MIDDLETOWN, N.Y. (AP)—Mrs. Dominica Sugg, 34, of New York City, peered over the crest of a ridge during a hunting outing yesterday. A bullet from a .22-caliber rifle crashed into her right temple, killing her almost instantly.

She was shot by one of two hunter friends who fired at the same time. They thought they had seen a woodchuck.

Police did not know which of the friends, John Anzalone, 36, or Silvio (Sal) Burdo, 27, had fired the fatal bullet.

Mrs. Sugg, her husband, the two friends and another couple had come here to hunt woodchucks together.

Coroner Kenneth March ruled the death accidental.

Powell Warns Demo Leaders

NEW YORK (AP)—Rep. Adam Clayton Powell Jr. has told two Tammany Hall leaders to stay out of Harlem.

In a talk to 500 persons at the Harlem church where he is pastor, Powell declared yesterday: "I just think Carmine (DeSapio, head of Tammany Hall) and Julian Jack (Manhattan's Negro borough president) better not walk up and down Harlem streets too much."

"We're not going to give them the same treatment the Communists gave Vice President Nixon and his wife, but we will make it mighty uncomfortable for them."

Last Thursday, Tammany leaders in the 16th Congressional District, which Powell represents, voted to read him out of the Democratic party on the ground that he is not a Democrat and supported Eisenhower because of the civil rights issue.

Powell has vowed to oppose the regular Democratic candidates in as many Negro and Puerto Rican areas as he can.

Powell is under indictment for alleged income tax evasion.

Last Saturday, Jack, who has sided with Tammany in its dispute with Powell, was booed at a Harlem rally.

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
