Spirits are low enough on a dreary, damp day. No need to make yourself feel any lower by knowledge that you look awful.

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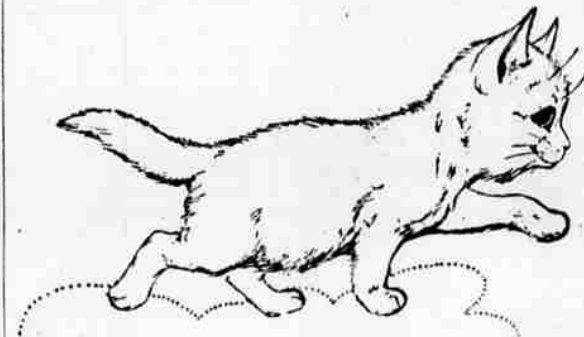
