Station Gets New Tools

MOUNT SHASTA—Geiger counters, dosimeter chargers, and other scientific equipment are now a part of the instruments with which the Mount Shasta Weather Bureau is equipped. These have no place in weather forecasts, but are now used to inspect the area for dangerous nuclear fallout.

According to Joseph McBride, official in charge of the federal civil defense setup for this region, there may be more danger from radiation here than near larger cities.

McBride explained that planes attacking San Francisco would undoubtedly come from the north. Detection would occur before they reached here, and interception would probably be in this region where the flight would be restricted because of mountain ranges. Dogfights would bring radiation dangers to all living things here.

The weather office is equipped with a duplicate in each instrument, one for use and a spare for emergency. Reports will be made weekly, and may be made at any time that such is considered necessary. Tied into a teletype system with more than 500 subscribers, dissemination of news from here would be rapid, and to all parts of the nation.

McBride will work in direct touch with Frank Asbell and Wade English, who, with forest service personnel, will inspect the community for any dangerous fallout.
