

# Tighe Cleared By Brass

DETROIT (AP) — Manager Jack Tighe had a vote of confidence from the front office today while his Detroit Tigers were wallowing in a six-game losing streak.

Club President Harvey E. Hansen declared "Tighe is not going to be crucified by the fans and the Detroit Tiger management is not going to be influenced and pressured by fans and newspapers."

He said the talkative sophomore pilot has done "a good job under the circumstances."

The letter-writers have been hush of late, demanding that Tighe be ousted. Newspapers and radio stations have had large numbers of letters and calls from disgruntled fans and one group has adopted the slogan "Get rid of Tighe by the Fourth of July."

"The second-guessers have been pretty busy," said Hansen, "reflecting on the losing streak that matches the club's poorest string of performances during all of the 1957 season."

"I don't know of another manager in the major leagues who has had more to contend with this year than Jack. He's had injuries galore and a lot of bad luck. Sure, people gripe when you lose. That's only natural."

"But a lot of good managers have been ruined by this silly notion that you must fire the manager when the club is going poorly. Too many managements — I mean the top brass — have allowed themselves to be pressured into drastic moves rather than to rely on their own judgment."

Hansen said directors of the club have never discussed the possibility of removing Tighe, whose Tigers have lost more games than any other American League club.

Hansen was interviewed during Detroit's sixth straight loss yesterday and during the talk he looked up just in time to see Baltimore's Bob Nieman hit his second straight home run over the left field barrier.

"There," he said, "you can't blame Jack for that. He can't hit and pitch for his players."

## Giles Warns Duster Pitches

CINCINNATI, Ohio (AP) — National League restrictions against the use of the so-called "dusters" may be strengthened, according to league president Warren Giles.

Giles revealed that the current rule is under study when he announced receipt of a telegram from Manager Fred Haney of the Milwaukee Braves. Haney's telegram denied that he had questioned Giles' personal bravery or integrity but added, "The umpires are not enforcing the rule as it should be and the league president should do something about it."

"Haney told me this in two different conversations," said Giles. "He and other managers may be assured that the rule will be strictly enforced. The rule itself may need some change and we are studying that possibility now."

The Klamath Union, Grants Pass, Medford, Ashland and Crater high varsity track squads will take to the cinderpaths at 11 o'clock Saturday morning at Grants Pass in the annual 6 A-1 district meet where they will compete for the right to enter the state meet the following weekend at Corvallis.

Entrants in the state competition are qualified on an individual basis as the first and second place finishers in 13 of the 14 district events are granted berths. In the 800 relay the first two four man teams will go on to the state test. The winner of the state title will be the school which has amassed the most total points.

In 1957 the Pelicans placed four men in the state meet off their performances in the district clash. This year coach Len Surles has six men whom he feels have an excellent chance to make the trip.

The Pel squad, which has seen numerous changes in the roster since early season, has improved considerably and is expected to turn in a better than average effort at Grants Pass.

# Today's Sport Parade Duren Shows Signs Of Top Relief Stars

NEW YORK (UP) — Verner Letty Gomez, a great pitcher with the New York Yankees through the '30's and into the '40's, had a ready answer when somebody once asked him why he quit pitching.

"I had to," he grinned. "Johnny Murphy's arm gave out." Gomez, also known as "Goofy," wasn't being zany when he made that reply. For Murphy was a great relief pitcher whose ability to come out of the bullpen and save games for tiring starters played a major part in forging the Yankee legend.

The relief pitcher, on the whole is the unsung hero of baseball. But give a team a good one and the pennant prospects are brightened perceptibly.

Standouts include such as Jim Constanly, who appeared in a record 74 games for the 1950 flag-winning Phillies, and Hugh Casey and Clem Labine, whose late-inning talents allowed each to wrap up a pair of pennants for the Dodgers.

Which brings us to Rinold (Rine) Duren, the 29-year-old flame thrower from Cazenovia, Wis., who already has saved six games for the Yankees this season as of Tuesday.

Duren is a six foot, two inch 200-pounder who throws the ball with blazing speed. Compounding his effectiveness, he is near-sighted. This means that, when he squints through glasses which look like two lenses from the Mt. Palomar telescope, the batters take a very wary toehold.

Being extremely wild kept him out of the majors for years. It is no fable that he hit two men waiting in the on-deck circle while he was in the Texas League. His teammates call him
