The program was devoted to observance of Flag Day which is June 14. Mrs. Richard Owens, Flag Day chairman, read a moving tribute to the flag of the United States and distributed copies of the flag code, covering rules and customs pertaining to the display and use of the flag. Members were urged to fly their American flags on June 14.

Mrs. William D. Foster's resignation as registrar of the chapter was accepted and Mrs. Foster was sincerely thanked for her many years of outstanding service to the organization. She plans to move this fall into a newly purchased home at Dayton, Oregon, where she formerly lived, and where she still has many friends and relatives.

Mrs. George Paris was appointed librarian to care for the large number of historical and genealogical books which Mrs. Foster has acquired for the chapter over a period of years.

Later in the summer, members of Eulalona Chapter will visit the Beatty Cemetery where Chief Schonchin is buried. Other scheduled trips are to the Log Cabin Museum in Bonanza and the

Lyndon B. Johnson National Monument, at Oregon City. He was a director of the Oregon Printing Association, organized in 1845 to publish the first newspaper on the Pacific Coast, the Spectator.

Newell's talent for amicably negotiating with the Indians and his ability to speak fluently in their dialects, secured his appointment as peace commissioner following the Whitman Massacre in 1847, and as special interpreter and commissioner at the Lapwai, Idaho, Army Post in 1862.

He traveled to Washington, D.C. with a party of Indian chiefs for adjustment of their treaty rights. In 1868 he was appointed Indian agent by President Andrew Johnson. The following year he died at Lewiston.

His home at Champoog was purchased in 1954 by Mrs. Albert Powers, then state regent, and presented to the Oregon Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, who have reconstructed and restored the landmark as a public museum. The historic Champoog
