Kentucky Pupils Promoted According To Book Titles

HOPKINSVILLE, Ky. (AP)—Christian County elementary pupils will get report cards this week carrying such announcements as "Promoted to Down the River Road" instead of promoted to another grade.

Promotion by book titles is part of a new plan. It abolishes the usual elementary grades one through six.

From now on youngsters will advance according to their reading level.

Their report cards will announce promotion to new readers through the equivalent of the first six grades.

"It will let youngsters advance at their own rate. And it helps prevent youngsters who don't make their early mental push from being pushed too fast, or failed," Mrs. Elizabeth Wade, county supervisor of instruction, said.

Teachers in the school system are enthusiastic about the plan. It's been tried in other schools across the nation and works well, Mrs. Wade said.

Christian County has experimented on the idea with a few classes of first and second graders for the past two years.

Starting next fall, 1,800 youngsters in all but one of the county's 18 elementary schools will be in reading levels instead of grades.

Subjects taught will be about the same as under the grade system, Mrs. Wade said.

"Bright children can have supplementary readers. They won't be moved along faster than their social group in the class unless they are definitely superior."
