The annual Western Regional Intercollegiate Rodeo Championships open Saturday afternoon at the Klamath County Fairgrounds in the first of a two-day program that will feature the top collegiate riders and ropers in the western states.

Open Lead Amazes Tyro Tom Jacobs

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (UP)—Young Tom Jacobs, Whitier, Calif., who admitted he was somewhat surprised, sported a two-stroke edge Friday at the start of the second round of the \$22,000 Kansas City Open.

The 23-year-old Jacobs, a tournament rider for only a year, equaled the Hillcrest Course record of 64, 8-under-par with a brilliant opening 18 holes Thursday.

He canned a 20-foot eagle putt on the fourth hole and went on to bang six birdies for his superb performance. The course standard was set by Johnny Bulla in 1946.

Appearing slightly dazed by his own brilliance, Jacobs remarked, "It was one of those beautiful days. I played well, putted well and everything just clicked right."

Two veteran tee tourists, PGA champion Lionel Hebert, Lafayette, La., and Dow Finsterwald, Tequesta, Fla., were two shots away from Jacobs, who has earned only \$3,105 this season.

Hebert, winner of the Tucson Open, described his 66 as "my best round in some time." He hit long accurate drives and deadly irons to leave himself several birdie chances.

His only flaw was a short muffed putt which would have given him an eagle on the par five 13th hole. He produced three birdies on each nine.

Finsterwald, who has picked up more than \$10,000 in prizes without a title this season, peeled one stroke from par on the first nine and beat the back side with a string of five birdies.

Despite light showers, 31 players whipped the 6,668-yard layout's par 72.

Bunched at 67 three shots off the pace were Ernie Vossler, Midland, Tex.; Don Whit, Alameda, Calif.; and Gary Player, 22-year-old from Johannesburg, South Africa, who lost by a stroke to Sammy Snead in the Greenbrier Open last week.

Four other pros were still in contention with 68. They were Billy Maxwell, Odessa, Tex., winner of the Memphis Invitational last week; Bob Rosburg, Palo Alto, Calif.; Bill Parker, Tulsa, Okla.; and Bill Collins, Grossinger, N.Y.

America's Cup Tops To Boat Enthusiasts

NEW YORK (UP)—Promoters of such competitions as mah-jong, curling and clam digging long have accused Fearless Fray of complacency toward these sporting classics but it's time to make a stand when such scurrilous charges are made anent the America's Cup.

As a sportsman Old Fearless is considered in a gin rummy class with such masters as Lloyd Mangrum and Craig Wood and, when it comes to galloping dominoes, the Indianapolis crowd will testify I am strictly front row.

With pardonable pride, it also must be said that here is one of the best fun-go hitters on Third Avenue.

It must be admitted, however, that yachting always has left me cold and slightly seasick.

But there is no personal animosity in this corner toward the America's Cup races to be sailed off Newport in September.

HAS LONG HISTORY
By way of explaining one man's sea-going insouciance it should be admitted that nobody can be blamed for regarding this event as a historical pageant which belongs to the drama department.

It is practically an off-shoot of the Boston Tea Party.

In the first place, it gained its greatest fame through the tenacious if unsuccessful exploits of a British tea merchant named Thomas Lipton. Sir Thomas, whose picture you can see in any grocery store, became perturbed over the fact that Britain hadn't been able to recapture a cup it put up for grabs in 1951—and lost, so far irrevocably, to a band of Yankee sailors.

Britain, ruler of the bounding main since Sir Francis Drake gave up bowling, had been trying to get back the cup ever since. So in 1899 Sir Thomas

took his first crack at the chore. No dice. He took four more swipes at it, the last in 1930. Still no dice.

LOST MILLIONS
When he gave up the galleon, his five yachts, known as Shamrock I, etc., had cost him \$15,000,000. The cup is worth \$280. So you can see that there is more here than meets the eye.

The British, who made their last bid in 1937, feel they have a fine chance this time around. The rules were amended in 1956 so that the challenger doesn't have to sail here "on her own bottom." Which means that, instead of battling the Atlantic, the yacht will be shipped to the United States. The minimum waterline length also was reduced from 65 to 44 feet, which saves quite a few pounds as well as ounces.

An event designed to promote international sportsmanship, the America's Cup, alas, hasn't always done so. James Ashbury, British challenger in 1870 and 1871, threatened to bring his lawyer with him. The Earl of Dunraven did just that in 1893 and 1895, trying to prove charges that there was unfair play.

