### West German President On American Trip

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—West Germany's President Theodor Heuss, making friends wherever he goes in America, is getting a royal welcome in this Pacific Coast area.

The chubby, eager, 74-year-old German, who does not speak English, won friends as soon as he landed here yesterday, even though he was weary from a round of ceremonies in Chicago and a long flight here in a military plane.

"He's having a wonderful time," his interpreter, Heinz Weber, assured greeters as a 21-gun salute boomed and the president briskly reviewed soldiers, sailors, airman and marines in an honor guard.

Fearing perhaps that the president's weariness might belie his feelings, Weber shouted to greeters:

"He's having a ball." Mayor George Christopher, who met him at the airport, and Superior Court Judge William Sweigert were hosts at the city hall reception.

German singing societies in costumes made him feel at home with Konrad Kreuzer's "Schaeiers Sontagelied" and Frederick Silcher's "Untrene" and "In der Ferne."

Tonight in the Gold Room of the Fairmont Hotel on Nob Hill, Dr. Heuss will address a formal dinner in his honor by the World Affairs Council of Northern California.

### Car Arrest Figures Told

Juvenile Officer Francis Mathews this week released statistics of traffic citations given juveniles in Klamath County during the month of May.

He said that 36 citations were issued, 25 for moving, and 11 for non-moving violations. Twenty four of the citations were issued by Oregon State Police, eight by Klamath Falls City Police, and four by other agencies.

The most common cause of citations was violation of the basic rule. Twelve citations were issued for this offense, Mathews said. There were eight citations for improper mufflers, four each for running stop signs and for reckless driving, and two each for having no operator's license and for engaging in speed contests.

Of the 36 citations, one was given to a driver under 15, four to drivers 15 years of age, 14 to 16-year-olds, and 17 to 17-year-olds. Mathews added that seven were repeat violations.

The juvenile officer said that only one driver was cited after an accident, which resulted only in property damage, that to the amount of \$255.

Mathews said there were six licenses suspended, two of them only partially, so that the drivers can drive to and from work. The other four suspensions were for 60 days or less. Two of the persons cited wound up in district court.

Of the 36 citations, 31 were given boys and five, girls.

### Anti-American Film Festival On

HONG KONG (AP)—A festival of anti-American films is opening Saturday in Hanoi, capital of Communist North Viet Nam.

Hanoi Radio, heard here today, said more than 20 feature movies from Russia, Communist China, Hungary, East Germany and Japan are on the program.

They include: "Still, it's Good to be Alive," from Japan, described as a "dramatic denunciation of the crimes of the U.S. imperialists who dropped atom bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki and continue nuclear tests in the Pacific."

### Worn Bible Carried By Flier To Be Returned To Mother After 15 Years

WACO, Tex. (AP)—A worn Bible that belonged to a Texas flier killed in action 15 years ago is on its way to his mother by a strange route that probably never will be explained.

The mystery: who carried T. Sgt. Bill J. Wheeler's Bible for six months before it was found by a German housewife?

The pocket Bible was found in a ragged U.S. flight jacket in the garden of the suburban home of Mrs. Theodor Hillebrand at Dortmund, Germany, Aug. 12, 1943. An American bomber had just crashed nearby in flames.

She kept the Bible, a violation of Nazi orders. Sgt. Wheeler's signature was inside the Bible.

But Sgt. Wheeler had been killed in action over Germany six months before the Bible fell into the garden.

"I wanted to keep that Bible," said Mrs. Hillebrand, "and one day return it to its rightful owner."

But few American soldiers came to Dortmund after the war ended.

Recently Army Specialist J.C. Denos G. Pappas of Ogden, Utah, visited Dortmund. Mrs. Hillebrand went to him with the Bible. Pappas took it to his unit chaplain, Capt. Ben Price of Paris, Tex.

From Germany, the book was sent to the 12th Air Force headquarters here. The sergeant's mother, Mrs. F. W. Wheeler of Easterly, Tex., says she recalls the Bible.

The Bible will be officially turned over to Mrs. Wheeler by Maj. Gen. Chester E. McCarthy, commander of the 12th Air Force, in ceremonies here next Wednesday.

### Court Plans Road Trip

Members of the Klamath County Court will journey to Winnemucca, Nevada, Friday to confer on the proposed new east-west highway from Winnemucca to the coast.

