

## OUT OF DOORS with Field & Stream

Local anglers who pride themselves as Klamath River fishing experts have just three days left to hit their favorite spots before the stream closes for the summer.

Klamath River will close after Sunday's (June 15) fishing and will remain closed until October 1. The river is open from early October to June every year with the opening and closing dates varying a day or so.

The past two weeks have produced some of the best fishing seen on the river this year and anglers closing the stream Friday, Saturday and Sunday should have good days. Limit catches on worms, flies and spinning lures have been coming in fast and furious.

One of the biggest producers last weekend was May flies on a No. 6 hook. Artificial fly fishermen were also having their luck, both in size and number over the past several days.

Sharing the headlines with the closing of Klamath River is the success being enjoyed on three lakes in western Klamath and eastern Jackson County. Reports from Lake of the Woods, Fish Lake and Four-Mile indicate a fine weekend of fishing ahead Saturday and Sunday.

Several limit catches of 30 trout have been bagged at Fish Lake in recent weeks and the weather has taken a turn for the better, which should provide better fishing. On the whole, still fishing in among the snags has been the best, but some trolling success has been had on flat-fish and spinner and worms.

Lake of the Woods continues to improve for trollers. The best results seem to be coming from shallow water fishing spots. Fishers with worms or nightcrawlers have been the best attraction.

Four-Mile, which got off to a late start due to snow - bound road conditions, opened fast last weekend. Several local fishermen reported back in with limits of trout. There weren't many of any size, but all ranged between seven and 11 inches on the average. Four-Mile should be good to excellent this weekend, providing the weather holds.

Wood River and Sevenmile have been improving this past week. One angler brought in a limit catch of nice fish taken on the lower end of the stream and another hit it good in the meadow below the artesian well west of Fort Klamath. Nightcrawlers and local anglers so far this year.

## Klamath Falls Legion Nine Blasts Bend In Return Tilt

The whipping right arm of Blake Griggs coupled with the booming bats of his teammates earned the Klamath Falls American Legion baseball team a resounding 16-0 victory over their Bend counterparts at Gem Stadium Wednesday night.

Griggs, who hurled no-hit, no-run ball for the first three innings, struck out 10 and issued only three free passes to first base while allowing only six hits over the route. The victory marked Griggs' first win in two starts. His loss was also credited to the Bend nine at Bend last Saturday.

The Klamathites secured Griggs a five-run cushion in the home half of the first inning as they put together three singles, a double and a safe bunt while Bend contributed an error.

Dean Dunson, who made some brilliant stops at first base, collected three for four at the plate and Smiley Herrera collected three for five to lead the Klamath batters.

Centerfielder Bob Yuncak and shortstop Steve Binney collected the longest hits of the evenings as they poled out triples; Bend outfielder Riley banged out two extra-base raps that were credited as doubles but in each instance he was thrown out, Herrera to Kiger, trying to stretch the raps to triples.

Estin Kiger, who was playing his first game on the third-base corner, was upended in both Riley's attempts, but held the ball to ruin the tries.

Three Bend pitchers were called upon to try to quell the Klamath uprising but to no avail as the local nine collected a total of 14 hits. Both teams seemed to have trouble with the Gem Stadium lighting, as in a number of cases balls to the outfield were badly misjudged.

Klamath was held scoreless in only the third frame, collecting five runs in the first, two in the second.

## Hebert Brothers Realize Dreams

TULSA, Okla. (UPI) — When Jay Hebert was a 14-year-old back on the farm in Louisiana he cherished a battered old driver he had bought for a hard-earned dollar and dreamed of nothing but becoming a professional golfer.

One afternoon he looked up from milking the cow and there stood his little brother, Lionel, swinging that precious club at pebbles in the barnyard.

"Liney," Jay yelled in consternation, "put down that club and fetch me another bucket."

Chubby, nine-year-old Lionel didn't even stop swinging. "Thell with you," he grunted as he crashed the clubhouse into a rock. "Can't you see I'm practisin'."

"If you don't put down that

club, I'll whale you one," Jay stormed as he came off the milking stool and took out after his little brother.

MAKES GOOD THREAT  
Lionel scrambled over to the corner of the barn and poised the club menacingly.

"Take one more step," he threatened, "and I'll bust this old club against the barn."

Jay took one more step — and Lionel busted the club against the barn.

Now, 21 years later, they're both golf professionals, fulfilling the dreams founded in their Cajun boyhood. Jay is one of the favorites to win the U. S. Open golf championship which started at Southern Hills country club today.

And Lionel, the PGA champion, at 30, still is as stubborn as he was back there on the farm.

Lionel hasn't changed much. He's bigger but he's still chubby and he hasn't lost that mulishness.

"Good thing, too," he says with a friendly smile. "I've got a chance in this tournament because I was stubborn."

DIDN'T GO ON TOUR  
The way it works out is this. When he turned pro back in 1950, friends tried to influence him to go on the tour. Lionel felt that he needed to serve a five-year apprenticeship in the pro shop to learn the game from the bottom.

Then others told him he could win a lot of tournaments with his old style. But Lionel felt he had to change his game. So he did.

"That's the reason my earnings were so low for a long time," he explains. "But I knew I had to alter my game to have a chance in the big tournaments, the important ones, so I stuck to it."

So Lionel grimly settled for less money while he was remaking his game and then last summer at Dayton surprised the golf world by winning the PGA championship—the first of those "big ones" he was aiming at.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Giardello and Washington society have met, but odds are steep that they'll never really be chummy.

Joey, the Philadelphia middleweight, made his bow before the capital's elite on the Shoreham Hotel terrace last night. Franz Suzina, the German weightlifter who now fights for a living, appeared with Joey.

After 10 rounds of fist throwing Giardello had won his 77th victory and his third decision over Suzina.

The black tie and evening gown audience boomed the verdict as judges Harry Volkman (99-92) and Charley Buck (97-94) voted for Giardello and referee Charley Reynolds viewed it as a standoff (92-92). The Associated Press agreed with the judges (99-93).

For many of the 850 socialites, diplomats, Congress members and government officials, the nationally televised charity match between the two 160-pounders was their first exposure to the gentlemanly art of self-defense.

They liked stocky Franz as the underdog and for the way he charged into Giardello with a persistent right that sometimes stopped Joey short.

But Giardello, who ranks just behind Carmen Basilio for Ray Robinson's title, was busy with his quick left and generally too effective for Suzina.

Franz cut Giardello under the left eye in the first round but Joey was never in any jeopardy. Giardello opened a slight cut on Suzina's forehead in a blistering 10th.

Lack of noise was one of the things that didn't suit Giardello. "They held themselves back," he said afterward. "It wasn't like a real fight. It was just different."

## Drysdale Wins First Victory

Except for being in last place, things are almost normal. Drysdale, the 21-year-old right-hander, went all the way for a 7-4 victory over the Phils last night, giving up nine hits, but striking out six and allowing only two earned runs.

Milwaukee, meanwhile, regained the National League lead as the Braves ended their longest losing streak since 1956 at 5 games with a 10-7 victory over the Chicago Cubs. San Francisco slipped to second, .005 percentage points behind, as the Pittsburgh Pirates breezed in on Frank Thomas' seven runs batted in for a 14-6 victory and the Giants' fourth loss in a row.

The St. Louis Cardinals took third, three games behind, with a 3-2, 12-inning victory over Cincinnati.
