Memorial Day Betting High

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS There was no evidence of tight money at America's racing tracks Memorial Day as 337,309 fans wagered a total of \$20,220,899 on horses of their choice at 13 tracks.

The figures compared favorably with the 1952 Memorial Day when 347,763 turned out at 13 tracks and bet \$20,440,749.

Three tracks, topped by Belmont Park's \$3,815,122, had three-million dollar pay days. The largest crowd, 60,659, at Hollywood Park sent \$3,515,312 through the pari-mutuel machines. Belmont's attendance of 49,508 was second high.
