

Throng Greets SF Giants

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — To the rest of the National League the Giants may look like the flowers that bloom in the spring trail, but to their thousands of San Francisco fans that one-game lead looks almost as good as a pennant.

And it's hard to imagine the Giants could get a bigger, warmer homecoming with the flag in the box than they got Sunday night as they returned from their first road trip still a game in front of Milwaukee.

A crowd of placard-waving well-wishers numbering between 1,500 and 2,000 surged out on the apron at International Airport as the Giants' chartered airliner taxied in from St. Louis at 11:15 p.m. p.d.

Reflecting their pride in the Giants for winning 13 of 21 games during their eastern tour, the fans carried such signs as "All The Way With The Giants," "Giants, We're Proud Of You," and "Welcome Back To America."

ANTONELLI CHERIEED

Johnny Antonelli's winning performance Sunday over the Cardinals was also heralded by the crowd. One placard waved by an enthusiastic fan read: "Antonelli Stucked The Cards."

Acting Mayor Harold Dobbs, Supervisor Francis McCarthy, and Police Chief Frank Ahern were the official welcome as the municipal band played "San Francisco," "California, Here I Come," and "Take Me Out To The Ball Game."

Manager Bill Rigney was the first off the plane and he pleaded that he and the team were tired after a long day. The players filed quickly through the screaming throng to waiting wives and friends.

Willie Mays' homecoming was marred slightly when in the confusion, his brother-in-law walked off with the keys to the car. Willie and his attractive wife, Marguerite, stood patiently by the locked car for a while — and then finally hitched a ride home.

EXPERTS FOILED

The experts at season's start said Mays and Rigney's rookie-spinked team would finish no higher than fifth — and probably seventh.

When the Giants zoomed to the league lead — principally at the expense of the lack-luster Los Angeles Dodgers, these so-called experts nodded wisely and said, "Wait until they get on the road."

Well, they returned from the three-week road trip still in first place — although they open a three-game series with the world champion Braves at Seals Stadium here Tuesday.

But regardless of what the future holds, you couldn't convince anyone at the airport Sunday night that the Giants were not the toast of the National League.

Pitchers Must Have More Than Fast Ball

NEW YORK (UPI) — Joe DiMaggio, who made a career of giving palpitation to pitchers, was explaining why the men of the mound can't live by speed alone.

"They have to possess more than mere speed," he asserted. "A pitcher has to have other pitches to go with it so that he can mix 'em up and shake your leg."

DiMaggio leaned back and concluded: "They could shoot it out of a cannon but, if that was all a pitcher had, they'd hit him."

DIFFERENT THIS YEAR

Which, for years, summed up the hurling career of Robert Lee Turley, a muscular, chubby-faced power thrower who labors in the pin-striped flannels of the New York Yankees. The 6-foot-2 right-hander threw a ball which was clocked electronically at 95 miles per hour, an ability which had the baseball Boswells mentioning

him with such blazers as Walter Johnson and Bullet Bob Feller. But Bob Turley couldn't win consistently.

It is a different Turley this season. For when he beat the Boston Red Sox Sunday it was his eighth victory of the season against one defeat. And, except for that one he has been brilliant.

Four of his triumphs have been shutouts. He has gone nine innings in each of his eight victories. At one point he went 26 innings without giving up a run. He has hurled a one hit game, three games in which he gave up only four hits and a pair of five-hitters.

CHANGED STYLE

As of today, in 76 innings Turley has allowed but 44 hits, 16 earned runs and given up only 36 bases on balls against 53 strikeouts.

The answer is in DiMaggio's reckoning. Turley realized at last that he couldn't just rear back and fire that blazing fast ball past the hitters. In taking stock of himself, he shortened his stride, adopted Don Larsen's no-windup delivery and relaxed before each pitch by taking a deep breath.

He found that all the parts suddenly fitted together. No longer through the wall, he came up with the long-desired control of his curve and slider. The batter who waited longingly for that booming fast one weren't getting it.

"The most complete answer is that I found the confidence to use those slower pitches in the clutch instead of rearing back and trying to throw it past them," he says. "The hitters can't get that fast ball every time I get in a jam."

As DiMaggio said, you have to have more than a fast ball. Turley has, and that's his answer.
