

Sputnik Three Said No Spy

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Pentagon's chief space scientist has conceded that the Russians may be using their giant Sputnik III to spy on the United States. But he added "My guess is they aren't."

Dr. Herbert York, science chief of the Defense Department's Advanced Research Projects Agency, said Sunday he knows of "no reason to believe" the Russians are using their 1 1/2-ton satellite for reconnaissance.

Key System Runs Again

OAKLAND (UPI)—Key system bus service between East Bay cities and over the Bay Bridge was back to normal today with settlement of a week-long strike of bus drivers and mechanics.

He said American experts "outsmarted" themselves when they stressed atomic weapons, and strategic airpower after World War II while the Russians concentrated on rockets.

But he said "we have caught up... and at the present time we are moving somewhat faster" if all parts of the space and missile program are considered.

Employment Shows Gain

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Employment in the three West Coast states was up 19,500 between March and April, less than half the normal total, according to a report by the Department of Labor.

April employment in the three states was 2.4 per cent or 230,000 less than April, 1957, the department said.

In California, April employment rose 4,600; it was up 8,300 in Oregon and 6,600 in Washington. The department said that in normal years, employment rises more than 40,000 in April.

A smaller weekly paycheck as well as a decline in the average hours worked, were also reported in three states. The government figures showed, however, that with a weekly income of \$90.35 a week in California, \$90.94 in Washington, and \$90.24 in Oregon, West Coast workers were better off than the national average of \$80.81.

Window Washer Falls To Death

DENVER (UPI) — A 36-year-old window washer, who scooped at floors to his death Sunday when the ledge he was standing on crumbled beneath him.

Police identified the victim as Lawrence R. Thomas of Denver. Stunned witnesses said Thomas suddenly slipped and fell as he was preparing to wash the windows of the Cooper Building.

The body struck another ledge and then plummeted to the pavement, narrowly missing a passer-by, Curtis Crubb, 25, of Denver. Mrs. Ruth Brajdich, an elevator operator of the building, told officers Thomas was "joking and in a happy mood" when she took him up to the fourth floor minutes before the accident.

"I asked him why he never used a safety belt and he laughed and said he didn't need one," she said.

Thomas, unmarried, was employed by the Acme Building and Maintenance Co.

Cardinals Meet For Consistory

VATICAN CITY (UP) — Cardinals of the Roman Catholic Church gathered today for the first consistory called by Pope Pius XII in more than four years.

A secret consistory and a public consistory 45 minutes later were being held to debate the merits of two candidates for sainthood in the Church.

The last consistory called by the Pontiff was on May 20, 1954, when cardinals and bishops approved canonization of Pope Pius X.

Today's consistory was expected to be devoted solely to discussion of the canonization causes and the reading of a list of bishops appointed during the last four years.

The consistory was not connected with the appointment of new cardinals for the church.

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Brand Quits Oregon Court

SALEM (AP) — Justice James Brand, 71, is leaving the Oregon Supreme Court to go to Florida and become a college professor. Brand, a member of the court since 1941, announced his resignation Saturday and said he will become a professor at Stetson University College of Law at Deland, Fla.

The justice said his resignation will become effective July 1, and that he will leave two weeks later for Florida.

Earlier last week, the Associated Press carried a dispatch which said Brand's resignation was expected shortly.

Despite his resignation, Brand will receive \$8,000 a year in retirement pay from the state.

Brand was appointed to the court by former Gov. Charles Sprague, after serving as a Circuit judge in Coos County for 12 years.

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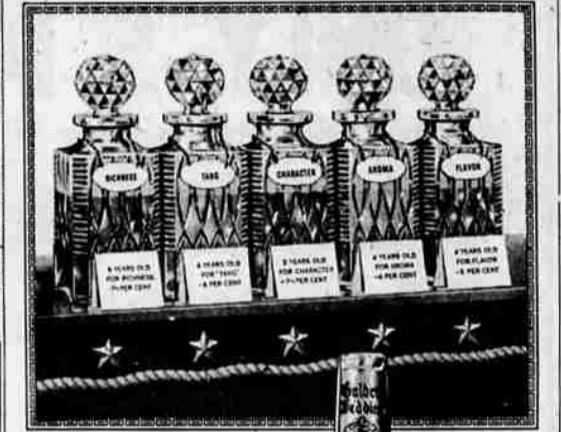
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
