

## Real Party Planned For 900 Chicago Youngsters

CHICAGO (AP)—This looks like a real party. First of all, it's all free, compliments of parents and community leaders of suburban Arlington Heights.

It's going to be an all-night, all-next-day affair.

For some 900 students, the fun starts tonight when parents open their homes to the formally attired youngsters for soft drink parties. Then off to the school prom at the Medinah Country Club for dancing until 1 a. m.

The dancers return to Arlington Heights and will find church doors open to them for changing into more casual clothes for more rounds of activities.

They'll board a 12-car train—not a regular commuter train. Two baggage cars, cleared of all mail, will have been transformed into ballrooms for dancing, complete with a combo in each.

The train will include four double-deck coaches, three diners, two streamlined coaches, and a parlor car. The train, which will travel at about 10 miles an hour, for the benefit of the dancers will arrive at Williams Bay, Wis., at about 6 a. m. The students will be taken across Lake Geneva to the George Williams College campus for breakfast.

## Arms Runners Convicted

BROWNSVILLE, Tex. (AP)—Thirty-four Cuban-Americans were convicted yesterday of conspiracy to run arms to Cuban rebels.

A U. S. District Court jury found the 35th defendant, Ecuadorian fishing boat captain Jose Bolivar Medina, innocent.

Federal Judge James V. Alfred said formal sentencing would be held Saturday.

"This case does not call for drastic punishment," he said. "However, we cannot have persons forming expeditions in this country to make war in other countries."

Arnelo G. Barron, New York, who claimed he was leader of a small band headed to fight with Cuban rebel leader Fidel Castro, quickly slipped out of the courtroom after the verdict. The others were allowed to scatter on their word they would be present for the sentencing.

Most of the men are New Yorkers in their 20s.

Medina was captain of the 60-ton vessel Orion captured by U. S. government agents a few miles off Brownsville in the Gulf of Mexico last March. On board were the men headed by Barron and some \$20,000 worth of arms and ammunition.

## Pay TV Fails In Oklahoma

BARTLESVILLE, Okla. (UP)—The nation's first pay television system has failed to make money and will be suspended June 6 pending development of some means to charge by program instead of a flat monthly fee, the president of the firm announced yesterday.

Nearly 800 persons are subscribing to the \$4.95 a month entertainment known as Telemovies, which began last September, but, Henry S. Griffing, president of Video Independent Theaters, said the system has continued to lose money.

## Anti-Sub Device Slated For Test

HONOLULU (UP)—The United States was expected to trigger a nuclear anti-submarine device today at the Eniwetok test site, informed sources reported here.

The sources said the underwater test was scheduled to begin at 2:15 p. m. EDT, and that five warships would be used as "guinea pigs" to study the effect of the blast. The ships included three destroyers, a transport and a submarine.

The Senate authorized the use of the vessels Monday, and the Armed Services Committee reported that the tests would consist of "newly developed weapons for underwater detonation."

## Cleric Stritch Said Improved

ROME (AP)—Samuel Cardinal Stritch continued to show slight improvement today after another restful night.

His doctors' brief morning bulletin said the cardinal's condition "is tending toward slight improvement."

The 70-year-old Archbishop of Chicago suffered a stroke Monday that partially paralyzed him. He was recovering from the amputation of his right arm, caused by a blood clot.

## Graham Says Literature, Plays Need Cleaning Up

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—Witnesses who testified at a hearing on pornography yesterday — including Billy Graham — believe the best way to combat obscene literature is by a "moral cleansing" rather than by laws.

Graham and other witnesses, who included clergymen and book-sellers, generally agreed that some laws might be helpful, provided they did not interfere with freedom of the press.

"I was shocked to see what is available to young people," Graham said. "We in America have become obsessed with sex, especially the female bosom."

"Our literature, our plays on Broadway, need cleaning up. We can't do it all by legislation. We can't afford to do anything that would infringe upon the freedom of the press."

Graham said he was not prepared to recommend specific laws. However, he said he felt possession and distribution of pornographic literature should be a crime. Graham spoke before a state assembly subcommittee on pornography. Chairman of the committee was Assemblyman Louis Francis (R-San Mateo).

Graham's testimony followed that of Rabbi William Stern of Oakland's Temple Sinai and the Rev. Jerome Meyer of St. John's Roman Catholic Church in San Francisco.

Rabbi Stern said he would err on the side of "liberty and freedom" in writing laws against pornography.

"There are even some stories in the Bible which, judged by some people and dealing as they do with incest or rape, could be considered highly immoral out of context."

Rabbi Stern said he was "terribly afraid of laws that would permit people to snoop around bookstores or magazine racks and enforce standards of what we may read."

Father Meyer took a different view. He said stronger legislation to provide penalties for distributors of pornography would make its circulation "less likely to continue."
