

Confusion Over Orders Grounds Alameda Planes

ALAMEDA (UPI)—All jet planes based at the Alameda and Moffett Field Naval Air stations were grounded today by Rear Adm. Murr E. Arnold as the result of confusion over new flight regulations imposed by the government.

Arnold, commander of fleet Air Alameda, said he took the action because neither he nor his aides understood just what the new flight regulations were.

The government order was issued Thursday in an emergency program announced by President Eisenhower as the result of growing public reaction over crashes between military jets and commercial planes.

The program specified that Civil Aeronautics Administration regulations be imposed on "nonmilitary" flights of military jets.

Arnold said he received a directive from the chief of naval operations Sunday ordering compliance with the President's program, but added that "both the announced program and the directive are hard to understand and are full of ambiguous terms."

The admiral said the Washington directive indicated that "amplifying instructions" would be forthcoming.

"I have no choice but to order all flight operations at Alameda and Moffett Field suspended," Arnold said. "At the moment, we are confused by the new regulatory program."

Young Actor Picked Up

LOS ANGELES (AP)—A young son of former movie star Johnny Weissmuller has been booked on a charge of disturbing the peace.

John S. Weissmuller and Patrick O'Neal, both 17, were accused in a citizens complaint yesterday of threatening Claude Allred, West Los Angeles. Allred summoned police and the boys fled, officers reported.

The youths said they had been in a party at a nearby home prior to the Saturday night incident. They were released to their parents.

Young Weissmuller, an actor, lives with his mother and stepfather, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Ginter. The boy is one of three children of Weissmuller and Beryl Scott, San Francisco social figure. They were divorced in 1948.

Plane Crash Kills Pair

CHAMPAIGN, Ill. (AP)—An Air Force B57 twin-jet bomber crashed in a field shortly after taking off from Chanute Air Force Base yesterday, killing the two crewmen aboard.

The plane disintegrated on impact and there was some fire, witnesses told Lt. George Ogles, public information officer at Chanute.

Ogles said a witness reported a canopy was ejected when the plane was at an altitude of about 3,000 feet. One of the crewmen apparently got out partially, but he was so low the wind did not catch his chute.

The victims were identified as 1st Lt. J. T. Flynn, pilot, of Indianapolis, and Capt. B. H. Griggs, navigator, of Philadelphia, both stationed at Langley Air Force Base, Va.

Remorseful Driver Takes Own Life

OZARK, Mo. (AP)—A man was killed when the car in which he was riding overturned yesterday. Last night, said Sheriff Clay Hodges, the driver of the car hanged himself in the county jail here.

The driver, Grant N. Didion, 34, was being held on a charge of reckless driving. Sheriff Hodges said Didion's car was traveling too fast when it overturned near Billings, Mo., killing Didion's friend, Wendell Baum, 51. Both men lived at Billings.

Knowland Endorsed By Nixon

RIVERSIDE, Calif. (AP)—Vice President Nixon sent a telegram yesterday endorsing Sen. William F. Knowland (R-Calif.), who seeks the California Republican nomination for governor.

The message from Washington, D. C., was to a Republican rally in Riverside that Knowland attended. The senator was in California for a weekend of campaigning.

"As a Californian," Nixon said, "I am proud to be able to work and vote for a man who in every respect will be worthy to lead our state into the exciting era in which it will become the first state in the nation." Californians predict their state's population will exceed New York's in a few years.

Nixon predicted Knowland would win the gubernatorial race and said, "It is more than just a contest between Democrats and Republicans."

"Bill Knowland will receive the support of thousands of Democrats who admire and respect a man who refuses to knuckle down to any pressure group regardless of the political consequences."

Knowland told the rally he favored "voluntary rather than compulsory membership in labor unions."

Knowland and Atty. Gen. Edmund G. Brown, a Democrat, have cross-filed California primary candidates to file on both party tickets. No Republican is opposing the senator.

Knowland described Nixon last week as the "leading contender and the only major candidate" for the 1960 Republican presidential nomination.

Brown said Nixon first endorsed Knowland months ago and that the senator's "campaign manager is merely playing the record over again."

San Luis Bill Pushed

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Rep. B. P. Sisk (D-Calif.) said today he will press for action this week on his bill to provide for joint state-federal participation in California's San Luis Project.

Sisk said he will urge the House Irrigation and Reclamation Subcommittee to approve the measure Wednesday.

The congressman said further he will ask for subcommittee approval of the bill "without substantial change."

In recent House and Senate hearings opposing witnesses from Northern and Southern California disagreed over certain provisions of the bill. The Southerners claimed it does not sufficiently protect their water rights.

Sisk said in a statement he has kept an "open mind" and has been ready to accept alternate proposals for the project if they provided a "workable plan" agreeable to the Interior Department and to the state.

"But no plan meeting these requirements has been suggested," he said.

Sisk said he feels the "basic features" of his proposal for development of the San Luis Project are "sound and workable" and should be approved without further delay.

Roller Coaster Trouble Sought

NEWARK, Ohio (AP)—Whether the Memorial Day holiday crowd rides the roller coaster at nearby Buckeye Lake Amusement Park next weekend depends on the findings of an engineering firm.

If engineers find—and remedy—the cause of a derailment that injured 15 persons Saturday night, the roller coaster will roll, park officials said.

If not, it will stay shut down until the experts learn why the three-car train disengaged from its lifting chain about 35 feet up, sheared off a safety catch and roared backward down the 75-foot incline it had been climbing. At the bottom, the cars left the rails and came to rest against a protective fence.

Car Smashes Into House, Hurts Two

DALLAS (AP)—Richard Condra's car rammed a house and knocked it three feet off the foundation.

Condra and Charles Foley, 24, a companion, both were injured, but neither critically. Moses Smith and his family all escaped injury inside the house.

Condra told police his 1957 model car was newly souped up and the accelerator jammed as he swerved to avoid another vehicle.

Western World Said Going Soft

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Bishop Fulton J. Sheen says the Western world is growing soft while the Soviet Union "is strengthening itself by discipline, self-denial and hardship."

He said in a speech that Soviet schools teach up to 800 more hours of science in high schools than is taught in colleges of the United States.

The Catholic bishop said, "This is typical of the general softening of our culture."

Bank Moves, Along With Dozen Million

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—The Louisville branch of the Federal Reserve Bank moved three blocks to its new home early yesterday, and took along what an official said was "dozens of millions of dollars."

These security steps were taken: Forty-five uniformed police officers and detectives guarded the money in transit.

A detail of Secret Service agents circled in the area.

The money was carried in three armored cars.

Traffic was blocked in the area involved in the transfer.
