Fresno Snares League Lead

The Fresno Giants moved into first place in the California League standings today, displacing Visalia's Redlegs from the coveted spot for the first time since early last month.

The Giants pushed across a run in the top of the 10th Tuesday night to hand the Redlegs a 5-4 defeat. The victory, coupled with league president Eddie Mulligan's ruling that a disputed Fresno win over Reno last month would stand because the Silver Sox refused to replay the game Monday, edged the Giants into first place by .006 percentage points.

Mulligan earlier had allowed Reno's protest of the game and gave the Nevadaans the victory, charging Fresno with the loss although the Giants came out on top in the long end of the score.

Las Vegas shut out Salinas, 6-0, and Modesto made the most of 10 hits and five Stockton errors to defeat the Ports, 8-6, in other games. The Bakersfield-Reno contest was rained out.

Fred Rick allowed Salinas only six hits while hurling Las Vegas to its victory. The Wranglers jumped on Paul Poole for six straight hits and three runs in the second frame to nail down the win. Modesto's defeat of Stockton left the two clubs deadlocked for fourth place in the standings, seven games out of first. The Reds scored twice in the sixth to clinch the victory.

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—The Los Angeles Dodgers tonight sent another of their hard-luck pitchers, Don Newcombe, to the mound in Memorial Coliseum against the Philadelphia Phillies in the hope that he can find himself as Don Newcombe did Tuesday night.

The Dodgers lost that game, 3-2, but Newcombe came through with his best pitching performance of the year despite the defeat by an unearned run. The defeat left Los Angeles in last place by a game and a half.

The loss left Newcombe 0-3 for the season but the big hurler said the game may have been the turning point of the season for him.

"I got my confidence back," Newk said after the heartbreaker. "Sure I lost but I know now I have the stuff to start helping the team."

Manager Walt Alston, praising Newcombe's performance as being more like that of the pitcher of old, said he was hopeful that Drysdale, with a 2-8 record, can find himself like Newcombe did.

High Society Fight Tonight

WASHINGTON (AP)—Middleweights Joey Giardello of Philadelphia and Franz Szuza of Germany will have it out with each other tonight in a most uncommon setting—the swank Shoreham Terrace.

A high society audience will watch from tables placed amid umbrella trees, petunias and geraniums.

This hoity-toity enterprise of promoter Goldie Ahearn and the International Boxing Club will benefit Big Brothers of America, an organization which aids wayward boys. Ladies in evening gowns and men in black tie uniforms will pay \$25 each to dine on the terrace—an outdoor night club—and watch the fight.

Should it rain, festivities will shift into the hotel's main ballroom.

Giardello, a top-heavy favorite who outpointed Szuza earlier this year, is gunning for Ray Robinson's crown. He ranks second to Carmen Basilio among the current challengers.

Szuza, a Bremen weightlifter who has been fighting since 1948, wants to avenge his defeat and simultaneously gain the ranking he now lacks. Szuza last year beat Virgil Akins, the new welterweight champ. He has won 42 all together, 23 by knockouts, lost 18 and had 13 draws.

Giardello, unbeaten in his last 16 fights, has kayoted 28 of his 76 victims, lost to 13, drawn with five and had one bout without a decision.

ABC will telecast at 10 p.m. EDT.

RESE BOBBLES

Ironically, it was another "old pro," Capt. Pee Wee Reese, who made the error that permitted the unearned run to get started. He bobbled a routine grounder by catcher Joe Lonetti. Pitcher Ray Semprecht, who scored his sixth win and second straight against the Dodgers, then hit into a fielder's choice.

But the next man up was the fearsome Richie Ashburn who tripled to score the unearned tally and then scored himself on Hemus' single. Those two runs gave the Phils a 3-1 lead which Charlie Neal shortened with a leadoff sixth inning homer, his 10th of the season.

NEWCOMBE CHEERED

Newcombe tried valiantly to break up the game himself by hitting safely three times in four trips to the plate. The big pitcher received a lusty cheer from the 19,671 fans in Memorial Coliseum when in the bottom of the ninth Manager Alston let him take his turn at bat instead of calling in a pinch hitter. Newk fled but he still has cheered for the fine performance, the first time he had gone beyond five and a third in his season.

