

Comiskey Asks More Effort From Chisox

CHICAGO (AP)—It's going to take extra effort on the part of the players to get the Chicago White Sox headed upward in the American League, Club Vice President Chuck Comiskey admits.

"I'm not going to mention names, but except for seven or eight holler guys out of 25, I think a little more effort is needed," said Comiskey. "I still think we are a better balanced club than we were last year when we finished second. I still like the trades we made and I think we've strengthened ourselves even if we did have to part with a fellow like Minnie Minoso."

"I don't expect cheering sections like in college, but I do expect a little more liveliness—and this is true of the guys on the

bench. Let them do a little more yelling."

After watching the Sox drop two games to New York, Comiskey said he has known all along that "we can't match Yankees in power, but we can win by every other means. We've got speed, defense and the best pitching staff in the league."

"Take a look at the statistics. New York barely tops us in homers, triples and doubles. But we've got 30 or so more bases on balls. We've been on base that much more, but we've been in last place."

"We've got the ability, but we're not using it."

"All year we've had too many mistakes by fellows who shouldn't be making them. We've known we would be in a lot of low scoring games. With a little more effort we would not have lost so many of them."

Comiskey said he can't see any player deals and is about convinced that the Sox will go along with what they have.

"We played great ball in spring training, and we can do it again," he added. "Some of our guys just have to wake up."

The awakening may have started yesterday when the Sox broke a four-game losing spell with a 5-1 victory over Baltimore.

USC Picked To Capture Track Wins

BERKELEY (UP)—The mighty Trojans of Southern California, nationally supreme in track and field for most of the time during the last quarter century, go after their 17th win in the last 18 years in the Pacific Coast Conference meeting opening at Berkeley today.

With world record holder Charley Dumas in the high jump and the great Rink Babka in the discus leading the way, coach Jess Mortenson's crew isn't expected to have too much trouble. Today's competition opens at 4:30 p.m., with most of the major conflicts scheduled for Saturday.

The only competition for the Trojans is expected to come from Rafer Johnson, who'll be competing for UCLA. The decathlon star is entered in eight events: both sprints, both hurdles, the shot put, broad jump, discus and javelin. However, it is probable that he'll not compete in more than four. He has a good chance to win in three: the high hurdles, javelin and broad jump.

BOWDEN SKIPS MILE

Some of the shine has been taken off the mile run with the announcement that Don Bowden, Cal's 3:58.7 runner, will skip that event and compete only in the half mile and the relay. If he runs in the half, he'll have plenty of opposition, with Norm Lloyd of Stanford having a better time this year at 1:49.2. Bowden has a 1:40.8; and Ernie Cunliffe of Stanford has 1:50.2.

There are five conference champions defending. These are: Terry Tobacco, Washington, in the 440; Bowden in the half; Max Truex of USC, a virtual clinch in the two-mile; Bob Lawson, USC, in the high and low hurdles; and Rink Babka of USC, who'll be competing for his third consecutive conference crown in the discus.

Chances for records in the track events took a bad turn when the weatherman forecast possible "scattered showers." Light rains blanketed the San Francisco area all day yesterday.

BEST CHANCE

Best chance for a world mark appeared to be in the discus, where Babka already has an unofficial mark of 198 feet, 10 inches this year, compared with Fortune Gordien's listed mark of 194 feet, 6 inches.

Of course, if Bowden should happen to run in the mile, there is a good chance he could be pushed to a new record there. Listed in that event are Norm Lloyd, the Canadian running for Stanford, with a 4:05.3; Wes McLeod, USC, 4:07.8; Jim Grelle, Oregon, 4:07.9 and Bob Shankland, USC, 4:07.9.

Or, if Truex could be pushed in the two-mile event, he might crack his own intercollegiate mark of 8:54.8. Maury Graves of Stanford, with a 9:04.9, has the second best mark.

Most of the finals are slated for Saturday.

Rademacher Signs For Folley Scrap

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Heavyweight boxer Pete Rademacher, the 1936 Olympic Games champion whose first professional fight was against world champion Floyd Patterson, is ready after a year for his second pro skirmish.

Matchmaker George Parnasus sent ahead Friday with plans for Rademacher to meet ranking contender Zora Folley of Chandler, Ariz., in a 10-round bout here in July.

Rademacher, who was knocked out by Patterson at Seattle last summer, talking long distance from his home in Columbus, Ga., said:

"I'm five times a better man than I was against Patterson."

In what way?

"Insurance, ring savvy, know-how. And I want to prove by beating Folley that I'm worthy to fight Patterson again for the title."

Rademacher and Folley fought twice as amateurs. Folley beat Pete in the Golden Gloves in Seattle and lost to him in the National AAU finals in Boston in 1953.

Rademacher said he saw the Folley-Eddie Machen bout on television in April. "They both have the same styles so it wasn't unusual that it was a stinkeroo," Pete noted.

He said he has been training for the last seven months and stepped up his program two months ago.

Parnasus said the exact date of the bout would be announced June 9.

