Teacher Quits Over Row Raised By Essay Release

HANOVER, N. J. (AP)—A young high school teacher has submitted her resignation in the wake of an outcry over the publication of three student essays condemning the atom bombing of Hiroshima.

But the local school board voted 4-3 Wednesday night not to accept

the resignation of Miss Le Moyne Goodman pending an investigation of the incident.

The board's decision came after a stormy public meeting attended by 150 residents, teachers and members of veterans' groups. Miss Goodman was not present and was unavailable for comment on the board's action.

The essays in question, chosen by the 26-year-old teacher from a batch of about 60, were published last Saturday in the "Triad," the Hanover Park regional high school newspaper.

They were written after her students had read Pulitzer prize-winner John Hersey's book, "Hiroshima," a documentary account of the dropping of the first atom bomb in which 80,000 persons died.

Publication of the essays—two written by boys and one by a girl—touched off an outburst of indignation by veterans groups, who said Miss Goodman influenced the students to write as they did.

One letter from a Veterans of Foreign Wars group called the essays "the lowest form of dishonor to those who have paid the supreme sacrifice."

"Disrespectful to every loyal American," said another letter.

Miss Goodman, a tall, soft-spoken blonde, conceded she had used "poor judgment" in her choice of essays for publication, but she said the essays were graded "on the student's opinion of the book—not of the bomb."

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Union Official Charges Knight In Use Of Mexican Labor On Friend's Farm

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A labor union official charged Wednesday that Gov. Goodwin J. Knight recently paid off a political debt to a campaign contributor by ordering 500 Mexicans assigned to work on his farm.

The official charged that Knight overruled a local employment service manager who had insisted that the California grower wasn't entitled to the Mexican laborers. The employment service official held that unemployed Americans were available for work and were entitled to preference under the law.

The accusation was made against Knight in testimony prepared for a House Agriculture Subcommittee by H. J. Mitchell, spokesman for the National Agricultural Workers Union.

Mitchell's testimony was made available to the press in anticipation of his scheduled appearance. But he did not get a chance to testify since the subcommittee recessed until today after hearing two witnesses.

The subcommittee is considering legislation to continue the program of government recruitment of Mexicans to work on American farms. Mitchell joined other opponents in charging that the program has been subject to abuse.

Mitchell cited the alleged incident involving Knight as an illustration of "how a large farm operator manages to get Mexican nationals when domestic workers are available."

He said the incident occurred recently in a local employment office of the Department of Employment in a California town.

that was not identified. He described it as follows:
"A grower large both in stature and in size of operation, strode in and told the manager: 'I want 500 Mexican nationals assigned to my farm.'
"The manager replied, 'We have several hundred domestic workers available and we are instructed to place domestic workers before assigning Mexican nationals.'
"The grower said, 'I don't want the damned domestic workers on my place.'
"The grower then asked to use the telephone and placed a call to Governor Knight in Sacramento.
"One end of the conversation overheard by a union informant in the office was about as follows: 'Goodie, this is-----, You remember I put up \$1,000 when you ran for office, don't you? You are running again, aren't you? This fellow here tells me I can't have 500 Mexicans. You see that I get them.'
"Mitchell added that the local employment service manager "got his orders and the Mexican nationals were assigned to him."
