Insure picnic comfort by taking along something to wash away play dirt. You can pack a jar of soap and one of clean water. This is especially good insurance when going into areas where sanitary facilities are in doubt. Baby will turn up his nose at his daily bottle if it hasn't been

washed thoroughly since stale milk leaves a distinct taste. When sterilizing bottles, scrub inside first with a bottle brush.

Time to think of open sandals and seamless hosiery. Time also to think of getting feet into shape for wearing them. A natural pumice stone and a hot foot bath will help.

Hunting for small pieces of clothing in the washer isn't necessary. If you are doing baby socks, put them in an old nylon stocking first. Knot the open end to keep the socks from sneaking out and mixing among the other garments.

The easiest way to clean baby's nails is to run them over a bar of soap. Then give them a soft brushing in water to wash away imbedded dirt.
