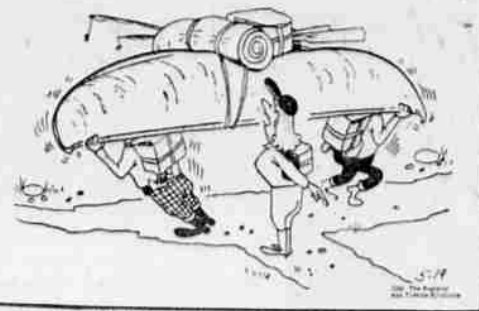

Integration, Segregation War Nears End In Virginia

OMAHA — The integration versus segregation battle in Virginia is headed for a showdown this fall. The state Parents' Teachers organization is awaiting that showdown helplessly and almost hopelessly. "We'll try to handle what happens this fall just as it develops," said Mrs. W. W. Kavanaugh, president of the Virginia Congress of Parents and Teachers. "Our task is to keep the public schools open, to insure that our children get an education. It's difficult to stick to a middle line, but that is what we must do." The Supreme Court Monday refused to consider a last-ditch appeal that would prevent Negro students from entering Arlington County white schools next fall. The state administration has threatened to close the schools under anti-integration laws that say state funds are to be shut off if integration occurs. Mrs. Kavanaugh spoke out today after the conclusion of the 62nd annual convention of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers. The national body took no stand on the integration question this year. The Virginia PTA may be split right down the middle. Mrs. Kavanaugh said the group had members on both sides. "The tragic thing is what's going to happen to our children, both Negro and white," she said. "What's going to happen to them if and when the schools are closed? The children are going to be hurt, they're going to be hurt emotionally. Our job is to try to keep the schools open, that's all we can do. We can't fight legal battles, we have to concentrate on getting the children educated." "If the PTA in Virginia is split, all our strength would be dissipated. We would be worth nothing."

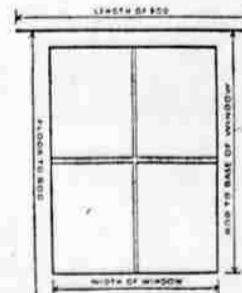

Polio Victim Works Daily As Small Motors Mechanic

Enterprising is the word for Dale Carter, 27, who is finishing his first year in structural design at Oregon Technical Institute. Three weeks ago he applied at J. W. Kerns, Oregon Ltd., 734 South Sixth, and was hired to be the 11th repairman on the Kerns staff to operate the small motors repair department. There are also four master mechanics in the tractor shop, two farm machinery repairmen, two handling radio and TV repair, one each on washing machines and pump repair. There was a need for one person to be assigned to small machinery, particularly since the firm has been assigned the franchise for Clinton Motors recently. "Carter's smile and willing hands deny the fact that he has been in a wheel chair for the last eight years," Ben Kerns commented.

Final Murder Talks Today

LINCOLN, Neb. — Charles Starkweather, who says he is betting he'll be sent to the electric chair, listens today to the final arguments in his murder trial. The case probably will go to the jury early this afternoon.

As testimony drew to a close yesterday, Starkweather offered to make his bet that he'd die in the electric chair.

He leaned forward and to psychiatrist Dr. John Steinman, a defense witness, said, "I'll bet you a pack of cigarettes that I get a battery charge."

Later Dr. Steinman said "battery charge" was Starkweather's term for the chair.

A jury of eight women and four men will decide the fate of Starkweather, who admits involvement in 11 slayings and admits he shot Robert Jensen, 17, for whose death he is on trial.

The defense pleaded Starkweather innocent by reason of insanity.

Carter was born at Lebanon, Oregon. In 1950, the year after he was graduated from high school, he was married in July and in August contracted polio. Within two days he had lost the use of his legs. The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis came to the rescue with direct assistance and rehabilitation at this point and Dale learned to get about with the assistance of a wheel chair. The handicapped lad was 19, married and untrained in business.

His father set him up in a small bicycle shop where he put into practice his knack for handling machinery. Time passed and the business expanded to include small motors and repairs on other machines. The family grew, also, and the Carters now have two boys.

Last year, Dale, upon the advice of the Oregon State Rehabilitation Councilor, registered as a student at Oregon Tech. In the field of structural design he hopes to better support his family through the training he is receiving in new skills at OTI.

In the meantime, he works every day after school in his own little department at Kerns store and puts in full days on Saturday. With the closing of the current school year, he will be on at the store on a full time basis, servicing small motors, until the start of the fall term at Oregon Tech.
