Oregon Cities To Partake In May Car Safety Program

"A safety check of your car is insurance that acts to prevent trouble rather than ease the burden after an accident," the Oregon Traffic Safety Commission said today.

At least 15 Oregon cities, most of them population centers of the state, will take part in the national safety check program in May. The objective of the program is to encourage motorists to maintain vehicles in safe driving condition and to have them safety-checked periodically. It is sponsored nationally by the Inter-industry Highway Safety Committee and Look Magazine.

The safety check lanes will be operated by civic groups with local mechanics donating their time to make the vehicle inspection. Even though a free safety-check may not be available to many motorists, the commission urges every car owner to have his car checked by a garage man.

Dates for the vehicle safety checks in the participating cities are: Portland, May 17 and 24; St. Helens, May 17; Grants Pass, May 20-21; Albany, May 22-23; Corvallis, May 22-23; Klamath Falls, May 23-24; McMinnville, May 23-24; Medford, May 23-24; and Pendleton, Prineville, Salem and Tillamook, all May 24.

Oregon City will hold its safety check on June 21. Weston, Stayton and Cottage Grove are planning teen-age vehicle safety checks, but no dates have been announced. Bend and Redmond are tentatively planning safety checks. Eugene held its vehicle inspection on May 10.

The number of cars on the highways during the next few weeks will increase greatly because of the number of long weekends and vacations, the commission reminded, and while all highway dangers

cannot be foreseen, a mechanically safe vehicle is one precaution that can be taken by every driver.

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The Red Cross Reports

Editor's Note: A monthly report on activities of the Klamath Basin Chapter of the American Red Cross, compiled in the local Red Cross office and submitted by Mrs. Joy Rolph is to be published in the Herald and News under the heading, "The Red Cross Reports." The following is a report for April.

Seventy six pints of whole blood furnished by the Red Cross were used in April for the sick and injured hospitalized in Klamath Falls. Users included residents of Malin, Beatty, Klamath Falls, Sacramento, Tulelake, Chiloquin, Chemult, Redding and Keno.

This total, according to Mrs. Hugh Swaney, chairman of the Red Cross savings program, represents a savings in money to the users of \$1,500 as compared with the cost of 76 pints of blood procured through commercial sources.

Mrs. Arlie Mae Johnson, swimming instructor, taught a class in advanced and 22 standard first aid students in Bonanza during the month. One hundred and ninety four Klamath Union High School students completed a standard first aid course taught by Ella Redkey. Gary Price taught one class of advanced students with five receiving certificates. Ernest Hardman completed instruction for 13 standard first aid students at Crescent, Oregon, and Mrs. Dorothy Suber, a class of three in the advanced course. All instructors serve the Red Cross in a volunteer capacity. Ken Elliott is chairman.

The spring training program at the KUHS pool, completed a senior lifesaving schedule for 27, taught by Linda Hancock, Marie Johnson, Wesley Sine, Ella Redkey and Arlie Mae Johnson. Miss Redkey also completed a water safety instructor refresher course.
