**Fortune Left In Mansion**

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—The late James M. West, multimillionaire rancher-oligarch who liked to give away silver dollars, left an estimated \$200,000 in cash in a hidden cellar of his mansion here.

Atty. Robert H. Parsley said the existence of the hidden treasure, in silver dollars and smaller coins, had been kept secret for fear of prowlers in the West home.

An armored car was reported to have made seven trips in carrying the money to the Texas National Bank, where it was piled 5 feet high in an area of 8 by 10 feet in a counting room.

West, a diabetic, died Dec. 18, at the age of 54. An inventory of his estate has not been filed, but unofficial estimates of its value run as high as 100 million dollars.

His idiosyncracies were many. In addition to handing out silver dollars, West frequently rode night patrol with Houston policemen. His home and his fleet of cars, which once included 41 Cadillacs, had elaborate radio equipment. His home also had disappearing doors and other trick devices.

Guards were reported to have crawled under the house to reach the hidden cellar where the money was found in cotton bags, paper sacks, barrels and gallon cans.

Although West inherited money he was said to have multiplied his estate many times through investments and business enterprises.

The primary beneficiaries of his estate are his widow, Mrs. Alice Sneed West, 57; and two daughters, Mrs. Margene Lloyd, Houston, and Mrs. Marian Blakemore, Midland, Tex. Trusts were also established for his four grandchildren.

**Love Tempered By Discipline**

LANSING, Mich. (AP)—Let romance temper discipline. So decreed the Michigan Civil Service Commission yesterday in reinstating a state hospital attendant fired for courtship of a convalescent patient he later married.

Francis W. Lockwood, 54, a Caro State Hospital employee, was restored to his job effective June 2.

Dr. W. W. Dickerson, hospital chief, fired Lockwood March 1 after twice forbidding him to continue the courtship, which he said had a detrimental effect on medical treatment.

Lockwood and the former patient were married April 11—one day after her discharge from hospital care.

**Dulles Talks To Ministers**

NEW YORK (AP)—Which of two types of plants is to survive—the kind that turns out ministers or the kind that turns out atom bombs?

This, John Foster Dulles said last night, is the issue of our time, perhaps the issue of all time.

The secretary of state addressed a dinner of the Board of Directors of Union Theological Seminary. Afterward he and Mrs. Dulles saw their only daughter, Mrs. Lillian Hinshaw, receive her bachelor of divinity degree from the seminary.

"Out in Tennessee there is a plant which turns out bombs," Dulles said at the dinner.

"Here is a plant which turns out ministers of the Gospel."  
 "The two seem remote and unrelated."  
 "Actually, the issue of our time, perhaps the issue of all our human time, is which of the two outputs will prevail."

Dulles, a former member of the seminary board, is the son of a Presbyterian minister. The secretary is also a ruling elder of the Brick Presbyterian Church here.

"Our great theological seminaries, more than any other institutions, are the mainsprings of the spiritual life of our people," Dulles said.

"They are in reality the central power plants upon which men must, above all, depend not merely for their spiritual salvation, but for their material safety."

Mrs. Hinshaw, 43-year-old mother of four, follows her father's faith. Her husband, Robert, is a Quaker.

She has already passed her ordination examinations and hopes to get a part-time job as an assistant minister and be ordained in the fall.

**Jury Frees Racket Figure**

NEW YORK (AP)—Vincent (The Chin) Gigante goes back to his job as a trucker's helper today, acquitted of the attempted assassination of racketeer Frank Costello.

After deliberating more than six hours, an all-male jury freed Gigante late last night.

A gunman fired a single shot at Costello last May in the lobby of his Central Park West apartment building. The bullet only creased the 68-year-old gambler's skull. Gigante, 39, was charged with attempted murder.

The announcement of acquittal by jury foreman Hayward T. Carter to Judge John A. Mullen was the signal for loud applause by about 40 relatives and friends of the hulking, pasty-faced defendant. Gigante sighed with relief and his wife Olympia, mother of four, burst into tears.
