

Berra Blast Boosts Runaway Yanks; Mays Hitless In San Francisco Win

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Al Worthington pitched no-hit ball for four innings in relief Saturday as the San Francisco Giants beat Cincinnati 7-3 and took first place in the National League.

The victory, scored before a crowd of 20,279, put the Giants a game ahead of the Milwaukee Braves who lost to the Los Angeles Dodgers Saturday night 5-2.

San Francisco's victory came despite star center fielder Willie Mays' failure to collect a hit.

Mays, after a sensational week, hitting .433 going into Saturday's game, cooled off, although he was credited with two runs batted in. His batting average is still a lousy .424.

The defeat left the defending world champions one game behind the San Francisco Giants in the National League pennant chase. The Dodgers' victory left Walter Alston's operatives just a game out of seventh place.
