RIVERSIDE PTA

"The home and the school are partners in human values," Mrs. Sam Ritchey told members of the Riverside PTA Tuesday, May 20, in the school cafeteria. Mrs. Ritchey was quoting Mrs. Cecil F. Garvey, National PTA vice president of Region 2, from her key-note address at the Oregon PTA Convention held at Bend in April.

The theme of the convention was "Parent-Child-Teacher — Together We Grow in Modern America." Mrs. Ritchey, reporting on the general sessions of the convention, said the results of a survey made to determine what parents and teachers expect from children were that parents expect patience first, then humor, understanding and love, fairness, kindness, then skill and knowledge and teachers expect fairness first, then firmness, patience, cheerfulness, then ability to cooperate.

Communication facilitates growth between parents and children, parents and teachers, and PTA and community. Feeling is the most basic form of communication between parent and child. A parent's feelings are communicated to the child.

Fear is the most emotional problem between parents and teachers. The oldest form of communication between parents and teachers is the report card and that is not adequate. Parent-teacher conferences are needed so that an interchange of information from home to school may be given. Parents want to know what can my child do, what does my child know, how does he feel about others, how does he feel about himself, etc.

For communication between PTA and community, the PTA should work with other community groups on legislative objects. PTA is nonpartisan but it is not non-political.

"Understanding grows through counseling" was the final address of the convention. The Rev. Troy Strong explained that counseling is not giving advice. One person can not make another person's decisions. You accept him as he is, thereby making it possible for him to accept himself. Before a person can love someone else, he must first love himself.

Mrs. Ritchey said that the Rev. Strong pointed out that "there is no such thing as an irreligious man." No man is content with himself alone. He worships something such as money, power, pleasure, etc.

The meeting was conducted by the president, Mrs. I. H. Warner. Mrs. Warner appointed Mrs. Alfred Carlson, Mrs. J. V. Wachter, and Mrs. Ritchey to audit the books.

Mrs. Art Grigg told members she had investigated to find out what the results would be if the school budget was defeated the second time. The state will not get teachers' and will not open up the schools in September. The school board can hire teachers and pay them with warrants instead of money. The warrants would cost tax payers six per cent interest and the teachers can not receive face value for warrants because they are discounted when cashed. Most teachers are not willing to sign contracts under these circumstances.

The association voted to continue the series of TV programs on juvenile problems and voted to order a subscription to the National Parent Teacher magazine for Miss Yolanda Madrigales, a teacher in Panama City, Panama.

The principal, Don Golding, announced that school will be out next Thursday, May 29, and school is scheduled to start September 8 next fall. He also announced the elementary school budget hearing will be June 2.

Mrs. Alfred Carlson announced the bloodmobile will be in Klamath Falls June 4 at the Masonic Temple from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 4:30 to 6 p.m.
