Mount Shasta handed the Klamath Falls Kubs their first defeat in Northern California League baseball play this year Sunday afternoon at Gem Stadium, but it wasn't until the visitors scored three

times in the top of the eighth inning that the league leaders bowed. Going into the weekly league encounter, Klamath had strung three straight NCL victories together and led by a game and a half. Now that leads stands at only a half-game.

Klamath's Dave D'Oliveo and Mount Shasta's Bob Lawry locked into the best pitching duel seen by the league so far this year before Lawry's teammates gave him the winning margin. Lawry gave up only three hits, walked six and struck out six. D'Oliveo was reached for seven hits, three in the fatal eighth, walked four and struck out five in his first start for the Kubs this season.

Mount Shasta broke open the game's tight defensive battle in

their half of the eighth when Rick Palfini and Lyle Chambers put together a pair of back-to-back singles with one out. Gene English was safe on Jerry Burke's fielding error allowing Palfini to score from second base as Mount Shasta broke the ice.

Mickey Risberg, the next batter, drove one of D'Oliveo's offerings for a double that scored both Chambers and English. Risberg attempted to stretch his hit into a triple but was thrown out at third. D'Oliveo forced the next batter to ground out to end the inning.

Mount Shasta threatened in the first inning, when D'Oliveo walked three men to load the bases with one out. But he struck out the next batter and got the third out on an infield roller.

Klamath Falls had its opportunity to score in the seventh and started a fire in the ninth, but on both occasions, Lawry put down the challenge. In the seventh, the Kubs had runners on first and third but the inning ended without damage.

In the last inning, Jerry Burke walked with no one out. Scott Hartley forced Burke at second on a fielder's choice but Bob Kelly followed with a line drive shot at second baseman Bob Cottini who threw to first baseman Risberg to double off Hartley for the third out of the inning and the game.

All of the other Northern California League action were washed out Sunday. The games — Weed at Scott Valley and Yreka at Dunsmuir — were rained out and will be made up at a later date.

Bend Sweeps Legion Series From Klamath

BEND — A lack of base hits slowed the opening weekend of the Klamath Falls American Legion Junior Baseball season Saturday and Sunday as the visiting Klamath nine bowed in three straight games to Bend's legion club.

In three games, Klamath was held to five scattered hits, all singles. Estlin Kiger was the lone Klamath player to use his bat as he singled three times. The other two hits went to Blake Griggs and Bob Yuncik.

Saturday night, Bend used three hurlers in setting Klamath Falls down 12-2 on a two-batter. Dick Riley, Gary Joanis and Tim McCarthy shared the pitching chores and gave up single runs in the fourth and seventh innings to their visitors.

A four-run third inning by Bend, backed up by a five-run fourth

frame was more than enough to stop Klamath's season debut. Jim Connolly batted out three hits in four trips to the plate, including timely singles in the third and fourth innings. Bob Allen had two hits, both coming in the two big innings for Bend.

Sunday, Klamath met Bend in a doubleheader and fell 7-4 while getting no hits. In the second game of the afternoon twinbill, Bend trimmed Klamath 3-0.

Bend took advantage of no-hit pitching by Gary Haugen and Tom Cecil to stop Klamath in the opener. Klamath scored its runs—two in the second and one each in the third and sixth—on walks and errors. Bend broke the game open with three runs in the first and another trip of scores in the second off Klamath starter Keith Farrell. Cal Bauer's strike with two men on was the big blow in the first inning and his bases loaded, two-out, double in the second hurt Klamath. Bauer finished the game hitting, two-for-two after walking in the fifth.

In the nightcap, Rick Newell gave Klamath three hits, two by Kiger. Klamath pitchers Pat Salvadori and Smiley Herrera limited Bend to only two hits, but one was a two-run double off the bat of John McDonald in the second inning. Herrera, who finished up the game on the mound for Klamath set the last seven batters down in order.

Klamath threatened in the first when Griggs opened with a single and went to third on Kiger's first hit of the game. But Jim Hall flew to centerfield to end the inning. Klamath had runners on third in the third and fifth innings, but couldn't push across a score.

Klamath faces homelife opposition this week in four games at Gem Stadium. Wednesday night, Bend returns Klamath's trip with a single game invasion. Friday evening, the Chiloquin Cubs tangle with the legion baseballers and Sunday afternoon Medford plays a doubleheader at Gem Stadium. Game time Wednesday and Friday is 8 p.m. and Sunday the first game is set for 1 o'clock.

Injury Stops Derby Horse

NEW YORK (UPI) — Calumet Farm's Tim Tam, a victim of racing's most tragic injury and one of the sport's greatest upsets, has run his last race, the veterinarian who X-rayed the colt's leg predicted today.

"It's unlikely that any attempt will be made to race Tim Tam again," Dr. William N. Wright told United Press International. "He's such a good horse I personally think it would be foolish to jeopardize his potential value as a stud horse by risking further injury."

