the city wears a poppy this year states that volunteer workers of the auxiliary will be on city streets both days.

They will sell crepe paper, veteran-made poppies. These small red flowers sold in Oregon, are made in veterans hospitals in Portland and Medford.

The making of the poppies by veterans, is a therapy benefit as well as giving the men an opportunity to earn money to assist their families and themselves.

The veterans make the small blossoms of crepe paper, with wire stems as near as possible like the wild poppies that grew on the battlefields and in the cemeteries of Western Europe. The materials are supplied free by the auxiliaries and veterans are paid by the state auxiliaries for each poppy made.

In the hospitals work is done in beds, and wheelchairs, arranged for by the auxiliary. The veterans are the only paid workers in the poppy program. Women who sell the poppies are not paid. The entire amount collected on Poppy Days, after the veterans are paid, goes into funds which support Legion and auxiliary activities for disabled veterans and child welfare.

The poppy is the symbol of the living dead in commemoration of those who died following World War I, and is sold in memory also of those who gave their lives in World War II and the Korean War. They are also flowers of hope for the living.

Barre Lumber Dealer's 62nd Birthday Party

WASHINGTON, Vt. — The city of Barre—population 10,000—has been invited to Barre Lumber dealer Nate Flint's 62nd birthday party Sunday.

"After the party is over, do not say you were not asked," Flint said in a three-column advertisement Friday in the Barre Daily Times.

Flint said the party actually is being held two days before his birthday because he thinks he may die early in his 63rd year. He said his father, mother, two brothers and a sister each died at the age of 62.

Flint expects a turnout of more than 3,000 at the party. He estimated ice cream and cake will cost about \$350.

A \$100 scholarship, plus a high school music diploma, has been awarded to Marian Asher, student at Sacred Heart Academy in recognition of her ability to play 10 to 15 selections annually for 10 years for a superior rating each year. Marian, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. M. Asher, Alturas, has played 10 memorized selections including a complete Beethoven Sonata, a Prelude and a Fugue from the Well Tempered Clavier by Bach. She also passed rigid requirements in piano technique to receive the honor in the National Piano Playing Auditions.

Here as adjudicator for the 63 entrants in the auditions held May 3, 4, 6 at Sacred Heart Academy was Mrs. Astrida Bezdech of Portland. The auditions are an annual event in which students of the academy participate. Similar auditions are held in over 400 centers from coast to coast throughout the United States.

Mrs. Bezdech was born in Riga, Latvia. She started the study of piano at 6 years of age and was admitted to the National Conservatorium of Riga at 14. In 1930 she emigrated to Canada where she taught music and did numerous series of recitals over the air for the Newfoundland Network of the Canadian Broadcasting Company. At present she lives in Portland where she teaches and appears in duo piano work with her husband.

Finance Department Okays School Bid

DORRIS — The state finance department has approved the low bid of \$611,000 of Singleton Construction Company for construction of the new Mount Shasta High School, Dr. Jere E. Hurley, superintendent of the Siskiyou Union High School District announced Tuesday.

Construction will start just as soon as the contract is signed and the bond filed, which takes only a few days, Dr. Hurley said. The contractors have one year to complete the school.

The high school will be the fourth of the district's building projects to get under way. Yreka and Butte Valley high schools are almost completed and will be ready for the coming school year. The new McCloud High School is under construction.

Bids for the Weed High School will be received June 1. In addition to state-aided projects, the district built from its own funds, a gymnasium and three classroom units for Happy Camp High School, which was ready for occupancy at the beginning of this school year, and a new eight room addition for the Tulelake High School, occupied during the school year 1956-1957, said Dr. Hurley.