The British press, in applauding the new challenger, blames past reversals on failure to tune their craft "in which Americans are masters of the art because they take so much trouble," and admit that their helmsmen "have wilted under the strain of the cup series, particularly in the glare of American publicity."

So they're heading here once again with a craft named the "Sceptre" and after 107 years it's time they got to say "Bottoms up." And that kind of yachting, it should be added, is a real pleasure.

Gibson Said Not Too Super

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—There is no "super-woman" in the world of women's tennis these days—despite the fact that Althea Gibson now holds both the Wimbledon and U.S. championships.

Take the word of slender young Beverly Baker Fleitz, here to participate in a big sports clinic at Palo Alto this weekend.

"Miss Gibson is a fine tennis player," said Mrs. Fleitz, mother of daughters aged five and one year. "But she doesn't overshadow the rest of us like Helen Wills did, or Maureen Collen."

NOT AS RUGGED
The freckle-faced star said that the competition in the U.S. championships last year weren't as rugged as usual.

"For instance," she recalled, "Shirley Fry, who lives in Australia now, didn't compete. And she never has lost a match to Althea. And I've played Althea three times and never lost to her."

After her sweep through Wimbledon and the U.S. championships, the public started to think that Miss Gibson stood head and shoulders over the present group. But it appears her opponents figure she is just another one of the girls.

Mrs. Fleitz thinks the U.S. Wightman Cup team this year is a good one, with Miss Gibson, Dorothy Knode, Karol Fageros and Mimi Arnold.

"Louise Brough and I were asked to be members," she said, "but we turned it down. I didn't want to leave my children for that long." She plans to compete in the U.S. championships, however.

Asked to comment on the furor raised by Miss Fageros' plans to wear those gold lame panties at Wimbledon, Mrs. Fleitz replied:

ENOUGH SAID
"I guess there has been enough said about them. I'll just say this. I think that women tennis players should stick to something on the ordinary side. Something that is comfortable, but won't attract too much attention—while still being in good taste."

With Mrs. Fleitz, and also here to take part in the big clinic at Palo Alto (sponsored by Sports Illustrated) were Vicki Draves, the former Olympic diving champion, and Marjorie Law, a champion softball pitcher from Phoenix, Ariz.

Each of the feminine athletes is the mother of two children—and all find that they still love sports, but refuse to give up too much time with the "kids" to make long tours around the world.

Giles' Threat Called 'Foul' By Opposers

LOS ANGELES (UP)—A statement by National League President Warren Giles that the league would take "immediate steps" to move the Dodgers to another city if the Chavez Ravine referendum is defeated drew claims of "foul" today from opponents of the contract.

They interpreted it as an 11th-hour move to swing sentiment in favor of the Dodger issue.

Los Angeles voters decide June 3 on whether to approve the contract which would provide the Dodgers with some 300 acres of land in Chavez Ravine for a permanent 50,000-seat park.

Councilman John C. Holland, a leading foe of the Chavez Ravine proposal, said the statement by Giles was the "last desperate threat of a frightened group of greedy men. If the people of Los Angeles bow to this threat, it will be to the everlasting shame of the city."

Giles, in Cincinnati, issued a 600-word statement to Southern California reporters covering the team in which he said he would "recommend to the league that we take immediate steps to study ways and means of moving the Dodger franchise to another city." If the contract proposal is beaten.

"If by some chance," he continued, "the voters of Los Angeles should disapprove the contract, the National League will take it as an expression that conditions exist in Los Angeles which indicate a lack of enthusiasm for major league baseball," said Giles.

The National League president said "overwhelming approval of the referendum will be the strongest indication we can have" that major league baseball would succeed here after "the novelty of big league ball has gone."

The contract between the Dodgers and the city of Los Angeles for Chavez Ravine was signed before the National League authorized the move to California. But opponents, including members of the council and some supervisors, gathered sufficient signatures on petitions to force the referendum.

Dodger owner Walter O'Malley, who finally managed to locate the club on a temporary basis in the Coliseum, had little to say when advised of Giles' statement. "The Dodgers want to stay out of politics and we wish politics were not involved with baseball at this time. We have our hands full now with many problems, on and off the field. This presents still another."

Men's Softball Play Postponed

Thursday night's Men's Softball League action was postponed due to rain and winds that hit here last night.
