

Demos Plan New Group

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Leaders of the Democratic party today announced formation of an "issue" committee to prepare in the West for the coming election and the 1960 convention.

National Committeeman Paul Ziffren of California described the committee's two-fold function as: —The development of issues for the western region of the nation.

—The winning of more influence for western Democrats in shaping party policy.

Issues developed by the committee will be turned over to task forces for more work.

"The committee also will develop more influence for western states in Democratic party and convince voters in the West that the Democratic party is best equipped to serve the interests of the West," Ziffren said.

"We feel other parts of the country are better organized and with the flow of population to the West, we'd like to have more influence in shaping of policies of the party."

The committee was formed at a two-day Western Democratic Conference, attended by 14 national committeemen and women and 11 state chairmen and vice chairmen from California, Nevada, Arizona, Utah, Idaho, Washington, Oregon, Colorado and the 30 territory of Alaska.

Prospector Saved By Helicopter

GOLD BEACH (AP)—Carson Gray of Myrtle Point fell off a cliff in an isolated area near here Saturday and was rescued Sunday by an Air Force helicopter.

Gray was on a prospecting trip with Don Knight of Myrtle Point, Clarence Dawes of North Bend, and his son, Martin Gray.

The elder Gray hurt himself in the fall on Boulder Creek, some 25 miles northeast of here. Knight went for help while the others remained with the injured man.

A ground party reached Gray Sunday morning and carried him to a meadow where the helicopter was able to pick him up. Gray was brought to a hospital here.

Youths Drown In Accidents

Four Oregon teen-agers drowned in weekend fishing and swimming accidents as warm weather attracted thousands to cool rivers and streams.

Washington reported seven drownings, raising the total for the two states to 11.

The Oregon victims were Robert Milton Belsher, 17, Portland; son of Mr. and Mrs. Milton W. Belsher; David Phillip Reed, 15, Portland; son of Mr. and Mrs. Martin Reed; Curtis Lee Wassner, 17, Goble, son of Columbia County Commissioner Louis J. Wassner; and Donald Keith Harding, 13, Portland; son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert E. Harding.

Belsher drowned late Saturday in a crowded pool in the Benton-Lane Park, five miles north of Junction City. It was believed he struck his head while diving. An autopsy was ordered.

Young Reed drowned in the Clackamas River when a surge of water released from an upstream dam tripped him and washed him downstream.

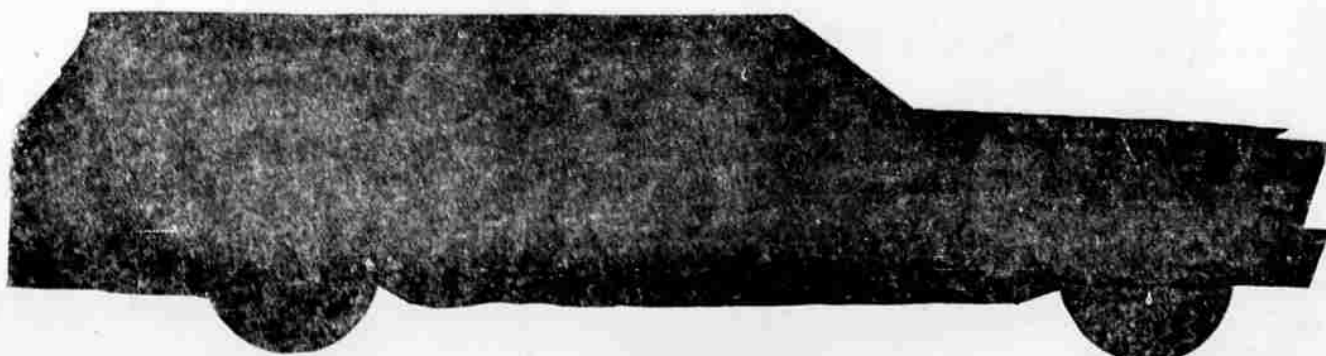


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
