



A SHADED WOODLAND SCENE in a garden was designed and made by Mrs. George Paris for the May 12 meeting of the Klamath Falls Woman's Library Club. Growing sword ferns brought from Rhododendron, near Mt. Hood, white lilies, apple blossoms, Oregon Grape and varieties of moss, backgrounded the two tiny pools in which real gold fish darted. Stepping stones of pink rock brought from Madras, Oregon formed a curved walk from the pools that centered the tea table to the Hummel statue of St. Francis and a tiny red cedar shake creche on the stage. Tiny Italian vases of flowers, darting birds, and miniature Chinese figures about the pool added to the scene. Mrs. Paris kept the moss fresh and growing for two weeks to be used for the elaborate decor, and on the day of the tea, tiny toadstools and shamrocks dotted the multi-colored bryophytic plants. Mrs. Paris lined the pools with blue foil and used colored pebbles for a realistic touch.

Questions and Answers

Q—How can I repair deep cracks in the handles of some of my good kitchen knives?

A—Scrape the cracks down to bare wood. Fill with plastic wood (available at hardware stores). When the plastic wood has hardened, sandpaper the whole handle until the surface is smooth and even. Apply a coat of shellac. Follow with two coats of enamel.

Q—How much paint is required for exterior brick surfaces?

A—Generally, one gallon of exterior paint will cover about 200 square feet of surface for the first coat. On the second coat, one gallon will cover about 400 square feet.

Q—How can brushes that are bent from standing in paint cans be straightened?

A—Dip brushes in machine oil. Heat a piece of metal, such as a top from a tin can, using a small flame. Lay the brushes flat on the heated metal. When the brush begins to sizzle, shape it with a piece of cardboard until the brush regains original shape.

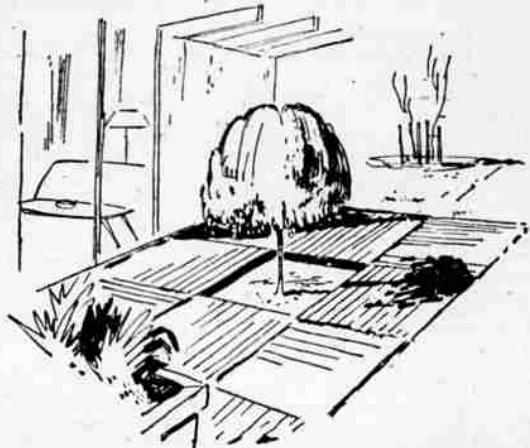
COUNT THE RINGS

The age of trees grown in the temperate climate zones (most of the U.S.) can be determined by counting the number of annual rings from bark to pith. The ring growth gives lumber much of its beauty, for when saws cut across a Douglas fir log in a modern sawmill, an intricate pattern and texture of grain develops.

Pie Wedge Summer Home



LIVES THERE A FAMILY in these United States that hasn't often wished for its very own summer home? Well, here's an idea for one that will fit most any budget. This A-frame design is simple, inexpensive, and most of the work can be done by the family. The framing is sturdy 2x6 Douglas fir reaching clear to the ridge pole. Sheathing is fir shiplap with shingle roof, and deck is 2x4 fir set on husky fir timbers. Some of these homes have been built for as little as \$1,000.



THIS EXQUISITE PATIO deck gets much of its charm and beauty from its simplicity. The deck has been built of 2x4 Douglas fir, firmly set at slight intervals to allow rain run-off, on a sturdy 4x4 framework of fir. Note the effect of checkerboarding the decking in diagonally installed, eight-foot sections. Tree has contrasting section of raw earth.
