Science Opportunities Featured At Klamath

Klamath Union High School's Science Department offers four full years of science as well as other additional courses for those students interested in that field. The purpose of studying science in high school is to acquire an appreciation and understanding of the science which affects daily living, as well as to provide an introduction and background to the more specialized science studies to follow. In this scientific age the ability to apply scientific attitudes and methods to the solution of problems can be used by all.

DEPARTMENT STAFF

Comprising the department staff are Mrs. Franc Bailey who teaches biology; Mrs. Gladys Herron, instructor of chemistry, photography, and senior science; James Inglesby, biology and general science; Robert Johnson, general science; Arthur LeCours, chemistry; Albert Sinclair, physics; general science; Stanley Woodruff, general science.

Classes in physics, photography and chemistry have recently relocated to the new wing and are very pleased to have additional laboratory facilities which have been needed for some time.

The science department has sponsored three very interesting field trips this spring with members of the staff accompanying each group. In March, 30 junior and senior science students attended a meeting in Grants Pass where 250 other science students from Southern Oregon assembled to hear lectures by industrial scientists and college teachers on opportunities in science. A group of 35 students spent April 25 and 26 at Oregon State College where they visited the Northwest Science Fair and toured the laboratories of Oregon Metallurgical Corporation, Wah Chang Metallurgical Corporation, Kraft Paper Corporation and the Bureau of Mines, all at Albany, Oregon. Processing of zirconium, hafnium, niobium and tantalum were seen in the metal laboratories.

Thirty two junior and senior students in science were taken on a conducted tour of the Johns-Manville plant, north of Klamath Falls, May 15. Although the plant is not yet in operation, the science students witnessed all of the equipment and received an excellent lecture on how the plant will operate. The personnel of the Johns-Manville plant expressed a desire to conduct these same students through the plant again when in production.

Awards Given KU Students

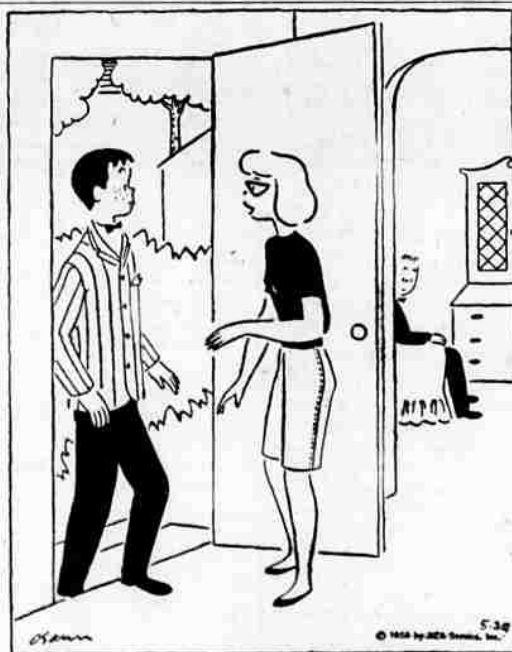

Many Observe Memorial Day

Southern women initiated the custom of placing early spring flowers on the graves of their dead. Gradually the practice spread until in the year 1868, Gen. John A. Logan, then the commander in chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, named May 30, as the day on which to beautify the graves of soldiers. This date has been made a legal holiday in most of the states, one of which is Oregon.

Each year the President of the United States places a wreath on an unknown soldier's grave. This year not only is he going to place one on a soldier from World War II's resting place but also from the Korean conflict.

Today instead of honoring the soldiers exclusively, the custom has been expanded to include all the deceased. Relatives make yearly pilgrimages to cemeteries to place flowers, some of which were grown in their own gardens, on the graves of their loved ones. Special activities, consisting of parades and in Klamath Falls, the placing of flowers at the memorial shaft on the courthouse lawn, honoring the Klamath men who laid down their lives in the armed forces, occur in various cities.
