To be returned are Denver R. Fitzgerald, charged with forgery for allegedly cashing a phony \$47 check at a local establishment in September, 1955.

With him will be Donald Teague, charged with obtaining money under false pretenses for allegedly cashing a \$20 check on a local gas station last May while not having a bank account.

Fitzgerald finished his Nevada prison term for the same offense that he will be charged with here, forgery. Teague was imprisoned at the Carson City institution for writing bogus checks.

The people of Dorris had voted on a bond issue for \$43,000 in 1955 for the well to be drilled and for improvements to the city water system.

Virginia Hamilton, city clerk, stated the city had received \$4,660 from the state as the final payment on the state matching funds for the water system.

City To Vote On Bond Issue

LAKEVIEW.—Tuesday, June 17, has been set as the date for a special Lakeview town election to vote on a \$180,000 bond issue for sewer improvements and enlargements in the city.

According to Mayor Howard Goodnough the money would be used for a lagoon system and also for laterals on the North J. Street area. The city has applied for federal aid for the project, which could amount to about 25 per cent and could reduce the project cost to about \$115,000. Plans to raise sewer assessments to double the present amount, or \$2 per month could wipe out the debt in an eight-year period, and assessments could then be cut to less than the present rate, or to the bid terms of 50 cents per month.

The present disposal plant is not capable of handling all the sewage and the lagoon system has been developed to operate with a minimum cost.

Candidate Meets Businessmen

DUNSMUIR.—Harold (Biz) Johnson, Roseville, candidate for the 2nd Congressional post being vacated by Clair Engle, was introduced to Dunsmuir business and railroad men last week as a man who "knows Northern California problems."

Johnson, who has been a state senator for the past 12 years, talked at a breakfast meeting at the Travelers Hotel. Potential recreational development, water conservation and power development were his principal topics. Johnson said his views coincide with those of Clair Engle and that he has a harmonious working relationship with Assemblywoman Pauline Davis and Sen. Randolph Collier.

William L. Gunlock, assisting in Johnson's Siskiyou County campaign, introduced him. Johnson included Yreka, Scott Valley, Butte Valley and Tulelake in a rapid tour of the county.
