Radios Cease On Explorer

WASHINGTON (AP) — Both radio transmitters are now silent on the Army's Explorer I, the first U.S. earth satellite.

The Naval Research Laboratory said Friday tracing stations no longer were receiving signals from Explorer's second transmitter, apparently because of battery exhaustion.

The other transmitter, which operated on higher power, stopped sending earlier.

Explorer I, which went into orbit on Jan. 31, is expected to remain aloft for one to five years. Two other U.S. satellites — the Army's Explorer III and the Navy's Vanguard — also are circling the earth.

Traffic Toll Shows Slump

SACRAMENTO (UP)—A total of 986 persons died in traffic accidents in California during the first four months of this year, the highway patrol said Saturday.

The fatalities showed a decrease of 7.85 per cent from the 1070 persons who lost their lives during the same period last year.

The CHP also revealed in its monthly report to Gov. Goodwin J. Knight that it issued more traffic tickets this year than during 1957.

Some 324,271 citations were written during the four months this year, an increase of 18.51 per cent from the 273,627 arrests which were made a year ago.

The cases of two other children were continued until further order of the court.

Judge Foster comes to Klamath Falls every two or three weeks to assist Judge D. E. Van Vactor of district court in juvenile cases.

Fete Leaders To Meet Here

The Oregon Centennial Commission, arriving here Sunday night, will meet with a Klamath County Centennial Steering Committee Monday at 9:30 a.m. in the commerce chamber office.

To be discussed will be this area's role in the centennial, which will commemorate 100 years of Oregon statehood at a gala celebration at Portland in June, 1959.

The public is invited to the meeting as well as to a no host luncheon in the Willard at noon.

The state commission is composed of Anthony Brandel, chairman and head of Burnt River Lumber Company; Baker, M. S. Monroe (Lillie) Sweetland, co-publisher with her husband of the Millwaukie Review; C. Howard Lane, managing director of KOIN-TV, Portland; Bruce Bishop, editor of the International Wood Workers official magazine, Portland; Jack Lively, attorney, Springfield; and Thomas Vaughan, Oregon Historical Society director, Portland.

Accompanying the commissioners will be their staff members who are Donald Lonie Jr., publicity director, and Floyd Maxwell, managing director of the Centennial Exposition.

The following local steering group will meet with the commission: James Boyle, appointed by the governor to head up centennial planning for Klamath County; Lawrence Slater, mayor; Charles H. Mack, county judge; Buena Stone, local teacher and noted historian; and Charles Bane, chairman of commerce president. Mrs. Stone has indicated she may not be able to attend the meeting.

As plans progress for the 1959 celebration, the steering group will appoint a much larger committee that will have representation from all segments of Klamath County.

Labor Exhibits New Increases

The Klamath County office of the Oregon State Employment Service estimates that there has been a net increase in employment over 1957, Guy E. Barker, manager, said Friday. This estimate is based on reports by 41 of the county's larger firms, pertaining to the month of April in 1958 and 1957.

In comparing this year's figures with last year's, the employment office finds:

A substantial increase in construction employment reported by the Building Trades Council, AFL-CIO.

Some increase in employment in manufacturing not including lumber products, and in service employment. (The latter is reported by the Culinary Alliance Union, which reports a shortage of experienced waitresses.)

No change in employment in finance, real estate and insurance.

A slight decrease in lumber and logging employment.

Some decrease in railroad and retail trade employment. (Most of the decrease in the latter category is found in the automobile trade, but department and food stores show some decrease.)

At the same time, however, Barker released figures showing that 60 more unemployed workers were claiming benefits from his office during the week ended Thursday than during the third week of May, 1957.

Barker said that in-migration of workers from other areas provides a steady increase in the total labor force, and contributes substantially to the increase in unemployment.

Statistics for the weeks ended May 23, 1957 and May 22, 1958, show that 485 persons were claiming unemployment benefits in the latter week, and 425 a year ago. In 1957, 361 were drawing claims based on employment in Oregon, against 384 this year.

The extent of in-migration was indicated to some extent by the fact that although these Oregon claims showed only a 6 per cent increase, claims based on employment elsewhere increased 45 per cent, from 64 to 93, from the 1957 week to the 1958 week.

Music Instructor Leaves To Accept Portland Post

Ruth Lobaugh, who has contributed much to the development of the elementary and junior high school vocal music program since she came to Klamath Falls 10 years ago, is leaving Klamath Falls to teach elementary music in Portland city schools.

This year she was director and accompanist for the Gilbert and Sullivan comic opera, "H.M.S. Pinafore," presented by the girls and boys glee clubs of Fremont Junior High School, third Gilbert and Sullivan opera she has directed during the six years she has served as music supervisor.

In 1957 she presented "The Mikado" and the year before, "Pirates of Penzance." Junior high school students seldom are trained for such difficult roles. Miss Lobaugh's capacity for training adolescent voices and her ability to adjust lyrics and music to them, have been commended by audiences and faculty members with whom she has worked.

Following presentation of this year's "Pinafore," Miss Lobaugh was feted at a dinner in the Camas Room of the Winema Hotel. Lowell Kaupp, principal of Fremont and the Junior High School, spokesman for the elementary principals, paid tribute to Miss Lobaugh for the fine cooperative spirit she has maintained in her work with administrators and children.

Andrew Loney Jr., director of music education in the city schools, master of ceremonies, who referred to her as one of the "master teachers" in the music profession, presented her with a wrist watch, gift of administrators, supervisors, principals, secretaries, instrumental music teachers and substitutes in the elementary and the high schools, present for the dessert course.

Miss Lobaugh came to Klamath Falls 10 years ago from Denver, was a special music teacher at Mills School for four years before her appointment as supervisor in the elementary schools.

She received her bachelor degree from the New England Conservatory of Music, Boston, her masters from Northwestern University.

During the time she has been a resident here, Miss Lobaugh has been a member of the Klamath Falls Soroptimist Club, is president of Chapter AU, POE Sisterhood, member of the American Association of University Women, Delta Kappa Gamma, has sung in the choir of the First Methodist Church and has taught private piano pupils.

C. Marron Clark, in Richmond on business, said he was sitting across from the door and "kind of watching" little Buckley McNair run up and down the aisle of the DC-4.

"Just like a flash," Clark said, "he made a sharp turn, reached up and grabbed the door handle. He put his weight on it and the door opened. That's when I grabbed him."

The boy's mother, Mrs. Conrad Buchanan McNair of Macon, Ga., was seated forward in the cabin attending her 3-month-old son. She did not know about the close call until a few minutes after it happened.

Clark said the door opened about a foot, "but it was enough for him to go down. He was right on the edge."

"I was all right until I thought about it afterward," Clark said. "Then I went for a beer."
