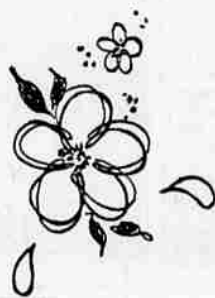
The tea and fashion show is a Mothers Club project to raise funds for a full year scholarship at University of Oregon for some qualifying graduate of a high school in Klamath County.
