

Mays Can Hit .380 Says Boss

WEST POINT, N. Y. (AP) — Willie Mays is the type of baseball player who could hit .380, hit 50 home runs and drive in 140 runs. That is how much San Francisco Manager Bill Rigney thinks of his big man.

"Willie is the best player I ever saw," Rigney said today. "I said in the spring he never had reached his potential. He might drive in 140, hit .380 hit 50 homers and lead the league in everything."

Does Rigney expect him to do just that?

"I'll say this," he answered, "I can't think of anybody who has a better chance."

Not even Stan Musial? Rigney shook his head.

"Out in San Francisco they started to worry about Willie when he had hit only one home run in our first 22 games although he was hitting over .400," he said. "We even got out the movie camera."

"He got a kick out of seeing himself in 1951. We saw a couple of things he was doing and he went back to the old thing. He craves about eight in the next week."

Willie won't buy any predictions for himself.

"I'm just off to a good start," he kept saying. "I never hit many home runs in May. Usually I'm hitting about .250 at this time. I'm just happy I'm having a good year. When I hit home runs I get them in bunches and then no more for a time."

Mays admits the fast start of the club has surprised him just as it has surprised most of the baseball world.

"Sure, I'm surprised," he said. "Nobody knew we would get four boys (Orlando Cepeda, Bob Schmidt, Jim Davenport and Willie Kirkland) all coming through like they are. They make a big difference."

"With Cepeda and Daryl Spencer hitting good right behind me, it helps me too. That Orlando is a strong boy, hits both ways (right and left field). He is the most relaxed first year man I ever saw. If he don't win the rookie of the year prize, he's got to go real bad."

Can the Giants win it all?

"That's for the manager to say, not me," says Mays. "I just hope we can win every game every day. Everybody is happy. It's just like 1951 when we were winning everyday."

And the Dodgers? Are they as bad as they have looked?

"Don't you go getting me into that," said Willie and he was off and away with only one comment about Los Angeles.

"I'd like to play in that park," he said. "I might not get so many home runs but I'd get lots of singles. That fence is right there."

The Giants smothered Army, 17-1, yesterday in their annual game with the Cadets.

Rigney plans to pitch John Antonelli at Philadelphia tonight against Jack Sanford.

Antonelli, who has a 4-3 record, beat the Phils 10-1 April 30, giving up six hits in nine innings. That was his only previous work against the Phils.

Sanford, who has a 3-4 record, lost to San Francisco 4-2 on May 22, giving up seven hits in eight innings. That was his only previous start against the Giants.

Philadelphia has won three of the five games between the clubs.

A year ago, Carl Erskine was prepared to quit if his arm trouble didn't respond to treatment. Today you'd have to tear that Dodge uniform off his back.

The Happy Hoosier gained his second complete game victory last night, following up a shutout victory over St. Louis eight days ago, with a two-hit, 2-1 decision at Philadelphia for the last-place Los Angeles Dodgers.

The fourth-place Chicago Cubs were beaten 4-3 at Milwaukee in the only other National League game scheduled.

Only one game was scheduled in the American League, and the Kansas City Athletics won it, beating Baltimore 5-4.

Erskine, once the ace of the Dodge staff, was shooting for his third no-hitter for 5 1-3 innings, and had a one-hit shutout until the eighth while ending Robin Roberts' comeback winning streak at three. The Dodgers scored in the fourth on Don Zimmer's two-run double off the left field screen.

Erskine, while padding his record to 3-2 against the Cards and Phils, a couple of pushovers for the 31-year-old right-hander looked plenty sharp in this one. He walked four, fanned four; giving up a single to rookie Chuck Essegian with one out in the sixth, and a single to Willie Jones in the eighth. A walk, Roberts' sacrifice and Richie Ashburn's fly ball brought Jones home with the run.

A's Whip Birds In Only Play

The tale of Casey and the Seven Dwarfs, sometimes known as the American League pennant race, came back to the old grind tonight after a refreshing change of pace yesterday, when the New York Yankees failed to fatten their first place bulge.

A's 5, Orioles 4
They couldn't. Neither the Yanks nor second-place Boston were scheduled. Only one game was in the books, and that one gave Kansas City a 5-4, 10-inning victory over Baltimore on relief pitcher Murry Dickson's home run.

The Yankees take an unprecedented pre-Memorial Day lead of nine games into Kansas City tonight, with unbeaten Bob Turley looking for his eighth victory.

The A's were blanked for three innings yesterday by Connie Johnson as nine-year veteran Jim Busby's first major league grand-slam homer pushed the Orioles into a 4-0 lead in the fourth and chased Ralph Terry. But the A's then counted three in their fourth, two on Bob Marlyn's homer, and squared it in the fifth on Harry Chitt's homer.

Dickson, the 41-year-old National League castoff, blanked the Birds on four hits in his 6-2 1/3 innings, walking none and striking out five before getting the job done himself against Arnie Portocarrero, now 2-2.

Arch Moore Places Eyes On Title Bout

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Light heavyweight boxing champion Archie Moore, whose boxing life keeps rolling right on through his 40's, plans a promotion campaign to win another shot at the heavyweight crown.

"Retire, why should I retire?" he asked Monday night after a handing veteran Charley Norkus a thorough beating in 10 rounds. "I gave the better part of my younger days trying to learn this boxing game."

Moore did not break the all-time record for knockouts he shares with the late Young Stribling at 128, but he has probably had fewer easier work evenings.

Relying mostly on his left hand, Archie did not lose a round as he jabbed and hooked to the head and body. Norkus, 29, from Port Washington, N.Y., came off with a bloody nose and battered face.

Weighing a pudgy 196, all of 21 more than the light heavyweight limit, Moore came in three pounds heavier than his opponent, who always has been a heavyweight.

Moore, who now calls San Diego his home and maintains he's just a youthful 41 and not 44 as some records indicate, staggered Norkus in the second round and kept him in trouble but not serious danger the rest of the fight. He scored his best shots with left hook combinations in the seventh.

Moore says he'll be glad to give Canadian Yvon Durelle a chance at the title in exchange for a \$100,000 guarantee or he'd like to fight heavyweight contender Eddie Machen here for a guarantee.

In the immediate future, the 175-pound class champ plans a fight in about two weeks at Sacramento, Calif., if an opponent can be found. Then he'd like Machen, adding, "when I knock him out, I'll put on the campaign to get Patterson into the ring with me again." Floyd Patterson is the heavyweight champ.

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