Tim Tam, the hero of the Kentucky Derby and Preakness, sustained a broken bone in his right foreleg Saturday while finishing second behind Irish-bred Cavan in the Belmont Stakes.

Tim Tam is not suffering any great pain but is "a little uncomfortable," Dr. Wright reported. He added cold compresses are being applied to the leg to reduce the swelling. An operation might be performed later to remove the bone chip.

Trainer Jimmy Jones viewed three sets of X-rays Sunday before returning to Calumet headquarters at Lexington, Ky. He declined to predict whether Tim Tam ever will race again, stating only "We'll just have to wait and see." However, he didn't sound too hopeful.

UO, OSC Eye New Grid Foes

Oregon and Oregon State, the defending co-champions of a shrinking Pacific Coast Conference, are going far away from the Pacific Coast for future football games.

With the breakup of the conference almost assured, Oregon said Saturday it plans a pair of games with Pittsburgh.

Oregon, nipped 6-3 by the Pennsylvania team last season, said it will play Pitt Sept. 19, 1964, at Multnomah Stadium in Portland.

A second game also has been scheduled, but no date yet is set.

Oregon State Saturday announced five games—all but four of which are against teams away from the Pacific Coast.

OSC will meet Baylor in a pair of games, the first in Portland Oct. 5, 1963, and the second the following Oct. 3 in Waco, Texas.

Also set are two games with Oregon State and Indiana. The first game will be in Bloomington, Ind., Nov. 9, 1963. The return game is set for Portland Nov. 7, 1964.

The fifth game announced will match OSC against College of the Pacific Oct. 20, 1962.

OSC Athletic Director Roy Kenne said the games complete Oregon State's 10-game-a-year schedules through 1964.

The Boston Red Sox had an 18-6 record for double header action in 1957. They swept eight double headers, split two twin bills and twice lost double headers.

Middlecoff Top Pick For U.S. Open Title

TULSA, Okla. (UPI)—Those who know the game the best, the playing pros, singled out Cary Middlecoff as the favorite and Frank Stranahan and Mike Souchak as the leading dark-horses today for the U.S. pen golf championship.

Their evaluation of the three-day, 72-hole medal play tournament which starts Thursday over the Southern Hills country club course differed from that of the golfers who competed in the Dallas Open, which Sam Snead won Sunday for the second year in a row.

At Dallas the Open choice was Ben Hogan, shooting for an unprecedented fifth Open title, with Snead and Bill Maxwell as the second choices. And the way Hogan played nine holes in practice Sunday, winding up with a two under par 3 on the front nine, despite three-putting the ninth hole, would seem to bear them out.

Miss Crocker finished with a six over par 76 to take second place money with a 294 total but it was a different story for Miss Hanson. She blew sky high in a "hard-duck" round which saw her soar to a 15-over 83.

They needed a slide rule to divide third place money between four players tied with 285. They were Jackie Pung, of Honolulu; Betty Jameson, San Antonio, Tex.; Peggy Irlk Bell, Southern Pines, N.C.; and Joyce Ziske, of Waterford, Wis.

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Dodgers Rap Milwaukee; Cleveland Bombs Yankees

Those stories of the Los Angeles Dodgers' collapse were just a bit premature as far as the Milwaukee Braves are concerned. And, you'll have to excuse the Cleveland Indians for laughing up their sleeves at reports of the New York Yankees' invincibility.

The Dodgers made it a "lost weekend" for the Braves Sunday when they swept their three-game series with a 12-4 rout that extended the world champions' losing streak to four games. The Braves never lost more than three straight games en route to the NL pennant last season and their pitching staff has been thoroughly chewed up during the last week.

The Indians, meanwhile, spoiled matters for New York's largest baseball turnout of the year, 40,000, when they whipped the American League leaders, 14-1 and 5-4. The first-game loss was the most humiliating of the year for the mighty Yankees and the double defeat was the second in 10 days.

A crowd of 57,122 at Los Angeles saw the Dodgers rack up four Milwaukee pitchers for 19 hits, including four each by Carl Furillo and Don Zimmer. Johnny Podres was tagged for 11 hits but went the distance for his fifth in a row at the Coliseum and his sixth win of the season.

Moe Drabowsky pitched a one-hitter to give the Chicago Cubs a 4-0 victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates. Don Hoak's three runs batted in lifted the Cincinnati Reds to a 6-3 decision over the Baltimore Orioles. The Philadelphia Phillies beat the St. Louis Cardinals, 6-4, in 14 innings after losing, 6-5, in 10 in other NL games.

In the other AL action, the Boston Red Sox swept the Chicago White Sox, 6-5 in 10 innings and 4-1, the Washington Senators shaded the Detroit Tigers, 4-3, and the Kansas City Athletics split a doubleheader with the Baltimore Orioles, winning, 2-1, after a 4-0 defeat.