Each fighter accepted terms and a guarantee of \$35,000 apiece or 30 per cent of the gate.

Oregon, OSC Clash Today

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP)—Oregon and Oregon State meet here Friday night in the first two baseball games of a four-game series that could decide the Northern Division title in the Pacific Coast Conference.

The teams will meet in another doubleheader at Eugene Saturday, closing out the regular season for both schools.

Oregon now heads to league with a 9-3 record while OSC and Washington State, the other squads with a chance for the title, have 8-4 records.

Oregon coach Don Kirch said he expects to use Don Lane and Ron Whitaker, his top pitchers, in the Friday twin-bill.

Pitching stars Gary More and Ray Lundie are expected to see action for OSC.

Pro Boss Sees Big Golf Step

NEW YORK (AP)—The tournament boss of golfing pros predicted today that within five years there would be two circuits — instead of one — with more than two million dollars in prize money.

"The day is past that mothers have to advise their offspring not to take up a golf career for fear of starving to death," said Ed Carter, tournament director of the Professional Golfers Assn.

"This thing now is getting so big we can hardly handle it."

Carter referred to the PGA circuit, which he said now numbers 87 tournaments with prize money totaling \$1,350,000.

"Whereas 20 years ago only four or five could make a living on the tough tour and 10 years ago only a dozen could do it, I'd say now there are 40 players collecting \$10,000 or better a year," Carter said.

"This doesn't include prize money alone, but endorsements, sporting goods connections and other things."

"In a few years this number will be greatly increased. Our hope is to have two road shows running concurrently and we also are experimenting with a minor league in golf."

"While the top pros are playing for \$60,000, say, in Chicago, the lesser boys will be shooting for \$10,000 or \$15,000 at a place like Jackson, Miss., or Spartanburg, Pa."

Carter was in town for the announcement yesterday of a \$30,000 PGA-sponsored tournament at a million-dollar resort area being developed at Dorado, Puerto Rico, by Laurence Rockefeller. The tournament dates are Dec. 3-7.

Duren Stifles Complaints Over NY Release of Martin

DETROIT (AP)—There were complaints last year when the New York Yankees traded off firebrand Billy Martin, but Rindolf Duren — the unknown in the seven-player swap — has them down to a whisper now.

The rookie relief pitcher is being touted as a right-handed Joe Page although his first big league season is less than six weeks old.

The 29-year-old fastballer got credit for his first major league pitching triumph yesterday as the Yankees edged Detroit 5-4 and plucked the Tigers into the American League basement. Duren yielded only a pinch home run by Gus Zernial in three innings and struck out five.

Some Yankee fans complained that General Manager George Weiss hastily traded off Martin in a punishment move prompted by the infielder's part in "the Copa incident." Weiss sent Woody Held, Bob Marlyn and Ralph Terry along with Martin to the Kansas City Athletics for Harry Simpson, Jim Pisoni and Duren.

Duren has made nine relief appearances for the runaway Yankees and has yielded only two runs in 12 1-3 innings.

"He's pretty good, ain't he?" asked manager Casey Stengel.

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Burdette Forgets '57 World Series Glory

MILWAUKEE (AP)—The Milwaukee Braves' Lew Burdette, who didn't take up this season where he left off last, says others may be thinking back to his World Series heroics over the New York Yankees, but he isn't.

"I don't think about those three series victories at all," said the gangly right-hander after coasting to a 9-3 decision over the ambitious San Francisco Giants last night. "This is another year and that's all I'm thinking about."

"You can't live on last year's accomplishments," he continued when his listeners voiced their doubts. "At least not for long, at any rate."

The subject came up because of Lew's rather mediocre 4-3 won-loss record and 4.11 earned run average.

Last night's easy pickings was his first triumph in 15 days and four starts and only his third route-going performance in eight starts. One of his victories came in relief.

"There's been nothing wrong with me that a few runs wouldn't cure," he said, by way of shrugging off the statistics. "If I had had nine runs to work with earlier in the season no one would have thought twice about me because my record would have been better. You've just got to nurse what they give you and sometimes it's not enough."

Burdette's three losses have been by scores of 2-0 and 11-7 to Cincinnati and 6-2 to Philadelphia. In two other games in which he was not the pitcher of record, he surrendered two runs in six innings to the Chicago Cubs and four runs in 4 1-3 innings to Cincinnati. His first three victories were by scores of 6-1 over Philadelphia 4-3 over the Cubs in relief and 9-2 over St. Louis.

Burdette said his arm feels good and he's not doing anything differently from last season when he posted a 17-9 record.

"Pitching is a business," he said. "If you have one good year in business you don't quit, sit back and take it easy. If you do, your business goes to pot. It's the same with pitching."

"All I'm trying to do is to be good enough so we can get into the series."

WICHITA, Kas. (AP)—Carlton Willey pitched a no-hitter last night as Wichita defeated Louisville 6-0 in the American Assn. The Milwaukee farmhand allowed only two men to get on base, both on walks and fanned 10.

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
