



Crowds Cheer Music Group

MOSCOW (AP) — An overflow crowd cheered the Philadelphia orchestra last night at its Moscow debut. The orchestra is touring western Russia as part of the new U.S.-Soviet cultural exchange program.

Conductor Eugene Ormandy was presented with a huge bouquet after a program that included "Pictures From an Exhibition" by Russian composer Modeste Moussorgsky and American Aaron Copland's "Quiet City."

Soviet composer Aram Khachaturian welcomed the orchestra on behalf of Moscow music lovers and musicians. He and pianist Emil Gilels paid glowing tribute to Ormandy and his musicians. All five concerts in Moscow are sold out. The orchestra gave three concerts in Kiev and will present four in Leningrad.

Senator Leaves Congress After Twenty-Two Years

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—Noble J. Gregory bowed out today after 22 years of serving the 1st Dist. in Congress. He was one seniority step away from chairmanship of the House Ways and Means Committee.

Druggist Frank A. Stubblefield, backed by Democratic forces opposed to Gov. A. B. Chandler, upset Gregory in yesterday's Democratic primary by an unofficial margin of 432 votes. The final tally: Stubblefield, 16,302 votes; Gregory, 15,870.

The reversal was an exception in statewide voting. Democratic Congressman Frank

Chelf and Brent Spence were renominated and Republican Eugene Siler looked like a winner. Gregory's defeat marked the first time in state history a 1st Dist. congressman failed to win renomination. Gregory himself took over after the death in office of his brother Voris in 1936. He was reelected 11 times.

Stubblefield will be opposed by Republican Jam. G. Bandy of Hopkinsville in the November general election. Bandy has no opposition.

Chelf, in 329 of 377 precincts, led political newcomer Frank Riley Jr. of Bardonia, 13,545 votes to 338. He will have no Republican opposition in November.

Gregg said he turned down an inadequate \$43,344 settlement offered by the Air Force two weeks ago. He said he was asking \$99,930 for property damage and personal injury to himself and Mrs. Gregg. Claims for his three children will be made later, he added.

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Scientist Sees Future A-Power

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — A physicist predicts that thermonuclear energy will become man's primary source of power. Dr. Richard F. Post of the University of California's Radiation Laboratory at Livermore, Calif., said basic experiments in taming thermonuclear energy should be completed within 5 to 10 years. He spoke at a nuclear energy symposium at the California Institute of Technology. Fusion power, he said, would draw upon hydrogen as fuel, and hydrogen is cheap and plentiful. There is no danger of atomic accident and no atomic residue, he said.

International peace—Gov. Goodwin J. Knight, Republican.

Peace and national survival—Rep. Clair Engle, Democrat.

National security—Mayor George Christopher of San Francisco, Republican.

Welfare of our country—William Jolley, Glendale refrigeration contractor, Republican.

Man's survival—Fritjof Thygeson, University of California graduate student, Socialist filed as a Democrat.

Take government out of business—Alexander D. Williamson, retired accountant from Palm Springs, Republican.

Each spoke four minutes. Then they faced a barrage of questions.

Wine Men See Grape Lack

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The two-day convention of the Wine Institute closed with a warning of grape shortages in the future.

Ernest Gallo of Modesto, who was elected board chairman for the second year, said yesterday that California wine sales have jumped from 26 million gallons in 1954 to 124½ million gallons in 1957.

Dr. George L. Mehren, University of California agricultural economist, predicted rising prices for grapes because of increasing competition between segments of the industry—wine, raisins and table grapes. He said raisin varieties were in extremely short supply.

Dr. Mehren added that the present general outlook indicates California's 1958 grape production will be between five and 10 per cent less than normal.

Don W. McColly of San Francisco was elected to his fifth year as president and general manager. Other officers elected were Robert Gibson, Roseville and Elk Grove, first vice president; E. L. Barr, Sanger, second vice president; Robert Mondavi, Saint Helena, third vice president; B. W. Goldthwaite, Fresno, treasurer; Harry Baccigaluppi, San Francisco and Delano, secretary; and Jefferson Peyser, San Francisco, general counsel.

Reds Scrap Food Cards In Reich

BERLIN (AP) — Communist East Germany today scrapped food rationing cards introduced by Hitler in 1939 and boosted the wages of over three million workers to help them pay higher food prices.

West Germany scrapped the ration cards 10 years ago.

Premier Otto Grotewohl, fresh from the economic parley of Soviet bloc leaders in Moscow, decreed the long-awaited end to the rationing of meat, fat and sugar. They were the last three restricted items.

A system of graduated living allowances also was set up aimed mainly at helping the lower income brackets. Additional allowances were specified for children, pensioners and housewives of lower paid workers.

LINER-UP SUE

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP)—Jaime Del Valle, who produces the television show Linerup, is being sued for divorce by his actress wife.

Questions ranged from federal aid to education to the testing of nuclear weapons.

Thygeson received the biggest round of applause when he answered:

"Yes, I favor federal aid to education. But even more I feel we must create the type of education to cope with the threat posed by Russia's sputniks."

Biggest laugh of the evening greeted Williamson's comment:

"Don't send me to Washington unless you mean business. But if you don't send me, vote for Christopher. Goody is a fine gentleman but after 27 years of public office he should be retired."

Engle, of Red Bluff, said the cold war between the United States and Russia is "like dueling with shotguns at three paces."

To ease tensions, Engle said, the United States needs firm Democratic leadership.

"Not golf course leadership," Engle said, "but vital aggressive leadership like that provided by Harry Truman and Franklin D. Roosevelt."

Knight said he would look with great favor on a plan that would provide no further testing of nuclear weapons with no threat to United States security.

Christopher said the United States must strengthen its external as well as its internal defenses.

Before the meeting, Christopher walked up to Knight and extended his hand. The governor seemed surprised but extended his own and they shook hands.

BAKED PUDDING

The recipe directions may sound alarming, but they're quite correct. Yes, you do drown this pudding batter in boiling apricot whole fruit nectar. When Apricot Dream Pudding is baked, you'll find cake on top and a rich apricot sauce beneath. Delicious!

APRICOT DREAM PUDDING

1 cup sifted all-purpose flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
½ teaspoon salt
½ cup granulated sugar
½ cup chopped walnuts
½ cup milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 tablespoons melted butter or margarine
½ cup brown sugar (packed)
1½ cups apricot whole fruit nectar

Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and granulated sugar. Add walnuts. Stir in milk, vanilla and butter. Turn into 8-inch square pan. Sprinkle brown sugar over top of batter. Heat nectar and water to boiling and pour over top. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) 30 to 35 minutes. Serve warm. Makes 8 servings.

QUICK DESSERT

For a quick dessert, try "High Hat Peach Cakes"—tender chocolate cup cakes with a canned cling peach-toasted marshmallow topping. Children love these. Serve them warm from the oven with glasses of cold milk.

HIGH HAT PEACH CAKES

1 cup sugar
1½ cups sifted cake flour
½ teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon soda
1-3 cup cocoa
1 egg
1 cup buttermilk
½ cup melted shortening
1 teaspoon vanilla
8 small canned cling peach halves
8 marshmallows

Sift together sugar, flour, salt, soda and cocoa. Add egg, buttermilk, shortening and flavoring. Mix until moistened, then beat for two minutes on electric mixer using low speed or 300 strokes by hand. Fill greased large cup cake pans 2-3 full. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) about 25 minutes. Top each cake with well-drained peach half, cup side down, and marshmallow cut almost in two. Return to oven for five minutes or until marshmallow is melted. Serve warm. Makes eight servings.

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
