

### Hollywood Mourns Passing Of Actor

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. (UP)—Those who knew suave, debonair Ronald Colman personally and through his long acting career were saddened today by the death of the veteran, 67-year-old stage and screen star.

Colman, whose whimsical touch and clipped accent made him famous in his 30-year career, died Monday at St. Francis Hospital of a virus lung infection.

Death ended the gray-haired actor's plans to return to his native England next month.

"It will be wonderful to see England again," Colman told friends recently. "Conditions have improved so much. The theater is marvelous and it will be a delight to show Juliet (his daughter) some of the places we used to know."

He planned to enroll the 13-year-old miss in school at Lausanne, Switzerland. Colman's wife, Benita Hume, and Dr. George Ulrich were at his bedside when death came. He had been hospitalized the day before with a recurrence of a virus infection he had fought for 18 months.

Funeral services will be conducted for the handsome actor Wednesday afternoon at All Saints by the Sea chapel in Montecito. Colman's wife, the former Benita Hume, an ex-British musical star, and his daughter have lived for years at Montecito.

### Atlantic Fleet Reshuffles Units

NORFOLK, Va. (AP)—Unsettled conditions in the Mediterranean have caused the Atlantic Fleet to reshuffle some of its combat units so they will be ready for immediate redeployment if necessary.

The Navy said in an official statement that the regrouping is intended "to improve our defense capabilities during the present unsettled period."

It gave no elaboration but unofficial sources said the regrouping will increase the fleet's mobility and readiness for deployment if tensions in the Far East make it necessary to reinforce the 6th Fleet.

Certain fleet units have been placed on a four-day standby alert basis, it was learned.

**CLERIC STITCH CRISIS TODAY**

ROME (AP)—Samuel Cardinal Stritch, partially paralyzed by a severe stroke yesterday, spent a good night and doctors said his condition had not worsened. The crisis was expected sometime today.

"His condition is satisfactory," said a brief medical bulletin this morning. It was signed by the cardinal's personal physician, Dr. Ralph Bergen of Chicago, and Dr. Filippo Rocchi, Vatican physician.

"Twenty-four hours have now passed and that already is something," Rocchi said. "Naturally we continue to hope for the best."

Prof. Arnaldo Pozzi, director of the clinic where the prelate is hospitalized, said he was not able to talk but was lucid and was being given liquid nourishment.

The 70-year-old Archbishop of Chicago suffered a blood clot in the brain that partially paralyzed his right side and impeded his speech.

Last night he was given Extreme Unction—the Roman Catholic Church's last rite—for the second time since he arrived in Rome last month to assume his new post as chief of the Vatican congregation in charge of missions. He also received the rites just before his right arm was amputated April 28 to check the threat of gangrene arising from another blood clot.

A priest from the College of St. Mary of the Lake, known also as Chicago House, said the cardinal had not been able to take communion this morning. Priests from the college kept a vigil at the bedside.

### American Pianist To Play Sunday On TV

NEW YORK (AP)—One of the most misleading characters on television is a bearded, bright-eyed idiot in a derby hat who passes himself off by the name of Sydney Ferguson.

It's rather astonishing to learn that there are many people who fail to recognize him for what he is: Skitch Henderson, jazz virtuoso, musical classicist, composer, distinguished conductor of symphonic orchestras.

A Ferguson, he is frequently the subject of "man on the street" interviews on the Steve Allen Show. As Henderson his life is infinitely wiser, richer and more worthwhile.

Ferguson doubtless never heard of Van Cliburn, the young American pianist who recently won the Tchaikovsky competition in Moscow. But Henderson knows him well, has encouraged him in his career. As musical director of the Allen Show, he phoned him in Moscow after he won the com-

petition and said, in effect, how about appearing on the program when he returned home?

"There was a moment of silence that might have been caused by a bad connection, but probably wasn't," Henderson recalled the other day. "Then Cliburn was a little merry at the expense we paid him on the old 'Tonight' show. In those days when we didn't have any budget to speak of and Cliburn was a most promising student Steve and I paid him 75 bucks to appear. I also believe I took him to dinner."

To come right out with it, Cliburn will appear on the Allen Show Sunday and play the last movement of Tchaikovsky's famed Piano Concerto. Henderson's bearded lips are sealed on the amount he will receive, but a wise guess from trade sources is that it will run about 100 times the amount he received on his previous TV appearance on the "Tonight" show.

Because there's as much of the artist as the popular performer in Henderson it's natural to ask him if he'd change places with Cliburn today.

"In one word," he replied, "never." When he comes home he faces the grimmest test any man can face. He faces the New York critics. He must have good re-

views in New York. His greatest ally in the contest for musical longevity is his youth."
