Nat Director Blasts Frick For Meddling

WASHINGTON (UP)—Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick was accused by a director of the Washington baseball club today of "unwarranted meddling" in the club's "internal affairs."

The charge was fired by C. Leo Deasey, outspoken member of the Senators' board of directors, and counsel for the Griffith family, which controls the club.

Deasey asserted that Frick "would be better advised if he kept his mouth shut in reference to matters about which he simply knows nothing and which do not concern his office."

He aimed his criticism at a statement attributed to Frick in an interview published by a Canadian newspaper (the Montreal Star weekly magazine).

The newspaper, in a story titled "What's Happening to Baseball," quoted Frick as saying of the Washington club: "Griffith Stadium, like Ebbets Field, is no longer up to big league standards. Congress, which administers the District of Columbia, has been talking about building a new stadium for the Senators, but I do not believe the money will be appropriated in a time of increased defense expenditures and demands for tax revision."

"Meantime, an internal struggle is taking place for control of the club. Minority stockholders demand that money be raised to obtain players who will end the Senators' long stay in the second division. President Cal Griffith defends his present policy as the only one possible under the circumstances. If the minority wins, the Senators are likely to move. Otherwise, they will remain in Washington."

Griffith was not available for comment.

Deasey said that "insofar as the Washington situation is concerned, it is obvious to me that (Frick) does not know what he is talking about, and when he finds himself in that position he should shut up."

"As to the Stadium," he said, "it's hard enough to get congressional action on a municipal stadium without having the 'head' of baseball make a suggestion that he does not think the money will be appropriated in a time of increased defense expenditures and demands for tax revision."

Deasey dismissed Frick's statement about "an internal struggle" for control of the club, saying "The facts are that the Griffiths own outright more than 50 percent of the stock and that is control; they need no further help to obtain what they already have."

He said that H. Gabriel Murphy, who owns about 42 percent of the club stock, "is a minority stockholder (who) has repeatedly said that he will do all in his power to keep the Senators in Washington, and the Griffiths have publicly stated the same thing."

Bavasi Angered By Snider

MILWAUKEE (UP)—Vice President E. J. (Buzzy) Bavasi of the Los Angeles Dodgers is angry at Duke Snider again, but there is little Bavasi can do that he hasn't done before—except trade him.

He said last night he isn't trying to trade Snider.

What's more, Snider doesn't want to be traded.

The flareup followed Bavasi's uncomplimentary remarks about what he termed Snider's indifference and poor play.

"I'm not mad at Snider the man," Bavasi said, "but I'm mad at Snider the ballplayer. Such a waste. Here he's hitting .225 with only five RBIs. He ought to be ashamed of himself."

"I can't understand the Duke," Bavasi continued. "He has all the talent in the world, but he doesn't seem to want to apply it to baseball. Maybe he ought to try something else."

Bavasi made the remarks early yesterday and again last night, but Snider said he didn't know about them until many hours later when he was contacted by telephone at a local hotel where the Dodgers stay when they play the Braves.

"If he has a beef, why doesn't he come and see me about it before talking to some writers?" said Snider. "When I have a good left leg again, I'll hit. Until then I'll do the best I can. If that's not good enough, then that's too bad."

Asked if he would rather draw his paycheck from some other team, Snider replied: "No, definitely not. I don't want to be traded. I like it in Los Angeles."

Snider said he would not comment on the Coliseum, the top-sided ball park that's a boon to right-handed hitters but a bust to left-handers like Snider.

Bavasi said, however, that Snider, the Dodgers' meal ticket for many years, is unhappy with the park "and I feel sorry for him in that respect, but there's nothing I can do about it."

STROKE SAVER
Sand traps—A majority of golfers are afraid of the word sand, so they are working at a disadvantage from the beginning of this shot. Actually, the sand trap shot is the easiest shot in golf, as the player doesn't even have to hit the ball. The sand takes the ball out. If the sand is soft, first wiggle the feet into the sand to get a firm grip with the feet. Take your club shot stance.

When taking the club back on your back swing, cock your hands at once. The amount of back swing depends upon the distance desired. Pull down with your left arm, aiming an inch or two inches behind the ball. Continue pulling your left arm through the ball on line to your target, also use a lot of hand action. Carry the hands and arms to a high follow through. If the sand is packed hard, use your normal chip shot. Be sure to take no sand. I play the ball in both instances pretty well off my left heel. In most cases the club face can be opened up for both types of shots.

The Mounties winning run in the afternoon contest came on a bases-loaded walk with two out. Sacramento had scored twice in the second on Carlos Paula's single, a triple by Jim Greengrass and a double by Al Heist. The Solons tied the score at 3-3 in the ninth when Clay Dalrymple's single sent Nippy Jones home.

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No Pacer Needed In Relays

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—The rash of claims that "pacers" are leading the mile athletes to record efforts gets no cheers from Tom Moore, director of the California Relays at Modesto.

"We'll have no pacers in our mile event on May 31," said Moore today. "Every one of the eight or nine men who will compete probably will finish — and every one of them has a chance to win."

Moore, a great hurdler in his hey-day 20 years ago, can't see the necessity for "pacers" if the field is properly made up.

"We'll have only men who are acknowledged top milers," said Moore. "These include Herb Elliott, who smashed the recognized world record at Los Angeles on Friday night—despite cries that there was a 'pacer' in the crowd; Alex Henderson, another Australian now going to Arizona (Tempe) State College; Lazlo Tabors of Hungary, who also has cracked the four-minute mile; Dr. Stefan Lewandowski of Poland, who has been clocked in 4:06.6; Joe Villareal of Texas; Barry Grim of Maryland and Jim Grelle of Oregon. All these men are recognized as exceptional milers," said Moore.

"And there is a chance we may get one or two more top milers to round out the field. But we'll put nobody into the race who could resemble a pacer."

Moore is disappointed that Coach Brutus Hamilton of California will not let his ace miler, Don Bowden, go in the event. Bowden, only American citizen ever to crack the four-minute barrier, will be saved to run with his teammates as the California relay teams go for more world marks.

The international outlook that goes into the mile events won't show in the 100-yard dash. But Moore thinks he has the makings of one of the finest of fields in this event, too. Already entered are the arch-enemies, Dave Sime of Duke and Bobby Morrow of Abilene Christian; Bill Woodhouse, Morrow's teammate; Ray Norton, the 9-3 man from San Jose State; Willie White, California; and Orlando Hazley, Oklahoma State.

PCC Meeting Faces Rose Bowl Problems

PORTLAND, Ore. (UP)—Will the Rose Bowl melon be cut six ways or nine in 1960?

This was one of the questions facing the Pacific Coast Conference Tuesday as it prepared to tackle the Bowl problem. Monday the crumbling circuit returned two of its members to good standing and Bowl availability but it will lose three a year from this July.

On probation since 1956 for illegal payments to athletes, Washington and Southern California were given clean bills of health. As of July 1 they will be back in the good graces of the conference. UCLA, which drew a three-year probation in 1956, must wait another year.

The conference was prepared to hear the report of its Rose Bowl committee Tuesday. The lucrative Bowl game returns an estimated \$25,000 annually to each member school except Idaho, which draws half a share.

UCLA, California and Southern California have announced they will withdraw from the circuit July 1, 1959. But the pact with the Big Ten Conference and the Tournament of Roses carries through the Jan. 1, 1960 game. With only six teams left in the conference then, the problem will be whether to give the departing trio consideration for a bid to play and a

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
