Pair Die In Pistol Duel

PRESTONSBURG, Ky. (UPI)—Prestonsburg Fire Chief Amos Gray, 37, and former Chief Vernon Blackburn, 39, were shot to death Sunday night in a gun duel in Gray's apartment over the Fire Department.

Officials said the gun battle was the result of a long-standing grudge between them. Gray's wife Marguerite, and their 12-year-old son both witnessed the double slaying.

Gray, who was shot once just above the heart, died on arrival at Prestonsburg General Hospital. Blackburn died later at the hospital of four bullet wounds.

He is survived by his widow and two children.

Gray became fire chief early last year following Blackburn's dismissal.
