Sen. William F. Knowland today headed back to California today for a weekend of campaigning before the June 3 primary.

Fair To Open Blacktop Bids

TULELAKE — Bids will be opened at 7:30 p.m. June 4 in the fair office for blacktopping 102,000 square feet of roads and parking areas within the area of the Tulelake-Butte Valley Fairgrounds. Announcement of plans to complete the work before opening date of the fair on September 6, was made today by William Whitaker, fair manager.

Other improvements to be made include arena lighting to provide for outdoor sports events. Eight poles placed adjacent to the grandstand will provide for banks of 12, 1500 watt lights each. A flat 3/4 mile race track is also to be completed this summer in preparation for children's horse races during the horse show. Races will be an added feature this year.

The fair board, chairmanned by Arnold Criss, Macdoel, meeting Wednesday night, May 21, approved the sum of \$13,478 for premiums for this year's fair exhibitors. The amount is \$1,000 in excess of last year.

Appointment of a successor to the late E. Webb Staunton, board member is expected momentarily.

Fair dates this year are September 6-7-8.

FFA Members Given Awards

MONTAGUE — Several awards were presented to members of the Future Farmers of America during the recent parent son banquet held by the organization at the Montague auditorium.

Top recognition went to Phillip Robustelli of Montague, a senior at Yreka High School, who was awarded the FFA foundation medal as the chapter star farmer, and the California banker's award as the outstanding FFA member.

His younger brother, Pete Robustelli, was awarded a foundation medal as a farm mechanic winner in the local chapter. Honorary chapter farmer awards were presented to Wallace Lemos and Ed Mathews in recognition of their outstanding service to the rural youth in the vicinity of Yreka.

is unopposed for the California Republican gubernatorial nomination, will attend a breakfast reception and news conference tomorrow morning in San Mateo.

He is to visit the fairgrounds and a barbecue at San Jose that afternoon and on Sunday is to fly to Riverside for a picnic and meetings in Los Angeles County.

Knowland said he intended to keep the "right to work" issue before California voters until the general election Nov. 4. He said he also would keep on talking about the water deadlock and California's fiscal problems.

The State Department of Industrial Relations' division of labor statistics says it has reviewed 1,350 labor contracts covering 1,393,000 California employees and found that 1,111 incorporate union shop provisions which Knowland opposes.

Rep. Clair Engle, Democrat who seeks a U.S. Senate seat, said the "right to work" issue was "created primarily" by Knowland who he said "chose to further his presidential ambitions by running for governor of California."

Unable to find any real issue to run on, he manufactured one and this is it. "It's nothing but a bucket of smoke," Engle said in Los Angeles.

Knowland, in Washington, described Vice President Nixon as "the leading contender and the only major candidate" for the 1960 Republican presidential nomination. Knowland has said he expects to serve a full four year term as governor if elected.

Alphonse Bell, chairman of the GOP state central committee, told a Republican group in San Leandro that Nixon's political stock had been boosted by the defeat suffered in Pennsylvania for Harold Stassen. He called Stassen a "lonely and unwanted symbol of anti-Nixon sentiment within the GOP."

Knowland's wife and daughters continued their "rollin' for Knowland" personal appearance tour by bus today in Imperial County.

Engle, in an address prepared for San Jose State College students, contended that Gov. Goodwin Knight was attacking Engle's record of the water question in order to disguise his ignorance of other big issues. Knight seeks the Republican senatorial nomination.

