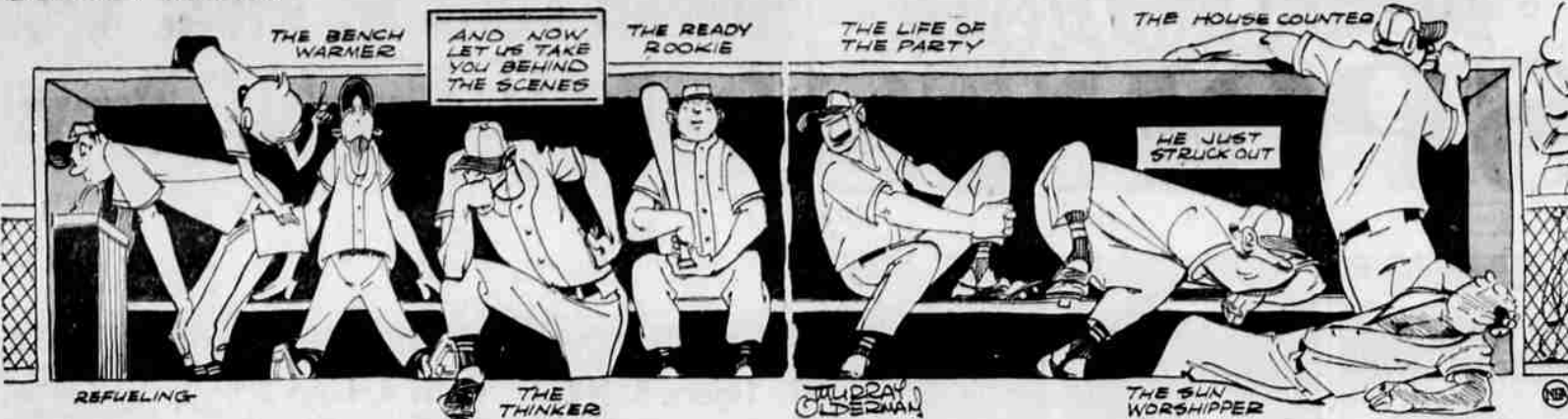

## Baylor Junks Seattle Chiefs For Minneapolis Laker Pact

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — All-America Elgin Baylor junked his final year of eligibility at Seattle University Saturday and signed with the pro Minneapolis Lakers for one of the highest prices ever offered a college basketball player.

The Lakers laid out a sum estimated between \$17,000 and \$20,000 for the 6-6 Negro star in what they admitted was a now-or-never move to keep a National Basketball Assn. franchise in the city.

Laker Coach Johnny Kundla called Baylor, No. 2 college scorer in the land last season, the answer to Minneapolis' search for a tough, high-scoring forward to fill the void that has existed since Jim Pollard quit.

Laker President Robert Short went further: "Next season is

make or break for us. We won only 19 games and lost \$100,000. Every other club in the league wants Minneapolis out of basketball.

"With Baylor in the lineup I think we can compete with any team in the league. One thing's for sure. We're going to have to. The Lakers can't stand another season at the gate like last year."

Baylor had insisted at the time the Lakers drafted him this spring that he was not interested in playing pro basketball this year.

Attending a luncheon news conference at which the signing was announced, Baylor explained he changed his mind because the way has been cleared for him to complete his education in the Twin Cities.

"I plan to enroll at either the

University of Minnesota here or St. Thomas in St. Paul," Baylor said. "Seattle's being put on probation has nothing to do with my decision."

Seattle, guided to the finals of the NCAA tournament on Baylor's 32-point game scoring and brilliant rebounding, has been placed on probation by the NCAA for recruiting violations.

## Broncos Rally To Triumph Over Yakima

Third-place Yakima gave the league leading Lewiston Broncos a scare in their Northwest League baseball game Friday night, but the Broncos staged a come-from-behind rally and emerged 7-6 victors.

In other contests Tri-City out-homered Wenatchee to win the opener of a four-game series there 13-4 while Salem squeezed out a 4-3 win over Eugene.

Lewiston trailed 6-4 going into the last of the ninth. Manager Hillis Layne drove in two runs to tie the game with a single after the bases had been loaded by walks. He scored the winning run after two were out on Roger Herrscher's single. Yakima used four pitchers in that inning with the loss going to the second of the four.

Yakima had scored four runs in the first inning, two of them on Ted Tappe's homer.

At Kennewick Harry Williams and Vern Piver of Tri-City both hit two homers while Bob Koski hit one for the winners and Red Helms got one for the losers. Williams' first homer came in the live-run first inning and drove in three of the tallies. His second was in the sixth with none on. Piver homered in the third with none aboard and in the eighth with one.

Helms' round tripper was a solo affair at the opening of the second inning. The Chiefs added another run on a single and double and picked up two more in the third on a walk, triple and single.

At Eugene Ev Aldridge of Salem held the Emeralds to six scattered hits while the Solons were collecting 10 off loser Bailey Brem. Roy Parker's double in the eighth sent Jack Dunn home with the winning run after the Senators had tied the score in the fifth.

Salem scored twice in the first inning, but Eugene scored three times in the fourth on a walk and four singles to take a brief 3-2 lead.

The second game in the current four-game series will be held Saturday night, with Wenatchee at Tri-City, Yakima at Lewiston and Salem at Eugene.

## Thriftyway Nabs Regatta

DETROIT (AP) — Miss Thriftyway, a late entry from Seattle, won the Detroit Memorial Regatta for unlimited powerboats Saturday as Gale VI was disqualified for jumping the starting gun.

Short Circuit, a Detroit boat owned and driven by Chuck Thompson, easily won the first heat of the Detroit Memorial Regatta Saturday over Miss Thriftyway of Seattle.

