

New Pine Creek Grange Plans Fathers Day Party

NEW PINE CREEK—There will be a Fathers Day community dinner and program following church services Sunday, June 15, at the grange hall, it was announced at the grange meeting Saturday evening, by Grace Bernard, home ec chairman, who reported on the home ec meeting held last Thursday at the hall, when Mrs. Anna Fisher was hostess.

In reporting on a resolution in support of the Willow Ranch Small Craft Harbor now under consideration, adopted at the previous grange meeting, Carmen P. Fleming, chairman of the legislative committee for California, said he had attended a meeting of the Modoc County Board of Supervisors recently. He said he was encouraged to believe that the installation on Goose Lake is by no means a dead issue. The supervisors endorsed the project and turned the matter over to the Alturas Chamber of Commerce for further action. "It is still possible to get the harbor installation on the lake," he said.

A motion carried to have the Civic Improvements Committee contact property holders of the three lots just south of the grange hall with the aim of getting permission to use them, along with the other lots in the space between the fire hall and the grange hall, for the purpose of developing a town park. Jack Moffitt has offered to donate his lot for such a purpose and the other existing lots are thought to be available. Serving on the committee are Irvin L. Faris, Carmen Fleming and Harvey Sanders.

Alice Allen, secretary, in the

discussion on cemetery improvements, suggested that a plot be made of the cemetery. The suggestion was included in a motion that carried, to have a committee appointed to investigate the possibility of having cemetery districts established for cemeteries in Lake County, and also to see if some reciprocal agreement could be reached with Modoc County, where cemetery districts are already established, for grave maintenance. Appointed to this committee were Fred Fisher, Robert Snider and Harvey Sanders.

When the matter of having a well drilled at the cemetery was brought up for discussion, it was disclosed that the Eastside Grange has no money for cemetery development. All the money donated in the past to the grange for cemetery improvement was turned over several years ago to the town cemetery committee. This committee, Garland Cundiff explained, is now composed of the following persons: Darwin Robnett, president, Alvin Butler, secretary-treasurer, Raymond Fisher, Donald Evans and himself.

He also said the committee had built a fence around the new addition to the cemetery, purchased and erected a new gate, and done other improvements, with \$400 still remaining in the cemetery fund.

Speaking on behalf of the committee, he said they were reluctant to drill for water as there was not guarantee that water could be reached at the average depth of wells down lower in the valley, where good drilled wells run from 50 to 75 feet deep. They did not

want to risk spending people's money and still have a dry hole.

The cemetery improvement fund was first begun by the Modern Woodman Lodge over 10 years ago, it was brought out in the discussion. After that lodge went defunct, the Eastside Grange lent its support to the project in order to have a better cemetery for the

community. But, as an entity, the old cemetery committee continued to function, replacing its members from time to time. Part of the money it has on hand at present was sent directly to members of the committee and over half of it was sent to the Eastside Grange

where it was kept in a separate cemetery fund. A few years ago it was deemed wise to turn it all over to the town's cemetery committee to use at its discretion as its members were considered best acquainted with the cemetery problems.

Fred Fisher reported on the Pomona Grange meeting he attended recently at Fort Rock, where it was reported the Eastside Grange had won the membership attendance contest. He congratulated the membership but cautioned that

they won by only five points, which should make all mindful of the importance of regular attendance. A 4-H scholarship of \$25 was voted by the members before they adjourned for refreshments and listened to a humorous reading by Mrs. Bernard.

School Facts

Editor's Note: This is the second in a series of informative articles dealing with the city schools and their budgets. Today's article will discuss some of the local factors affecting school costs.

School District, for example, the basic school support fund listed as "estimated receipts" is for the amount of \$192,000. In reality, there is another \$95,000 in the general fund for the district. Elementary school district No. 1 lists \$235,000 as estimated receipts in its budget; with the additional \$10 per child the amount is actually \$265,000.

One of the factors contributing to higher school expenditures is found in the method of handling the funds accruing from the basic school support monies returned to local school districts from state funds. Until the general session of the Legislature in 1957 the basic school support paid to each district was \$85 per census school child. The general session of that year raised the amount to \$95, and the amount was once again raised at the special session of the Oregon Legislature called in the fall of 1957, this time to \$105 per child.

A second factor affecting the local school tax situation is the handling of utility tax monies. Formerly, these were collected in the county in which the utilities were located. Now the taxes on these utilities are collected by the state, reducing the county income from this source.

The special session then adjusted the method of handling the school support funds. Formerly the funds have been given to the school districts and were included in the budgets as presented to the community as in item under "estimated receipts." Under the new method of handling the funds, the school districts may include the amount of \$95 per child, but not the additional \$10 per child, which can be applied for to the general fund only after the passing of the school budget.

The original proposed budget for the Klamath Union High School District was \$336,571, and the amount for the elementary district was \$1,235,317. After these budgets were defeated during the special school elections of May 5, the proposed budgets were revised to \$789,060 for the high school and \$1,189,156 for the elementary district.

In the budget of Union High

Major reductions in the elementary budget were in the capital outlay items, while the reductions in the high school budget included the elimination of one new teacher, several minor items, and a smaller salary increase for janitors and bus drivers.

Detailed copies of the budgets of both districts are available in the office of the superintendent of schools, Room 200, at the high school building. Succeeding articles in this series will discuss each budget in more detail.
