

Campaign Expenses Listed By Governor Candidates

SALEM (AP) — The nine candidates for governor in the Oregon primary reported campaign expenditures totaling \$111,585, but contributions amounting to only \$85,130.

Secretary of State Mark Hatfield announced the figures Monday.

State Treasurer Sig Unander, defeated candidate for the Republican nomination, conducted the most expensive campaign. He reported spending \$37,175, but had only 196 contributors who gave \$26,392. This left his campaign organization \$10,783 in the red.

Gov. Robert D. Holmes, who won Democratic renomination, was even farther in the hole. His expenditures totaled \$26,633, and there were only 61 contributions totaling \$10,411.

All of the contributions include what the candidates spent themselves, but Holmes didn't report spending any of his own money.

Figures for other candidates: Wiley Smith, Democrat—Ten contributions totaling \$2,692; total expenditures, \$2,692.

Lew Wallace, Democrat—6 contributions totaling \$9,383; total expenditures, \$9,132.

Hatfield, who won Republican nomination—727 contributions totaling \$21,847; total expenditures, \$21,574.

Warren Gill, Republican—265 contributions totaling \$13,443; total expenditures, \$13,418.

Albert Eichman, Republican—Spent \$399.78 of his own money; no contributions.

George W. Livingston, Republican—Three contributions totaling \$559; total expenditures \$559.

Orval E. Rasor, Republican—No expenditures or contributions. The amount that each candidate reported spending of his own money were:

Holmes, none; Wallace, \$2,000; Smith, \$2,500; Eichman, \$399; Gill, \$1,119; Hatfield, \$421; Livingston, \$523; Rasor, none; Unander, \$1,493.

Following are contributions of \$500 or more for each candidate: Holmes—Oregon Labor Council, \$2,500; Thomas Mahoney, United Steel Workers, George Brown and Pat Dooley, \$500 each; Ben Anderson, \$550.

Wallace—George Lavey and Ellen Bechtold, \$1,000 each; Glenn Matteson, Dr. Emery Ingham, Leo Hogan, \$500 each.

Gill—Walter Miller, \$1,225; Eugene E. Laird, \$751; W. S. Ouder-kirk, \$581.

Hatfield—Larry Teeple, \$1,000; H. G. Horn, Charles E. Cook, F. Anderson, \$500 each.

Unander—Thomas W. Dant, Ernest G. Swigert, Morris Linde, \$1,000 each; George C. Sheahan and Ralph E. Williams Jr., \$750 each; George Brice Jr., Charles A. Sprague, G. S. Hinsdale, T. W. Young, Gale Livingston, Robert E. Dant, Stanton, Boles, McGuire & Church, S. I. Jagger, Tom Chamberlin, Henry A. Buehner, Ted Gamble, \$500 each; John C. Higgins, \$1,000; and Elwin J. Timber Group Holds School

LAKEVIEW — Timber Management Training School was held on the Fremont Thursday and Friday, May 22 and 23. Eighteen timber management men and rangers from the six districts participated in this meeting. They were trained in timber cruising and log grading. Winner of the log grading test was Bill Augustine, assistant ranger, of the Drews Valley District. Winner of the timber cruising test was Bob Lehman, forester on the Warner District. The training session was held in the Roger Meadow area on the Warner District.

Chief instructor was Forrest Jones, timber staff assistant in the supervisor's office of the Fremont National Forest.

Cruising methods taught included the latest techniques, and employed the use of a wedge shaped prism. This method, known as the variable plot method, was first developed in Germany and introduced in the United States in 1932, and is now finding wide use by foresters in this country.
