Helen Steele Dies At 81

Mrs. Helen J. (Lala) Steele, 81, longtime resident of the Klamath Basin, died Tuesday, June 3, at Good Samaritan Hospital, Portland, where she had been a patient for the last three months.
She was born on the Hecker family ranch near Albany, Oregon, September 17, 1876, and was married to the late Robert W. Steele, October 26, 1896.
Together, in 1906, they pioneered the Snake River Valley country in the Twin Falls, Idaho area, and moved to the Klamath Basin in 1931. Mrs. Steele lived in Merrill until 1950 when she moved to the Steele Ranch near Klamath Falls.
Mrs. Steele was active in community affairs and was well known throughout the Klamath Basin and in the Salem and Portland areas where she was a frequent visitor.
Survivors include one son, J. R. Steele, Klamath Falls; a sister, Mrs. Emma Anderson, Sacramento, a granddaughter, Mrs. Malcolm Epley Jr., and two great-grandchildren, Janet and Mark Epley, all of Portland.
Funeral services will be held from St. Mary's Cathedral in Portland, Friday, June 6, at 9:30 a.m. Final rites and interment will be in the family plot, Lincoln Memorial Cemetery, Portland. The Finley Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements.

candidate for governor to lead a Republican opponent in the combined vote. He said he would continue to campaign on what he described as "bread and butter issues."
Knowland said the primary was "just the opening skirmish" and added that he expected "to be elected governor—and I hope to be re-elected governor after four years."
The senator said he would campaign intensively "from the Oregon line to the Mexican border" after Congress adjourns in September. Women in his family had done most of the campaigning for him in the past.

The 49-year-old Knowland based his campaign on a labor union reform program and his record of 19 years as a legislator in Sacramento and Washington.
Knowland's duties in the nation's capital restricted his campaigning. His wife Helen and Estelle pinch-hit for him in a chartered bus which carried them over most of the state.
Brown, 51, now serving his second term as attorney general, again displayed that he is the Democrats' best Klamath voter. On his own ticket he outpolled Knowland more than 4-1 and got roughly a third of the vote on the GOP ticket.

Because Democratic registration exceeds Republican in the state, Brown's showing was significant in considering the November general election. Knowland would have to get a substantial Democratic switch to become governor.
Many Republicans have looked on the tall, heavy-set senator as a possible presidential candidate in 1964. He already has said he considers Vice President Richard Nixon as the party's likeliest nominee in 1960.

Oregon Weather

Oregon after a prolonged period of cool showers began warming up Wednesday.
At Blue River reappeared, late-afternoon clouds that partly cleared away, probably would persist through Thursday and that there was a chance of light showers again Saturday.
But the temperatures should continue to climb slowly through the next few days, Weather Bureau forecasters said.
Snow that blanketed the high Cascades Monday night and early Tuesday began to melt in many areas. At Prater Lake National Park the total fall was five inches, but it had melted from the roads by Wednesday morning.

Road Commission Okays Projects

The State Highway Commission has approved an estimated \$225,000 with which to construct two highway projects in Klamath County, it was reported today.
Largest job is a new, five-mile long paved road from the north-east boundary of the Klamath Reservation, through Fremont National Forest to connect with a paved road now under construction in Lake County. The two roads will meet at the county line. Cost of this Klamath project is estimated at \$185,000.
The commission approved an estimated \$40,000 for a new bridge over the Lost River in Langell Valley. The present bridge, to be replaced, is too narrow and otherwise inadequate. The new bridge will be wider and have walkways on either side.
The State Highway Department notified Klamath County Court that both projects would be advertised for bids from contractors as soon as plans and specifications have been prepared. This will probably be by mid-summer or early fall.

when voting heavily for Clair Engle to occupy the U.S. Senate seat vacated by Bill Knowland. Engle polled 2,673 Democratic votes and 1,138 on the Republican side.
Knight received only 294 Democratic votes of the number tabulated, and polled 838 on the Republican side.
In the Siskiyou County races, it appeared certain that the incumbents in four contests had been returned to their seats. With 51 of 73 precincts reported, Sheriff Al Cotter was leading Roy Zanni 4,897 to 1,489. Incumbent Earl Ager, supervisor of District 1, was well in front of Joe G. Allen with a margin of 1,230 to 499. It also appeared certain that Clint Jackson, incumbent supervisor of District 3, was back in office for another four-year term. With two thirds of the precincts having reported he was leading Wayne O. Babin 596 to 257.

With only two precincts remaining to be counted, Scott Bar and Quarta Valley, it appeared that District 3 supervisor, Don Avery, would go back for another four-year term with a larger vote than the combined total of his three opponents. Unofficially reported indicated that Avery had 541 compared with 212 for Burger (41 for Scapp, and 211 for Ernest Hayden).

In the race for justice judge of the Yreka District it was a certainty 1958 the runoff in November will be between Attorney Harry Hammond, incumbent, and Attorney George Tyler, now the chief deputy in the district attorney's office. With the almost complete count in Tyler was leading the pack of four candidates with 452 votes. Hammond had 494, Aaron Westbrook had 301, and Carl Johnson had 218.

Incumbent Clerk Rachel Cordes was running well ahead of her two opponents with the combined total of votes for Lloyd Johnson and Bob Oland indicated that the absentee ballots may decide whether the race goes into the November general election with Cordes and Oland.

The incomplete returns for two thirds of the precincts gave Mrs. Cordes 3,218 votes, 2,254 for Oland, and 928 for Johnson.
In addition to the remaining precincts out in the county, there are approximately 800 absentee ballots which will be canvassed and counted on June 11.
With seven of eight December precincts having reported, A. A. Smith, incumbent justice judge, had 702 votes compared with 377 for E. F. Mason. The remaining precinct does not have a sufficient number of votes to affect the Smith lead.
The results in unreported races have not been included in this report.

WINS EASILY

LOS ANGELES (AP) — James Bonanza, 49, won the life President Franklin D. Roosevelt easily won re-election to the United States in Congress, selling a big lead in yesterday's Democratic primary. He faces Negro attorney Charles Wright, Republican, in November.

Slight Drop Noted In Shasta Rainfall

MOUNT SHASTA — Precipitation for May in Mount Shasta registered 13.9 inches. This was 28 inches below normal for the month.
Added to the 82.87 inches total to the end of April, the aggregate is within 8.21 inches of the all-time high which fell during the weather year of 1909-10 when 73.47 inches flooded the area.
The past month was the first in five months when the precipitation was below the normal for the period.
When 47 inches of rain measured the first 36 hours of June, there is a likelihood that the current year will climb to the second year on the record book. During the year 1940-41 the total was 67.21 inches, but 2.34 inches are needed to tie that mark.

OPPOSITIONS CLASH
LISBON, Portugal (AP) — Police clashed with followers of opposition presidential candidate Gen. Humberto Delgado Tuesday night at Porto in northern Portugal. A number of people were injured. Adm. Antonio Tavares, presidential candidate of Premier Antonio Salazar's National Union, had made his final speech at the campaign when Delgado supporters appeared.
