## Game Inquiry Under Study

MOUNT SHASTA — Methods being used in the legislative inquiry into the State Fish and Game Department brought strong protests recently.

D. E. Warren, president of the Weed Gun Club, charged the investigation is being directed by the department, instead of by the Legislature. "It's like letting a grand jury turn its case over to the suspect," he said. "The man who is making the so-called investigation in this part of the state is Bert Lauckhart, who has been brought here from Washington, where he has been working as a game manager."

"He has been traveling around Northern California with Fred Ross, a game manager for the California Department of Fish and Game. They have been traveling in an official state car, and on state time."

"Both Lauckhart and Ross have been trained in the same theories of game management, and have read from the same books. Ross and his department are under fire. If Lauckhart, under such circumstances, gets the full story of what is being done to our deer herds, for example, it will really be a wonder."

Warren, who also is vice president of the Northern Counties Wildlife Conservation Association, recalled that sportsmen's groups had "been afraid that something like this would happen."

Lauckhart is employed by Booz, Allen and Hamilton, a firm hired by the Legislature to conduct the investigation. Said Warren: "George Difani, executive secretary of the California Wildlife Federation, told the legislative committee that sportsmen wanted no whitewash of the Fish and Game Department. Yet, Seth Gordon, Fish and Game Department director, was consulted by Alan Post, legislative auditor, for the list of companies which could make the investigation."

"Charles Bull, president of our association told the committee it was the first time he had ever known of the defendant to be allowed to pick his own jury."

"Well, from the way things are going, we are afraid that we already know what the jury's verdict will be."

## 4-H NEWS

LAKEVIEW — Larry Maxwell was tops for 4-H and Andy Vandergaw for FFA at the third judging tour sponsored Sunday, May 25, by the 20-40 Farmers.

Maxwell scored 188.7 out of a possible 200 points, and Vandergaw 194.4. The tour was at the Jim Ogle farm and judging and instruction was on dairy cattle. Other scores for 4-H clubbers were Susan Hotchkiss, 172.2; Mary Lynn Fenimore, 169; Jean Leavitt, 163.2, and Sharen Ashcraft, 142.2.

The last instruction session will be on hogs to be given by Dr. Victor Hill and will be at Alturas on June 5. Transportation will be arranged by the 20-40 Farmers.

## Here's A Switch-Novels Written From TV Dramas

NEW YORK (AP)—Numerous novels have been made into television dramas, but now—for the first time—there comes the case of two popular TV dramas growing into a popular novel.

Viewers surely remember two Playhouse 90 (CBS-TV) dramas by Elick Moll concerning a warm-hearted New York dress manufacturer, Morris Seidman; "Seidman and Son, starring Eddie Canot, in October 1956," and "The Gentleman from Seventh Avenue" starring Walter Slezak, last January.

Now, with the publication of Moll's "Seidman and Son" by Putnam, it appears the Seidmans, father and son, will be as popular with readers as with TV-viewers. The novel is a current selection of the Book-of-the-Month-Club, has been purchased by the Reader's Digest Book Club, and its publisher is inundated with orders. Already yet, as Seidman would say, Broadway producers want Moll to make a play of it.

Moll is frankly surprised. The credit, he feels, goes to Seidman rather than Moll.

"Morris Seidman literally seemed to walk into my study," he said the other day. "I rushed into the kitchen and told my wife about him and she said, 'Go back and write, idiot.' So I went back and wrote."

Seidman strolled into Moll's life one day in 1956, bringing with him many of the qualities of Moll's deceased father and father-in-law, both New York garment manufacturers.

First Moll wrote a story about Seidman, which was the basis for his "Playhouse 90" script. Then he wrote another story — and another TV script from that. "Even after that second script,"

he says, "Seidman still wouldn't go away. So I sat down at my typewriter and after a while there was 350 pages finished. My agent sent it to Putnam and they took it immediately."

The book critics generally have responded as warmly to Seidman's warmth as did the television critics.

### More Fun Outdoors