Neal not only homered but he drove in the other Dodger run, in the first with a bases-loaded single. But with a glorious opportunity facing him, Gil Hodges struck out, a feat he did twice more in the game.

Semprecht fanned six men, getting the usually hard-hitting Roseboro twice also. The young rookie gave up 9 scattered hits while Newcombe was touched for 11 safeties.

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ARCARO SCORES TRIPLE

Minors Need Majors Aid

TULSA, Okla. (UPI)—Baseball's minor leagues face swift extinction, Grayle Howlett of the Tulsa Oilers predicted today, unless the major leagues "do something—and do it quickly."

Howlett is well qualified to sound the clarion call to action. His club—in a state which produced such major league stars as Carl Hubbell, the Waners, Pepper Martin, Allie Reynolds, Dale Mitchell and Mickey Mantle—is the last of the 15 organized baseball franchises which Oklahoma once boasted.

His plea is that the major league clubs pay the freight for players which they send down on the farm and share "invasion" TV and radio income.

"Major league baseball must carry the load on their players," Howlett explained. "Here in the Texas League we have a 19-man player limit. We own eight players and the Philadelphia Phillies, with whom we have a working agreement, own 11."

"Last year it cost us \$175,000 to operate the Tulsa club," he adds. "We broke even only because we were lucky enough to sell two of our own players to major league teams due, primarily, to the fact that our players' payroll ran \$75,000."

That's where the major leagues should come in, according to his plan.

"We have no equity in the players they send us," he explains. "We polish them and pay their way while we are doing it. It's time that the majors started subsidizing the training of their future major league stars."

Howlett, a member of the Major-Minor League Fund Committee which the majors set up to distribute \$500,000 in aid to the minors, feels that the majors should "pay the travel expenses here for farmed out players as well as their training expenses and their salaries."

There is no doubt in Howlett's mind but what the weekly TV casts into his territory "insidiously" are chipping away, little by little.

George Weiss and Gabe Paul, general managers respectively of the Yankees and the Cincinnati Redlegs, are on the major-minor league committee and their reactions to the minor leaguers' plight obviously annoy the Tulsa owner.

"Weiss seems to think that the problem is lazy residential operators who don't know how to promote people into the ball parks," Howlett says with some heat.

"This isn't so, because we in the minors have done and are doing everything we know how, working more hours than the major leaguers do. Paul says the minors have always had a problem and always will be up and down. The difference is that now we are down in the deepest valley in which we've ever been and there are new problems such as we never faced before."

Giants Hold NL Lead Despite Loss Streak

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Question: What certain ball club has lost 10 of its last 14 games and still leads the National League?

Answer: The San Francisco Giants, thanks to the fact that second place Milwaukee has managed to lose five straight.

Bob Friend, the Pittsburgh Pirates' chunky right-hander, posted his ninth win of the season Tuesday night by defeating Manager Bill Rigney's forces, 5-4.

Friend did not give up a walk and struck out eight Giants while getting hotter as the game progressed. But Ramon Monzant, who was charged with his fifth loss against four wins, was well cooled off in the showers by the fourth inning.

The Giants, who now have lost three straight, meet the Pirates in an afternoon game today with Ruben Gomez (5-4), who figured in that beanball ruckus at Pittsburgh, slated to open. He probably will be opposed by Vernon Law (5-4), his opponent in the Forbes Field riot.

Home runs clobbered the Giants Tuesday night, although they managed to stay a half-game and three percentage points ahead of Milwaukee.

R. C. Stevens smashed his seventh of the season in the first inning after Bill Virdon greeted Monzant with a lead-off single. Bob Skinner's fifth of the year after Virdon had again singled in the third gave the Pirates a 4-1 bulge. Then Frank Thomas belted his 17th of the year in the sixth to give Friend the extra run he needed.

Two of San Francisco's runs scooted home during double plays while two others came on a homer with a man on by Orlando Cepeda.

The big Puerto Rican smashed one squarely over the center field barrier in the fourth inning after

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