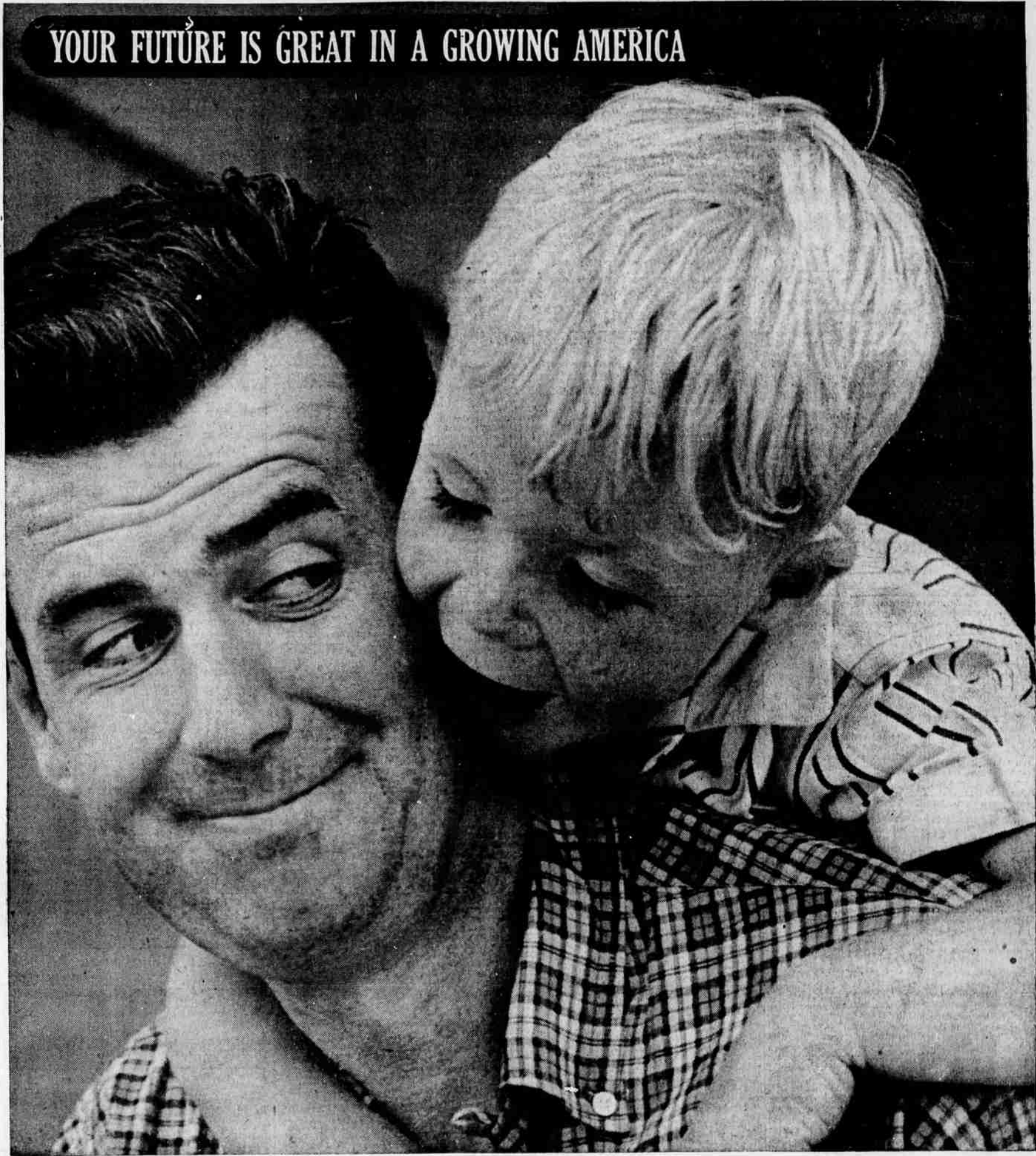
"All you hear from Goodwin Knight is a monotonous attempt to paint me as an enemy of the water rights of California," Engle said. "This is like launching an attack on a mule from the rear—where his greatest retaliatory power is lodged."

"The sad fact is that he doesn't know anything about water or he wouldn't be reading those radio speeches in which he attempts to brand as a sectionalist the man who has been responsible for over 7 million dollars worth of water properties for every part of California," continued Engle.

"In five years as governor, Goodwin Knight hasn't built a culvert nor a country ditch and he wouldn't know an irrigation ditch if he fell into it," Engle said.

Knight campaigned in San Francisco.

San Francisco Mayor George Christopher, opposing Knight for the GOP senatorial nomination, moved to Los Angeles to address service clubs and other audiences.