The Detroit boat led from the outset and by the time the three-mile Detroit River course was lapped five times, Short Circuit had built up a lead of well over a mile.

Thompson averaged 103.47 miles per hour over the fifteen-mile distance. His first lap time was 107.569.

The start of the first heat was delayed an hour and a half when driver Bill Cantrell was thrown from Gale V at the start.

Miss U.S. 1, a Detroit boat, took the lead of the first heat and held it the rest of the way to win the second heat. Miss U.S. 2 averaged 106.65 miles per hour, beating Gale VI, also a Detroit, and Wildroot Charlie, a Buffalo.

## Britain's Triumph On Gibson Defeat

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Christine Truman, a 17-year-old Amazonian schoolgirl, overpowered tennis queen Althea Gibson in a startling upset Saturday as Britain smashed America's 28-year hold on the Wimbledon Cup, four matches to three.

The honor of clinching Britain's first cup championship since 1930 went to Ann Haydon, who scored her country's fourth point in the next to last match of the seven-match, two-day competition with a 6-3, 6-3 singles victory over Mimi Arnold of Redwood City, Calif.

The U. S. got its last point in a meaningless, concluding doubles match as Miss Gibson and Janet Hoppes of Seattle defeated Ann Shilcock and Pat Ward, 6-4, 3-6, 6-5.

But the six-foot, 170-pound Miss Truman, who swept both her singles assignments and shared in a

third point in doubles, triggered the upset.

Following up her brilliant play in Friday's opening program, Miss Truman shrugged off a first set loss and simply overpowered Miss Gibson—the defending Wimbledon and U. S. champion—2-6, 6-3, 6-4.

Her victory came at the crucial point in the series. Veteran Dorothy Head Knobe of Forest Hills, N. Y., had moments before squared the competition at 2-2 with a surprise triumph over Shirley Bloomer in the opening singles.

Christine's shocker made it 3-2 for Britain and Miss Haydon, only 19 and better known as a table tennis star, took it from there for the clincher in a raggedly-played match with Miss Arnold.

The U. S. still holds a tidy edge, 25-5 in the two-nation series which began in 1923. Britain's other victories were in 1924, 1925, 1928 and 1930.

## Padres Win Seventh Straight With 5-3 Victory Over Solons

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — San Diego ran its Pacific Coast League winning streak to seven Saturday by pinning a seventh straight loss on Sacramento 5-3.

The Padres came from behind for the victory. They bunched four hits in the eighth inning to give reliever Pete Wojey his first win of the season after two defeats.

Marshall Bridges, who suffered the distance for the Solons, wanted his fifth loss against six wins.

Sacramento started the scoring in the first inning. Padre left-fielder Rudy Regalado dropped Dick Cole's long fly for a two-base error. Cole went to third on a wild pitch by San Diego starter Bill Werle and scored on Harry Bright's sacrifice fly.

Regalado tied the count in the fifth when he homered after two were out.

Nippy Jones homered for the Solons in the seventh and they made it 3-1 in the eighth on singles by Clarence Moore and Bright and a sacrifice.

Rod Graber started things for the Padres in the eighth by walking and Regalado beat out a bunt. Dave Pope forced Graber at third but the runners later advanced when Bob Roselli was guilty of a passed ball.

Earl Averill then was given an intentional pass, filling the bases. Eddie Kazak's single scored two runs. Larry Raines, ground-rule double which bounced over the

left field fence scored another and the last run came in on Allen Jones' hit.

SPOKANE (AP) — Spokane unleashed its home run power, with Jim Baxes and Jim Williams each hitting a pair, to overpower Portland 5-2 in the first game of a Pacific Coast League double header Saturday.

There had been rumors of a major shakeup for the Indians, who had been leading the PCL at the gate and trailing in victories. Saturday night they gave at least a temporary answer to critics with a barrage of extra base blows.

Ed Palmquist allowed six hits in the seven inning game and appeared in bad trouble only at the end as he registered his first win of the season against three defeats.

If Red Davis, manager of the Phoenix Giants can keep his left-handed lineup functioning as it has the past two nights he may get another look soon at the Pacific Coast League throne room.

Given a little help, that is, from the other baseball teams scheduled to play the league leading Vancouver Mounties in the next few weeks.

Repenting a tactic which paid off so well Thursday night, Davis sent seven lefthanders in against Salt Lake City's righthanded pitching staff and emerged with a 12-3 victory.

The win kept the Giants two games behind Vancouver, which also found its batting eye to the tune of a 9-5 win over Seattle, thereby knocking the Rainiers into a last place tie with Spokane, defeated 4-8 by Portland.

In the other PCL game, San Diego took possession of third place, walling Sacramento 12-4.

The heavy hitting southpaws at Phoenix got three home runs, driving which they drove the Beavers' starter, Doc Ugrashek to cover in the five-run fourth inning. Ugrashek was charged with the loss, his first in seven starts.

Curt Barclay, the winner, sent up 13 hits but was solid support left 14 Salt Lake's strangled as bases.

The best pitching performance of the evening was turned in by the onetime major league hurler, Larry Jansen, who showed some of his old spark in limiting Spokane to three safeties in Portland's 4-0 win.

The Beavers climbed out of the cellar once again, taking a slim hold on sixth position. They got away to a fast start with three runs in the first inning and Jansen's airtight control — he walked only one man — never let Spokane endanger that margin.

San Diego's lopsided win over Sacramento included a 10-run spurge in the eighth inning, wiping out a 2-3 deficit. It was the sixth straight win for the rebounding Pads but was the first win of the season for Dick Brodowski, who came in as a reliever in the seventh.