They will meet with Nevada State Highway and Humboldt County, California, officials, who are also interested in concerted action to get the route built.

Before it can become a reality, three new stretches of paved road would have to be constructed.

Largest would be a link composed of 34 miles in eastern Oregon and some 60 miles in western Nevada. Once built this would connect Lakeview and Winnemucca.

Klamath Falls, already connected to Lakeview by Highway 66, would then be connected also to Winnemucca and important Highway 40.

The other two links are a 17 mile stretch in western Klamath County and eastern Jackson County, and a 34 mile stretch in Josephine and Curry counties.

Nevada reportedly will build its share if Oregon will construct its.

The proposed route would provide a near straight east-west road from the coast through Southern Oregon to Winnemucca. It is believed such a route would boost commerce and tourist trade measurably.

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### Problems Of Africa Told

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The Anglican Archbishop of South Africa, an outspoken foe of racial segregation, says the white supremacy (Nationalist) government in his country is trying to "unscramble an egg."

The Most Rev. Joost de Blank, who visited San Francisco yesterday on a tour of the United States and leaves for Los Angeles today, told a press conference:

"The future of South Africa, which will be decided in the next decade, is literally a black one."

He made it clear that there is no comparison between integration problems in the United States and South Africa.

In his country, he explained, there are three million whites—"A large minority who know no other home." There also are two million Asians and nine and a half million native Negroes.

### Manned Satellites Just Out Of Reach; 10 Years May See Space Ship Age

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Such comic strip subjects as moon rockets, manned satellites, magnetic parachutes, travel in space and stations on the moon aren't funny to members of the American Rocket Society.

They're serious when they say that out of such discussion as those of their four-day semi-annual meeting here may be found the shape of man's attempt to conquer space.

And not too long in the future. The ship that carried "Buck Rogers" into his private solar system many years ago now is on the drawing board, according to Kraft Ehricke of the Convair Division of General Dynamics Corp. of San Diego, Calif.

Ehricke wouldn't go further than that Wednesday in discussing the proposed space ship, other

than to say that it was a private plan which had drawn the interest of the government.

But, the scientist predicted that with nuclear power the United States could set up a research instrument station on the moon "within 10 to 15 years."

He said he had developed a system to land instruments on the moon by enclosing them in inflatable rubber containers which could be dropped on any part of the moon surface like a "bouncing rubber ball."

Landing units would be carried aloft in a lunar satellite, inflated and dropped toward the moon's surface. Reverse rocket thrusts would bring the gas inflated containers down "softly."

ed a manned satellite would be fired into orbit by the United States in two or three years.

Reasoning power of a human crew is necessary to maneuver where the government wants the satellite to go, the admiral said.

"We must let the automatic instrumentation do what it can do better, and let man do that for which he is best qualified," Clark said.

"It will be a short trip. We will probably bring him back after one trip around."

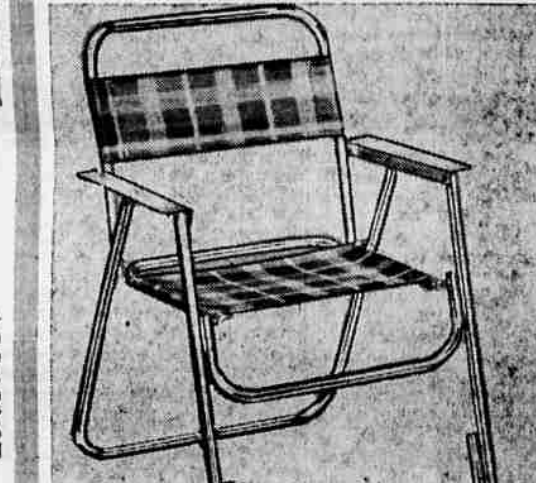

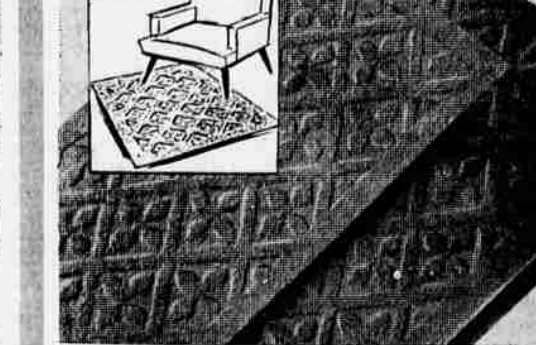
