Little Leaguers Prepare For 1958 Season Opener

The Klamath Falls summer baseball program for 19, 11 and 12-year-old boys is rapidly nearing the opening of its first season as an official member of the National Little League, Incorporated, it was reported today by Gene Favell, local association president.

Arrangements have finally been completed to bring the six team league under the national association heading, Favell stated that the franchise was expected momentarily from Little League headquarters.

Under the new affiliation, the teams, each composed of 15 boys (six aged 12, five 11-year-olds and

four, aged 10), will play according to official Little League rules on regulation diamonds with the pitcher's box 44 feet distant from the plate and basepaths of 60 feet.

National rules stipulate that a new member to the association must play under national league supervision for one year before being allowed to compete in the regional, state or national play-offs, Favell explained. Because of the tremendous interest and response evidenced in local Little League play, it is hoped that next season will see the addition of more leagues and teams to this year's nucleus, Favell continued.

From 40 to 50 boys turned out for

births on each of the six, 15 man squads as this season opened. Lack of facilities restricts the league to its present size.

Teams and coaches represented in the league include Johns-Manville (Loren Binney, Clay Hanson), Bob's Union Service (Marvin Cunningham, Bill Christensen), Car-Ad-Co (Bud Adkins), Weyerhaeuser-Don's (B. M. Adams), Parks Cabinet, Moyina Heights (Ray Kaufman), and Hal's Sport Shop (George Sprague).

As a kickoff prior to the start of regular league play each of the above teams in their new uniforms will play the other in a Little League Jamboree to be held at Gem Stadium, Monday evening, June 9. The general public is invited and there is no admission charge.

The regular season is scheduled to start Wednesday, June 11, at Klamath Union High's Wright Field. The use of Wright Field as the site of the Little League games was made possible through the cooperation of the Klamath Union High School Board, according to Favell.

Working with Favell at the head of the Little League group is Doris Abernathy, league secretary, Wendy Huettl, jamboree chairman, Bert Smith, financial chairman and Jack Kemnitzer, city recreation official who has worked closely with the league.

KF Kubs Schedule Two Tilts

The Klamath Falls Kubs, leading the Northern California League with three straight victories, take a night away from league competition Friday evening as they travel to Camp White to meet the local semi-pro club in a single game. Sunday the Kubs return to Gem Stadium to meet Mount Shasta in league play.

Tonight's game will be the first outside opponent for the Kubs this year. Earlier in the season, Klamath lost a 5-4 nod to Mount Shasta in a practice contest.

Manager Irv Whitt's Kubs have knocked down three straight triumphs in league play and could strengthen their hold on the top position by dumping Mount Shasta here Sunday. The Kubs' weekend foe is regarded as one of the teams to beat in this year's race for the title.

Game time is 2 o'clock. Other Sunday NCL games find Weed at Scott Valley and Yreka at Dunsuir.

Last week, Klamath edged Yreka 10-8 to slip the Indians into a four-way tie for second place with a 2-2 record. Battling for the lead and a game and a half behind Klamath are Yreka, Dunsuir, Mount Shasta and Weed. Scott Valley is solidly entrenched in the cellar with three losses.

Going into tonight's game, first baseman George Hanson leads the team's hitting parade, clubbing the ball at a .533 pace. Hanson has collected eight hits in 15 at bats in the three games played to date. Outfielder Floyd Linderman is second high on the batting list, but leads the Kubs in homers and runs batted in.

Klamath meets Bend's legion team in a single game Saturday night, then plays a doubleheader Sunday afternoon on the Bend basepaths. In the first game, Klamath and Bend tangle with Redmond meeting Klamath in the nightcap of the twin bill.

This will be the opening play of the year with Klamath and Redmond, Bend's legion team, comprised of many of the players who represented Bend's District 8-A-1 high school championship team, already has two games behind it.

Field Paced By McMullin

DALLAS (AP)—In 24 golf tournaments this year only one player of 44 who led or tied for the lead in the first round came through with the championship.

Thus jittery John McMullin, the hungry-looking fellow from Fair Oaks, Calif., who has won much less than expenses on the tour, faces some great odds as he sets out today ahead of the pack in the \$25,000 Dallas Open.

McMullin, 23, who lives at Alameda, Calif., and whose wife is expecting at Palo Alto, laid down a 6-under-par 64 yesterday to take the first-round lead. It gave him a 2-stroke bulge over five shot-makers—Tony Lema, Napa, Calif.; Doug Sanders, Miami, Fla.; and Gary Player, Johannesburg, South Africa.

At 67 were two of the pre-tournament favorites, Sam Snead, White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., the defending champion, and Billy Maxwell, Odessa, Tex. Mike Souchak, Grossinger's, N. Y., and Julius Boros, Mid Pines, N. C., also had 67s while another of the big favorites, Ken Venturi, San Francisco, wound up with a 68.

Snead, who was disgusted with his putting on the sun-baked 6,489-yard Oak Cliff Country Club course, was matching his rounds of the past two days, one a practice affair and the other in a pro-amateur, "If I could putt I'd had a 60," he snarled.

McMullin's putter got hotter than the 95-degree weather as he came in on the last nine with a 5-under-par 30, using only 13 putts.

Terry, 22, poured it on, walking but three and fanning seven. He gave up a lead-off triple to Pascual in the 10th, then walked a pair intentionally to load the bases and got slugger Roy Sievers to hit into a line-drive double play.

Pascual (3-4) had a six-hit shutout for 12. But Vic Power singled for his third hit in the 13th and then came the homer by Held.
