OUT OF DOORS with Field & Stream

This is a big weekend for anglers in the high lakes country, especially in this locality as the summer trout season's "second" opening is scheduled Saturday when the state's high lakes and several favorite streams get their first action.

Of main interest here is the opening of Williamson and Wood rivers. Also the lake fishermen all over the state will be pointing towards Diamond Lake.

Every year local fishermen can boast several tales of the lunkers caught in the Williamson and Wood. And these stories will start again Saturday. Both streams should produce well on bait and spinning lures with some of the big ones expected to fall victim to anglers.

The Wood is still a little bit high, but the water condition shouldn't affect the opening weekend's success too much. The Williamson, a little above average, is expected to produce regardless of water conditions—for the first day or so.

Diamond Lake, where between 10,000 and 15,000 fishermen tried to find room to drop their line last year on opening day, is in for another "gold rush" opener. While the number of fish taken from the lake is not overly large, the number and the yards of line and the gallons of gas used to propel the boats opening weekend are expected to be too numerous to count.

To the north, East and Paulina lakes, popular spots for weekend and vacationing anglers, are expected to get a heavy play Saturday and Sunday. Both spots usually give off with limit catches to experienced fishermen on the opening days. Trolling may take a back seat to those who prefer still fishing here.

Other small lakes in the Cascades will open Saturday and will be getting spotty play, depending upon the snow level in many places.

Concerned for years over the amount of litter that has been daily thrown into Diamond Lake by thoughtless fishermen, the Forest Service is planning to sponsor a "Keep Diamond Lake Clean" campaign starting with the 1958 season opening, Saturday. This announcement was made recently by Vondis E. Miller, forest supervisor of the Umpqua National Forest.

A litter bag in every boat on the lake will be the objective with the Diamond Lake Resort cooperating fully by placing one in every boat rented and making them conspicuously available for sale at nominal cost at both the resort and south-end stores.

Garbage cans or barrels will be placed at each boat dock and landing for litter bag depositors with appropriate signs calling attention to them, Miller said.

Complete cooperation of folks using Diamond Lake is expected in this "Keep Diamond Lake Clean" program as it will result in cleaner fishing water and a better chance of hooking a trout instead of a paper plate or other pieces of litter, Miller pointed out that such a program should quickly meet with the popular support of the fishermen since they are the ones who use the lake, and will benefit from it themselves.

Reports from the lake this week indicate there will be plenty of open area—free of snow—for campers. The road to the resort is open and the snow is leaving the grounds rapidly.

Forecasts from other points: Klamath River continued to be good over the past week. Fly fishermen are beginning to take their toll of nice sized rainbows. Worms are still the big fish-getter. The 4,600 legal sized trout dumped a week ago by the game commission liberation forces should be completely accustomed to the

Harvey Reaney of OTL, picked up a 15-incher that weighed just under a pound when cleaned. The largest of Jim Murphy's limit was 13 inches. Another lake visitor, Hector Bach caught the largest trout which went a little better than 16 inches and weighed a pound and a quarter after being cleaned.

Spencer Creek does not open this weekend. The opening date of Spencer Creek is July 1. Anglers are warned not to beat the opening day.

Robideaux Landing at Crane Prairie Reservoir announced this week that they would be loaded up with boats and other supplies for anglers interested in fishing the popular water opening week.

Mays Raps Twelfth Home Run Of Season

The Giants needed a couple of transcontinental vans to move their franchise West and along comes Willie Mays now bent on moving the World Series to San Francisco all alone.

Don't bet he won't get the job done—especially at that break-neck home run rate and .419 batting pace he's traveling.

Giants 5, Reds 4

Willie teed off for his 12th homer of the season in the 10th inning Wednesday night to beat Cincinnati, 5-4, stretch the Giants' winning streak to five games and increase their National League lead to 2 1/2 games.

Mays, whose sacrifice fly in the seventh inning tied the score, now has clouted 11 homers in his last 12 games. His game-winning clout off reliever Hal Jeffcoat also moved him a step closer to Ralph Kiner's league record of 16 homers in a single month.

For good measure, Willie also threw in a pair of singles in the victory that was credited to 40-year-old reliever Marv Grissom.

Phils 1, Cards 0

Robin Roberts wasn't exactly standing around counting his change either in Philadelphia's 1-0 squaker over St. Louis.

Roberts checked the Cards or seven hits and drove in the only run of the game with an eighth-inning double. He struck the blow off Sam Jones to break a string of 17 consecutive innings in which the Phils had failed to score. Jones had a no-hitter until the sixth and a string of 16 scoreless innings until Roberts nailed down his fourth victory with his eighth inning two-bagger.

Bums 2, Braves 1

The Los Angeles Dodgers, giving evidence of evacuating the cellar, climbed to within a game of seventh place with a 2-1 win over the faltering Milwaukee Braves.

Gino Cimoli slammed a two-run homer in the first inning off Bob Rush and although Rush gave up only one more hit before he was lifted in the seventh, the damage was done. Don Drysdale posted his second victory although Clem Labine had to bail him out in the seventh when the Braves threatened.

Cubs 5, Bucs 1

Southpaw Taylor Phillips and Walt Moryn helped the Chicago Cubs snap a four-game losing streak with a 5-1 decision over the Pittsburgh Pirates. Phillips doled out five hits to gain his second victory while Moryn hit his seventh homer and drove in three runs. Bob Porterfield was the loser.

The runaway-minded Yankees rolled to their eighth straight triumph and increased their American League lead to 7 1/2 games with a 5-2 verdict over the Chicago White Sox.

Minnie Mino's sixth home run of the season in the 12th inning enabled the Cleveland Indians to nip the Boston Red Sox, 3-2. Mino's hit his homer off reliever Murray Wall. Dick Tomaneck went all the way for the Tribe, allowing only five hits, including Jackie Jensen's ninth homer in the ninth inning which tied the score.
