BEAUTY TIPS

Tender gums, like hurting feet, can mark the facial expression. For this reason gum massage is essential. Many foods, such as apples and celery, do this for you while you eat. However, actual massage when you brush your teeth guarantees your gums a break.

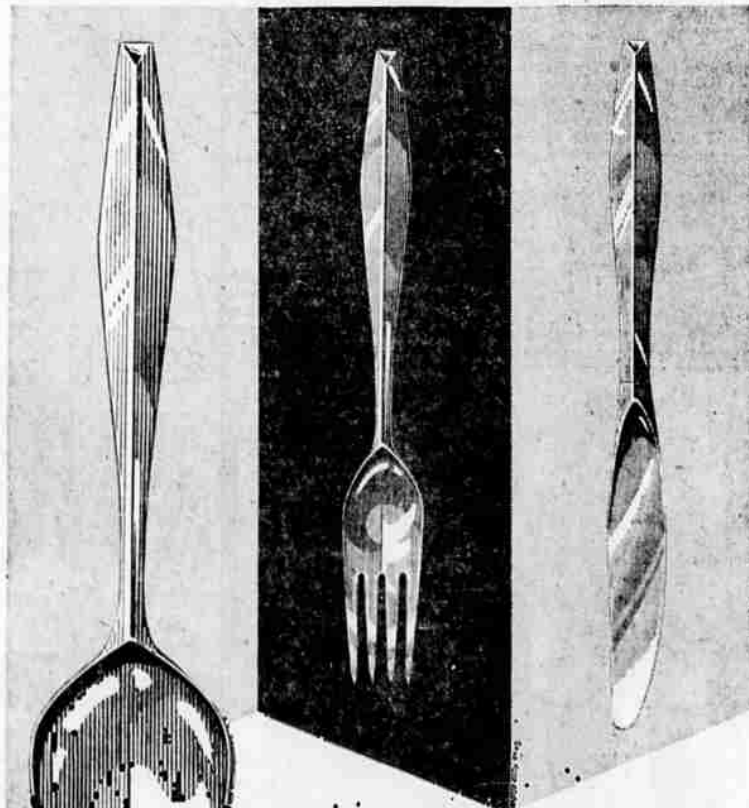
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
