

Owls, Cavemen Sweep Wins

Dick Hocevar Leads Tech To OCC Crown

ASHLAND—Oregon Tech's Owls made a successful defense of their Oregon Collegiate Conference track and field championship here Saturday by defeating Portland State College and three other conference members in the annual conference track meet on the Southern Oregon College campus.

Coach George Miller's Owls hosted 63½ points to nudge the very strong challenge of Portland State. The Vikings finished the day with 60½ points. Oregon College was third with 56½ points followed by Southern Oregon's 30½ and Eastern Oregon's 22.

This was the second straight conference title for Miller's Owls who won the crown last year.

Sparked by the all-around greatness of Dick Hocevar and speedy Bob Brown, the Owls dominated the hurdle events and picked up enough points in the sprints and field events to come through on top. Hocevar was picked as the conference's outstanding athlete after the Owls thinned scored 14½ individual points. Brown was a close second for the award after earning 14 points.

Hocevar won both the low and high hurdle races, ran a leg on the third place relay team and finished third in the 220 and tied for fifth in the 100-yard dash. Brown won the 100 and 220, setting a new conference record in the century by turning in a 9.7 effort in the morning preliminary. He won the finals in 10.1 flat. Brown also placed third in the conference broad jump finals.

Miller had nothing but praise for Hocevar who gave up a chance for conference records in the high and low hurdles by entering in the two dash events to pick up crucial points for his team. The OTI mentor was worried about Hocevar's physical condition before the meet since the Owls hurdle ace came up lame last week by pulled muscles in his legs and was stiff earlier this week. Hocevar ran three races in the morning and four in the afternoon, winning two and placing in the others.

Oregon Tech's Jerry Fasten set a new OCC record in the shot put with a heave of 45-11. Fasten placed second to Pedro Colley, ex-KUHS track star, in the discus. Colley established a new conference mark with a heave of 139-4 compared to Fasten's 139-1½, which was his best toss.

John Carpenter of Oregon College set a new record in the broad jump with a leap of 22-feet, 7-inches. Irv Garrison of OCE, established a new javelin mark by throwing the spear 194-4½, beating Southern Oregon's Eldon Francis.

Oregon Tech finished third in the relay and was saved from sharing the conference title with Portland State by Oregon College, OCE's foursome edged Portland State at the final wire to give Miller and assistant coach Hal Bailey sole position of top spot.

Bowden Sets New Mile High

BERKELEY, Calif. — California's middle distance star Don Bowden cracked the Pacific Coast Conference record for the mile Saturday, winning in 4:03.7 at 17th PCC track and field title in 18 times.

Bowden grabbed the lead before the first turn and no one challenged the lanky, smooth striding senior. He thus became the only man to hold two conference records. He set his first in the 880 last year with 1:47.8 but skipped that event Saturday. His sophomore teammate Jerry Siebert won it in 1:51.

USC won with 60½ points. Second place went to California with 43½; third to UCLA with 40 and fourth to Stanford with 28½.

The northern schools followed: Oregon 29½; Washington and Washington State 13½ each and Oregon State 0. Idaho failed to send competitors.

An adjustment in scores, but no change in team standings will come Monday when filmed pictures determine third, fourth and fifth finishers in the 100-yard dash. Four speedsters are in the photo.

THIRD RECORD

A crowd of 12,000 in California's Edward Stadium watched Bowden establish the third record bump in this meet. USC's Hank Rabka, becoming the only athlete ever to win a PCC championship three straight years, set the discus mark at 186 feet 8 inches Friday and Rafer Johnson, UCLA's fine all-around trackman, took the javelin 243-10½. Those records came in the preliminaries and were not surpassed Saturday.

California's Willie White capped the only double triumph, taking the 100-yard dash in 9.6 and the 220 in 21.4. Stanford's Dean Smith ran second in the century. Otis Davis of Oregon was runnerup in the 220.

Three champions defended successfully. Washington's Terry Tobacko, a Canadian from Vancouver Island, retained his 440 crown with 47.1. Another Canadian, Murray Cockburn of Toronto and USC second, Tobacko, troubled earlier by a leg ailment, had run only two races this season.

NO TROUBLE

Little Max Truex of USC had no trouble winning his second in a row as he finished the two mile in 9:05.4. Maury Graves of Stanford was next in 9:19.3.

USC's Bob Lawson won his second straight 120-yard high hurdle in 14.2 but failed to repeat in the 220 lows. Dave Hollingsworth saved that first place for USC in 22.7. Lawson took fourth behind Walt Arlt of Washington State and Steve Anderson of Oregon.

Dick Knapp of UCLA with 24.9 won back the broad jump title he held in 1956. John Kelly of Stanford was second with a 24-foot jump.

OCE Takes Two From PS

PORTLAND — Oregon College of Education clipped Portland State 4-0 and 6-1 in a baseball doubleheader here Saturday that ended the Oregon Collegiate Conference season for both teams.

OCE ended in second place, with an 8-3 record. Portland State finished at 2-9, good for fourth place. The title earlier was won by Southern Oregon.

Pelican Gordie Sellars was the only man on the Klamath Union track squad to gain a berth in the upcoming state tournament as he earned a second in the broad jump to help the Pelicans take third place honors in the District 6-A meet at Grants Pass Saturday.

The meet was won by the Grants Pass Cavemen who landed 10 out of a possible 14 firsts in the five-school test.

Sellars' leap of 20-10 feet was a scant two inches short of the winning jump. An injured leg muscle had kept Sellars on an enforced two-week layoff just prior to the Grants Pass meet.

A foot injury incurred by Bob Drace in practice Tuesday, kept the Pel's season-high jumper from participating in both the high jump and the relay but he entered the high and low hurdles in spite of his stitches and managed thirds in each event. Drace ran in a special aluminum heel cup designed by coach Len Surles to protect the injured heel. He was the Pel high scorer for the day with a total of 12 points.

Cavemen Marvin Terry, who won both the 100 and 220 yard dashes and Jim Maryott, who ran off with the high and low hurdles were the only double event winners of the day.
