SANGER (UPI) — West Coast track and field stars, plus a band of touring competitors, headed today into the final two weeks of the 1958 season after hurdling tune-up meets during the weekend.

Friday night's Compton Relays featured a fine performance by Australia's Herb Elliott, who was clocked in the mile at 3:38.1. But the Central California AAU Track and Field Championships here Saturday night were nearly blown away by strong winds.

The college stars will tackle Friday and Saturday in the National College Athletic Association finals in Berkeley, while Elliott and the non-collegians have the weekend off to await the national AAU finals in Bakersfield June 21-22.

Northwest Clubs Divide Sunday Tilts

Taking defeat good naturedly doesn't appear to go with the Wenatchee Chiefs because Sunday they lost the opener of a Northwest League doubleheader to Yakima, 4-2, became furious and trampled the Bears in the nightcap, 21-1.

There was nothing exciting about the first three innings of the second game, aside from Wenatchee scoring three runs in the first, two in the second and three in the third.

But that fourth frame was a dilly. The Chiefs exploded for seven straight hits, took a breather with a walk, and then whacked another hit. During the rally, Jim Passilla hit a three-run homer and Jake Azcue came through with a two-run double. Meanwhile, the Bears managed to pick up their lone run but the inning ended with Wenatchee picking up a total of eight tallies.

Wenatchee now has a 28-19 record and Yakima has won 24 and lost 22 for third place. Saturday, Yakima defeated Wenatchee 10-6.

In the other Sunday game, Lewiston, still in first place with a 31-12 record, split a doubleheader with last place Salem, the Senators winning the opener 3-2 but dropping the second game 4-2. Wet grounds postponed a scheduled doubleheader between Tri-City and Eugene.

Rain Saturday cancelled Tri-City at Eugene and Lewiston at Salem.

DeCola Favored In TV Ring Test

NEW YORK (UPI) — Welterweight Tony DeCola of Brooklyn is a slight favorite at 6-5 to beat Peter Schmidt of New York tonight in their (Dumont) TV 10-rounder at Nicholas Arena.

Bartender Schmidt, 24, held popular Eddie Lynch to a surprise draw in his last start, May 12, at St. Nick's.

DeCola, 21, gave highly favored (17-3) Frankie Ryff a surprisingly close fight at St. Nick's Feb. 3 and lost a split decision. DeCola's 25-12-1 list includes three kayoes. He was stopped once.

Norton was handed his second loss of the season in the 100-yard dash when Oklahoma State's Orlando Hazley made a better start and a stronger finish. Both Norton and Hazley were clocked in 9.4 seconds with a six-mile tailwind.

Hazley later competed in the 880-yard relay in which he and his teammates were clocked in 1:24.8. Hazley accounted for a five-yard

lead in the first section of the race. The Southern California Striders were second.

Other standout performers at the Sanger show included:

—Eddie Southern of Texas University, who ran the 440 in 46.1.

—Perry O'Brien, world champion shot putter, O'Brien made five throws of over 60 feet, the best being 61 feet 3 3/4 inches.

—Lazlo Tabori, the Hungarian miler from Santa Clara. He covered the two-mile event in 9:07.1.

—Ansel Robins of Fresno State, who won the 220-yard low hurdles in 22.4, and took the 120 high hurdles in 14.2.

—Rink Babka of the University of Southern California. Babka won the discus with a toss of 177 feet, 9 3/4 inches against a strong wind.

—Ron Morris of the Striders, who pole vaulted 14 feet, 10 1/8 inches.

—Dick Knaub of UCLA, winner of the broadjump with a jump of 24 feet, 10 inches.

—No Indian massacre was more thoroughly carried out than when the Dodgers ambushed Milwaukee Sunday by a 12-4 score. It was the fifth straight win of the season against the Braves and it swept the three-game series for Los Angeles.

The triple scalping was performed before the largest attendance in National League history for a three-game series. The 57,122 who turned out Sunday brought the three-day total of 171,326. The Dodgers' previous high for three games was in the home opening series with the Giants when 167,209 saw them play.

It also brought the Dodgers' home attendance for 27 games to 810,151, which was 157,379 ahead of Milwaukee for last year for 27 games when they set a seasonal record of 2,215,404.

The Dodgers counted 19 hits off four Milwaukee pitchers for their best effort of the season. Their previous high was 18 hits against Philadelphia May 4 when they won 15-2.

When the Cardinals won their first game of a doubleheader with Philadelphia Sunday, it moved the Dodgers into seventh place by three percentage points. But when the Phils took the second game the Dodgers dropped back into tie.

In Sunday's game Johnny Podres, still not fully recovered from an assortment of ills, captured his sixth victory against four losses and it was his fifth straight win in Memorial Coliseum. Gene Conley, the first Brave pitcher, went a third of an inning, giving up four runs and was charged with his fifth defeat without a win.

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
