On May 23, the marriage of Gloria Maxine Roberts to Thomas Eugene Highland was solemnized in Mt. Laki Community Church at 7 p.m. The Rev. H. M. Warkle of Klamath Falls Zion Lutheran Church officiated at the candlelight double-ring service in the presence of some 150 guests.

The bride is the daughter of Mrs. LeRoy (Roy) Roberts, Merrill Highway, and the late LeRoy Roberts. Parents of the bridegroom are Mr. and Mrs. John Highland, 1316 Wiard.

Gloria, escorted down the aisle by her young brother, Dennis, wore a floor length gown of nylon lace and tulle. The bodice was designed with a scalloped Sabrina neckline, bridal pointed sleeves and a cascade of alternating lace and tulle ruffles at the back. Medallions of lace applique were scattered touches at each side of the billowing skirt. A pearl-and-rhinestone-trimmed tiara held her fingertip veil, and she carried a white Bible topped with a small bouquet of two cymbidium orchids bordered with stephanotis florets and tied with long streamers of white satin and stephanotis. The Bible was a gift from the bridegroom. Her only jewelry was a pair of small pearl earrings, borrowed from the bridegroom's
