'Man In The Street' Offended By Remark

LOS ANGELES (UP)—The man-in-the-street indicated today he was offended by National League president Warren Giles' statement that the Dodgers may be forced to leave Los Angeles if the Chavez Ravine referendum is defeated.

But a United Press random poll of 22 people on the effects of Giles' remarks showed only two decided to change their votes because of the league president's statement.

Of the 22 people questioned, 12 said they would still vote in favor of upholding the Chavez Ravine stadium site contract, six said they were voting against the referendum—two because of Giles' remarks—and four were undecided.

Many of those polled felt Giles was "bluffing" when he threatened to have the league lift the Dodger franchise from Los Angeles if the referendum failed.

TRYING TO PRESSURE

"If he pulls them out he's crazy," said Vernon Nellis, a jewelry store salesman. "He's getting a lot of money for the club here. And if he doesn't stay here, where will he go? Giles is pulling a publicity stunt."

Russ Teller, a restaurant owner, said, "I wasn't sure before. Now I'll vote against it."

Mall carrier Kenen Pierce added, "Giles is trying to pressure the people. He wouldn't pull them out. I'll vote yes."

Shoe salesman Irvin Lebowitz commented, "They're trying to put on the heat. I think they'll

lose more votes than they'll get from this stunt. But I'm voting yes on the contract."

Giles' statement has lost the Dodgers 10,000 votes on Chavez Ravine. He shouldn't stick his head into it," added Melvin Main, a carpenter contractor who said he still would vote yes on the referendum.

GAVE THEM BEST DEAL

But Dave Nelman, a food salesman, said, "Giles is an idiot. We gave the club the best deal ever with all the concessions and he comes back like this. This changes my vote from yes to no."

Barber Umberto Castro commented, "He's pressing the people, but I don't think he'll pull the Dodgers out." Castro said he was undecided.

Coast Guardsman Ed Wurd contended the Dodgers had no right to Chavez Ravine and he said, "It's a business swindle. He said he would vote no."

Voice teacher Alexander Hoepner would only say, "Giles is bluffing. I'm still voting yes."

"Giles statement was a dictator-like edict," said cook Fred Bryan, "I'd like to see them move out. It would bring back the Hollywood baseball club."

Service station owner Mike Anello added, "I'd like to see them stay; they're doing the city a lot of good. Everyone is enthused. Giles is nuts." Parking lot owner John Simon took the opposing view when he said, "The Dodgers are destroying other Los Angeles business."

Commission Asks Right To Regulate Night Fishing

PORTLAND (AP)—The Oregon Game Commission Friday said it wants authority to regulate night fishing in the state's lakes and streams.

The commission gave tentative approval to a proposed bill that would take such regulatory powers out of the hands of the state Legislature.

Anglers now may fish only for catfish at night.

The commission said it wants

the power to set night-time fishing regulations, and said it possibly might broaden the scope of such angling.

Commission biologists said there now are some areas of the state where heavier catches should be made. This could be accomplished by night fishing, they said.

Particularly acute, they said, is the problem of fishing out lakes which are to be poisoned to eliminate hordes of trash fish.

A second bill given tentative approval would permit angling for green sturgeon in the Umpqua River.

The commission also decided to reconsider an earlier decision which called for an end to stocking programs in Mill Creek in Marion County.

The commission said it wanted to stop stocking because not everyone is permitted to fish in the stream.

It agreed to reconsider, though, when State Rep. Robert Alstrom said the commission decision might thwart an earlier intention of the Legislature.

The Legislature, he said, has set aside Mill Creek as a fishing reserve for persons 18 years old and under.

Sutton Resigns Post

SWEET HOME (AP)—Ralph Sutton Friday said he has submitted his resignation as head track coach at Sweet Home High School.

Sutton said he will coach next season at Grant High in Sacramento, Calif. He has been here two seasons.

Pacher Herin Weinmeier, obtained by the Detroit Tigers started this season with St. Louis in six innings during three games; he gave nine runs.

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Redlegs Ruin Bums' Hope Of Getting Out Of Cellar

CINCINNATI (UP)—The Los Angeles Dodgers, their dreams of climbing out of the National League cellar temporarily shattered Saturday send Big Don Newcombe to the mound against the Cincinnati Redlegs.

The Redlegs broke the Dodgers' three-game winning streak (their longest this season) Friday with a 4-1 victory. The Dodgers would have taken seventh place if they had won. The Redlegs would have gone to the cellar.

Southpaw Johnny Podres, the loser, was backed up Saturday by Manager Walt Alston.

"It wasn't Johnny's fault, we kicked the ball around for him again," Alston said, referring to the fifth inning when the Redlegs racked up three runs.

"They might not have scored that inning if we hadn't kicked the ball around," Alston complained.

"And you know the hit that beat us? That bloopy, fluky double on the line."

Pete Whisenant doubled with a hit that landed nearly on the right field line, driving in a run. Earlier in the inning Gil Hodges

made a wild throw to Charlie Neal at first base, allowing Alex Grammas to score.

Podres now is credited with three straight losses after starting the season off with four straight wins.

The Dodgers lost their big chance to score in the eighth inning when they had the bases loaded and only one out. Hal Jeffcoat came in to replace winner Bob Purkey. He struck out Charlie Neal and retired John Roseboro on a fly and that ended the Dodgers' big chance.

Don Newcombe, who's been having trouble himself this year, faced Cincinnati's Johnny Klippstein (1-0) Saturday at Crosley Field.

Newcombe has a career record of 10 wins for 14 tries against the Redlegs on their home grounds.

Klippstein sports a lifetime score of 12 wins in 14 games against the Dodgers.

Saturday's game was the last in this short series before the Dodgers move onto Philadelphia to meet the Phillies.
