

# Little Rock High School Gives Diploma To Negro

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP)—Principal Jess W. Matthews an almost inaudible murmur was heard among the 5,000 spectators. Green arrived in a taxi and walked unescorted to the meeting point of seniors. Detectives escorted him to another taxi after the ceremony.

Among the eight Negro spectators was the Rev. Martin Luther King of Montgomery, Ala., leader of the widely publicized bus boycott there.

About 100 policemen took positions throughout the stadium. Some 120 guardsmen occupied the school building and the underside of the vacant stadium wing where they were out of sight. All traffic around the school was blocked off when the commencement began.

After Green got his diploma there was an exodus from the stadium of newsmen and spectators who apparently had come to see him be graduated.

Several teen-agers had showed up at the gate with counterfeit entrance tickets. They were turned away.

For the first time in recent years there was no formal speaking at the commencement. Instead, the seniors presented a choral reading, "The Story of Arkansas."

The only reference to the unprecedented school year, marked with opening violence, was made by class president Ronnie Hubbard in a short statement.

"Ever since September we have been in the world spotlight," he said. "We have met the challenge with humility and have produced a school spirit stronger than ever."

Only one student, polo-cropped Robert Van Shaw, received an individual ovation. Shaw's class valedictory was done by means of an intercommunication system between home and school.

Gov. Orval Faubus called out guardsmen last September to prevent nine Negroes, including Green, from entering Central High.

Later President Eisenhower federalized the entire Arkansas Guard and sent paratroopers to enforce court-ordered integration at Central. The number of soldiers on duty gradually dwindled to the present force.

Seven Negroes remain as pupils at Central. A legal effort now is under way to get them out.

There were no incidents at the football stadium.

"I'm happy that's all over," said Ernest Green, the lanky 16-year-old Negro who made history. "I'm going to New York to live it up."

Green said a New York hotel restaurant had invited him to spend a week's vacation there beginning June 12. He said he hopes to enter Michigan State next fall and embark on a law career.

Last night Green sat impressively with 601 other seniors on the football field. As he received a diploma and congratulations from

# Navy Satellite Winds Up Like First - In The Sea

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—The second of the Navy's basketball-sized satellites wound up today like the first—at the bottom of the Atlantic Ocean.

Last night's Vanguard launching appeared at the start to be perfect.

Within minutes, an optimistic Navy announcement said the engines in all three stages of the rocket had fired in proper sequence.

In quick succession thereafter, the satellite's signals were picked up at down-range listening posts in the Bahamas Islands and the British West Indies.

Then came a confusing silence. In San Diego, Calif., where radio receptions brought first word that the United States' third satellite was in orbit and had completed their first trips around the earth, listeners waited in vain.

Hours after the launching, a baffled Vanguard spokesman in Washington said "we honestly don't know" if the sphere went into orbit.

"We've had an abnormal flight," said Dr. Richard W. Porter, chairman of the Vanguard satellite panel.

There had been high optimism here until the continued silence at San Diego blasted all hopes of a successful launching.

# TV Brutality Getting Worse

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Crime and brutality on television are getting worse, says the National Assn. for Better Radio and Television.

An association report for the week of May 23 listed 223 killings in the program aired before 9 p.m. by the seven Los Angeles stations.

"Our report indicates that crime on TV has reached an all-time peak," Clara S. Logan, association president, said yesterday.

She said the survey resulted in the tabulation:

Crimes for the week totaled 16 murders, 60 so-called justifiable killings, 2 suicides, 192 attempted murders, 83 robberies, 15 kidnappings, 24 conspiracies to commit murder, 21 jailbreaks, 7 attempted lynchings, 6 dynamitings, 11 extortions, 2 cases of arson and 2 cases of physical torture.

# Nation Receives Unknown Dead Of Two Wars Today

WASHINGTON (AP)—With three days of ceremonial honors ahead, the nation receives formally today the Unknowns of World War II and Korea.

They reposed last night side by side on the altar of the destroyer Blandy, they proceeded to the Capitol to be acclaimed by the Congress, the Supreme Court, Cabinet undersecretaries and foreign diplomats.

Beneath the dome in the Capitol rotunda, they will lie in state in twin bronze caskets until Friday, when they will be transported to permanent tombs alongside that of the Unknown Soldier of World War I.

They reached Washington yesterday aboard the Blandy, which brought them from a seaborne rendezvous at which the two were selected to symbolize for all time

# Ex-HST Aides Seek Probation

ST. LOUIS (AP)—T. Lamar Caudle and Matthew J. Connelly, former Truman administration officials, have asked for probation or reduction of their prison sentences.

Both were convicted in June 1956 by a U.S. District Court jury for conspiracy in an income tax case. They were sentenced to two years in prison and fined \$2,500 each.

The U.S. Supreme Court last week refused for the second time to act on their appeals.

In the petition to District Court here, Connelly claimed his family has no other source of support outside of his income as a public relations consultant. He listed former President Harry Truman and former Secretary of State Dean Acheson as character references.

Caudle's plea said he was a "victim of circumstances."

# Tow Away Nets Near Pupil Riot

LUBBOCK, Tex. (AP)—An attempt to tow away improperly parked cars resulted in a near riot of some 200 Texas Tech male students.

Tech security police called two wreckers yesterday to impound several cars parked on the grass between two dormitories. The wrecker drivers were greeted with catcalls and missiles.

Keith Elkins, one of the drivers, was hit by bottles and a beer can, police said.

Police and sheriff's officers raced to the scene and had to duck bottles and listen to jeers themselves. But the officers moved the veiling students back into the forms.

Dean of Men Lewis Jones said he matter would be "thoroughly checked out."
